

EXHUMED BODIES REVEAL CLUES IN DOUBLE MURDER

Arrest of Man Hitherto Unmentioned in Hall-Mills Crime Is Near; Detectives Speed Up.

New Brunswick, N. J., Sept. 30.—(U. P.)—The grave has yielded the most important clues yet discovered to the secret of the Hall-Mills murders, it became known here today.

Arrest of a man heretofore unmentioned may be but a matter of a few hours, detectives let it be known, following startling revelations in the exhumation of Mrs. James Mills, choir leader, who was found slain beside the body of Rev. Edward W. Hall, Episcopal pastor.

Spurred by public sentiment, rewards, charges of lax investigations and the interest of Governor Edwards of New

Jersey, a score of detectives today began a sudden spurt of activity.

Information that a hitherto unsuspected man was being investigated also followed a tearful visit of Charlotte Mills, daughter of the murdered woman, to Governor Edwards.

Reports were circulated here tonight that Miss Mills told the governing stories she had heard of "powerful interests" working to hamper solution of the weird murder.

Washington G. O. P. Reelects Hebbard

Seattle, Sept. 30.—(U. P.)—Charles Hebbard of Spokane was reelected chairman of the Republican state central committee at a meeting here this afternoon. Mrs. Emma Smith Devoe was the choice for vice chairman. The state campaign will open Monday when headquarters for the state central committee will be established in the Butler hotel.

MURDER TRIAL SET

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 30.—(I. N. S.)—Date for the preliminary hearing of Marie ("Peggy") Beal charged with the murder of Frank Warren Anderson, Philadelphia and Kansas City clubman, was today set by Justice John George for October 14. Miss Beal shot and killed Anderson, her "perfect lover," when she found in his possession the names of 49 other women.

JUAREZ HELD BY REBELS 4 HOURS

Five Killed in Fight Before Federals Regain City; 3 Revolt Leaders Executed.

Juarez, Mexico, Sept. 30.—(U. P.)—Rumblings of new revolutionist activities in Mexico flared here today when Juarez was wrested from control of the federal garrison and held for four hours by the mutineers.

Five persons were killed and many wounded in the fighting which raged in the streets after the garrison fell. Government forces later regained the city and after determined opposition routed the insurrectionists. The casualties in the battle fought throughout the day at the outskirts of the city had not been made known tonight.

Three leaders were executed by a firing squad late today and a number held prisoners, it is believed, will face the same fate by morning.

The uprising was headed by Captain Jesus Valverde, who freed prisoners

in the jail, including a number of Americans and then incarcerated the officials. Looting followed while a handful of loyal troops, perched on the tops of high buildings, fired fusillades into the street below. Two Americans were wounded by stray bullets.

General J. J. Mendez, commander, after being reinforced, led an attack to regain the city and tonight stated the rebel forces had been completely dispersed. Captain Valverde escaped with his staff. Military planes are in pursuit.

Blaze Juarez, city of many revolutions, sought new thrills tonight. Lights blazed from saloons as the customary boisterous throngs made merry.

Kaiser's Death Will Release Real Story

Paris, Sept. 30.—(I. N. S.)—The real memoirs of the former German kaiser, containing secrets of the great war, the Hohenzollern and the German government, have been written, but will not be published until after the ex-war lord's death, it was reported from Amsterdam today. They are said to have been locked up in a safe at Doorn, inscribed: "To be opened after I am dead."

PIERCE AIDED BY SELF-MADE MAN

Jesse Winburn, Who Gave \$5000 For Campaign, Liberal Also to Ashland.

Ashland, Sept. 30.—Jesse Winburn, whose \$5000 contribution to the gubernatorial campaign of Walter M. Pierce was an important political development of the past week, is a self-made man. He made his money in the street car advertising business, which he took out a year or so ago.

He came to Ashland and bought 160 acres, six miles up Mount Ashland, where he has built a modern cabin home. At his own expense he fixed up the road to Mount Ashland. He is spending \$15,000 or more on a building and is furnishing a club house for the Women's Civic club of Ashland.

He initiated the Jackson county Fourth of July celebration and besides taking a personal part, he contributed more than \$1000 to its success. An all-day party at his cabin home in June is an event for the children of the vicinity. This week he gave six swans for the lake in Lithia park.

Sweden Opens Its Third Free Port; Seeks Russ Trade

Stockholm, Sept. 30.—Malmö was opened with much ceremony as a free port this week. It is the third thus opened since the close of the war, the others being Stockholm and Gothenburg. The opening of these ports indicates the growing importance of Sweden as the coming commercial road to Northeastern Europe. My impression after talking with leading business men here is that the ports are planned in part at least, with a view to securing future Russian trade, which it is considered here will become decisively important in coming years.

The multiplication of small nations in this part of the world makes free ports more important than was the case formerly. Now an American exporter can send a load of goods to Sweden, store it at nominal fee in a free port without paying the Swedish duty, and sell it in lots to Sweden, Finland, Estonia, Lithuania, Germany, Poland, Denmark, Norway and Sweden. The Swedes believe that their country is an ideal distributing point for trans-Atlantic shipments to this part of the world.

Swedish and Finnish experts are working on plans to build a ferry from Stockholm to Hangö, in Finland, by which whole rains may be carried on 7000 ton ferries to Finland and eventually to Russia. Thus Stockholm virtually would become a Russian seaport.

Girl 'Tramps' Are In Custody, After Trying Experience

San Francisco, Sept. 30.—The great adventure is over for Margaret Trent, 17, of 709 East 62d street, Seattle, and Margaret Jones, 16, of 650 West 82d street, same city.

The two girls were picked up by the police today at the Arlington hotel, where they had been staying for the past few days.

When taken to the juvenile detention home they told a tale of "roughing it" which would have done justice to a pair of pioneers.

They left their homes in Seattle two weeks ago, Thursday, with only \$5. They walked "picked up" auto rides with kindly-disposed tourists, slept with the skies as the ceiling, picked up meals whenever possible, fished in mountain streams for their breakfasts, and finally reached their goal.

Both girls had lined up positions, but said they would not be sorry to go back home, although they prized highly their experience.

Ira Simpson, a third girl, accompanied them as far as Portland, but became homesick and returned to Seattle.

J. Bassett Moore Is U. S. Representative On Agency of War

Washington, Sept. 30.—Secretary of State Hughes today announced the appointment of J. Bassett Moore as the American member of the international commission of jurists which meets at The Hague December 10 to consider changes in international law as applied to the agencies of warfare.

The appointment was announced as being "pursuant to the provision of the resolutions adopted by the conference on the limitation of armaments."

Secretary of the Navy Denby has designated Admiral W. L. Rodgers to proceed to The Hague at the time of the meeting to act as naval adviser to Judge Moore.
