Mount Hood Loop Highway—The 17.2 miles of Mount Hood Loop highway now being built from the east fork of Hood river to an intersection with the old Barlow road on the south-east side of Mount Hood is about half completed, according to W. G. Peters, engineer for the bureau of public roads, who is in charge of the work. Fifty men are now engaged on the stretch of road, which will cost approximately \$250,000. Crews have begun construction of a steel bridge across the river at Horseshoe Meadows.
