Tourist Travel Is More Than in 1920, Says G. N. Official
Tourist travel over the northern transcontinental railway lines has been heavier this season than during the record season of 1920, according to a statement made by A. J. Dickinson, passenger traffic manager of the Great Northern Railway company, who ar-

rive Monday on a general business tour of the Northwest.
"Portland has drawn more tourists this year than it did in 1920 and a greater demand for tickets to the Rose City is flooding our Eastern offices," said Dickinson.
The visiting rail official said that the strike has had little influence on westbound travel and that so far as the rail officials are concerned, the shippers' walkout is a thing of the past. Shop forces are being built up, trains are running practically on regular schedule and the trains which were withdrawn shortly after the strike soon will be replaced.
