

"LIVE LONGER" IS SLOGAN FOR HEALTH PROGRAM

Exposition to Be Staged at The Auditorium Oct. 26 to Nov. 4 for Aid of the Whole State.

"Live a little longer" is the slogan of the Oregon health exposition, to be held in The Auditorium October 26 to November 4, inclusive, under the auspices of the state board of health and the city health bureau, with the cooperation of various medical, health and civic organizations.

The exposition is to be for the benefit of the people of the entire state. The purpose of the exposition, in brief, is to promote the health, comfort and happiness of the people of Oregon, through placing before them in a centralized form object lessons in the most approved appliances for hygienic betterments in the home, the shop, office and hospital. There will be special features showing the progress of medicine, surgery, pharmacy, dentistry, sanitation, safety, care of the sick and social service.

There are to be 100 booths for special exhibits. The cost of the exposition is to be borne by rentals of these commercial booths, and a small admission fee will be charged.

The United States government health service will take part. Police and fire departments will cooperate. State institutions and hospitals and various private health refuges will be represented.

Educational exhibitors will include: State board of health, city bureau of health, Visiting Nurse's association, T. R. association, Oregon Social Hygiene society, Public Welfare bureau, St. Vincent's hospital, Portland sanitarium, University of Oregon Medical school, School of Social Work and Physical Education, People's Institute, Infant Welfare association, Portland public schools, Catholic charities, Oregon Agricultural college, State Graduate Nurses association, State League of Nursing Education, the Boys' and Girls' Aid society, W. C. T. U., Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., Neighborhood house, Reed college, Academy of Medicine, State Medical association, State Dental association, State Accident association, National Guard, American Red Cross, Oregon Parent-Teacher association and Portland Turn Verein.

PATERNITY CASE IS 'WON' BY INFANT

Judge, it seems. A tiny child was eloquent testimony of his innocent helplessness, and, so translated, proved cogent evidence when the judge came to draft his opinion.

"The only innocent party in this whole deplorable controversy is that baby," observed the court, with a glance in the direction of the infant, snuggled in the arms of a nurse. "but in the clamor and cries of the public the child has been almost forgotten. My sole hope is to save this

innocent youngster from further disgrace."

Mrs. Tiernan sat quietly weeping, her head buried in her hands. This was not the same Mrs. Tiernan who petulantly leaped from her chair and shrieked a shrill defiance at every adverse move of the defense witness during those harrowing days of trial last week.

"This wasn't the same impulsive woman who stamped her tiny foot, beat her bruised fists on the counsel table and repeatedly screamed 'Liar, liar!' at the man who was repudiating her with every word that he uttered on the witness stand."

Here was a new, strange Mrs. Tiernan, disclosing an unsuspecting face in an amazingly myriad-sided personality. All of that dynamic petulance of temper had evidently spent itself. All of that palpable bitterness had apparently been burned away in the white heat of those torturing days. And there remained only this remarkable placidity, tempered by the abject despair of a woman who realizes that her moral crucifixion of herself had been all for naught.

Voluntarily she had stripped herself of the last vestige of virtue before the glowing gaze of a morbid public.

BLIGHT IS CAST

She had confessed to the world the most grievous misconduct that a depraved mind could conceive. She deliberately willed to cast the blight of illegitimacy on her own child and publish her disgrace broadcast. Why? That she might compel the man to pay. That she might force him to acknowledge the paternity of the child of their transgressions, and the man was set free.

An appreciation of the utter futility of it all seemed to engulf her as she listened to the judge pronounce the first ominous words that forecast her gallant defeat. Wearily she raised her gloved hands and plunged his face into her handkerchief, apparently overwhelmed with remorse. The limp manner in which her hands hung down at her side, the weariness with which she relaxed in her chair, all foretold the imminence of a complete nervous collapse.

SLEEPS TO FLOOR

So it was that, while leaving the courthouse, she suddenly slumped to the floor without a murmur of warning. After a few moments, she was resuscitated and carried to her home.

By a strange coincidence, the judge's opinion in this case follows immediately upon the decision of that other celebrated paternity action—the Stillman case. And there are features of similarity in both decisions. Just as in the Stillman case, Judge Ducomb avers that "The presumption of fact of legitimacy is one of the strongest known to the law, and of course cannot be overturned except by evidence which is stronger. The burden of proof is on the party charging illegitimacy. The prevailing presumption that a child born in wedlock is legitimate is a just and salutary rule that should not be regarded lightly."

Medical Service Offered Free to Deserving People

Deserving people of the state, without funds for needed medical attention if they find their way Tuesday to a member of the Homeopathic Medical society of Oregon, will be given treatment and advice free.

October 3 is set aside each year as National homeopathic clinic day, when physicians and surgeons of that school give their services to those who need them. Incidentally, also, the state society meets Tuesday morning at the Benson hotel for a two-day convention. Portland people wishing treatment on Tuesday should call the physicians at their meeting place.

Homeopathic physicians claim 40 per cent of the people of this country are converts to their school. Over 300,000 people in Michigan take homeopathic treatments, they said, and President Harding himself is an enthusiastic patient.

The homeopaths have over 100 hospitals in the country, and in most of these special clinics will be held on Tuesday with famous physicians gathering in the larger cities. The Homeopathic school is founded on the principles laid down by Samuel Hahnemann a century ago of "Similia Similibus Curantur."

Bird Creek Meadows Road Is Being Built

The new road to Bird Creek meadows stretching southeast from Mount Adams' snowline, now being constructed by the U. S. forest service from Guler, Wash., has now reached Bird creek and has begun the climb into the meadows. Supervisor Adam Wright of the Columbia national forest, who has just made an inspection of the project.

Work is also under way on the extension of the Morrison creek road to Cold Springs.

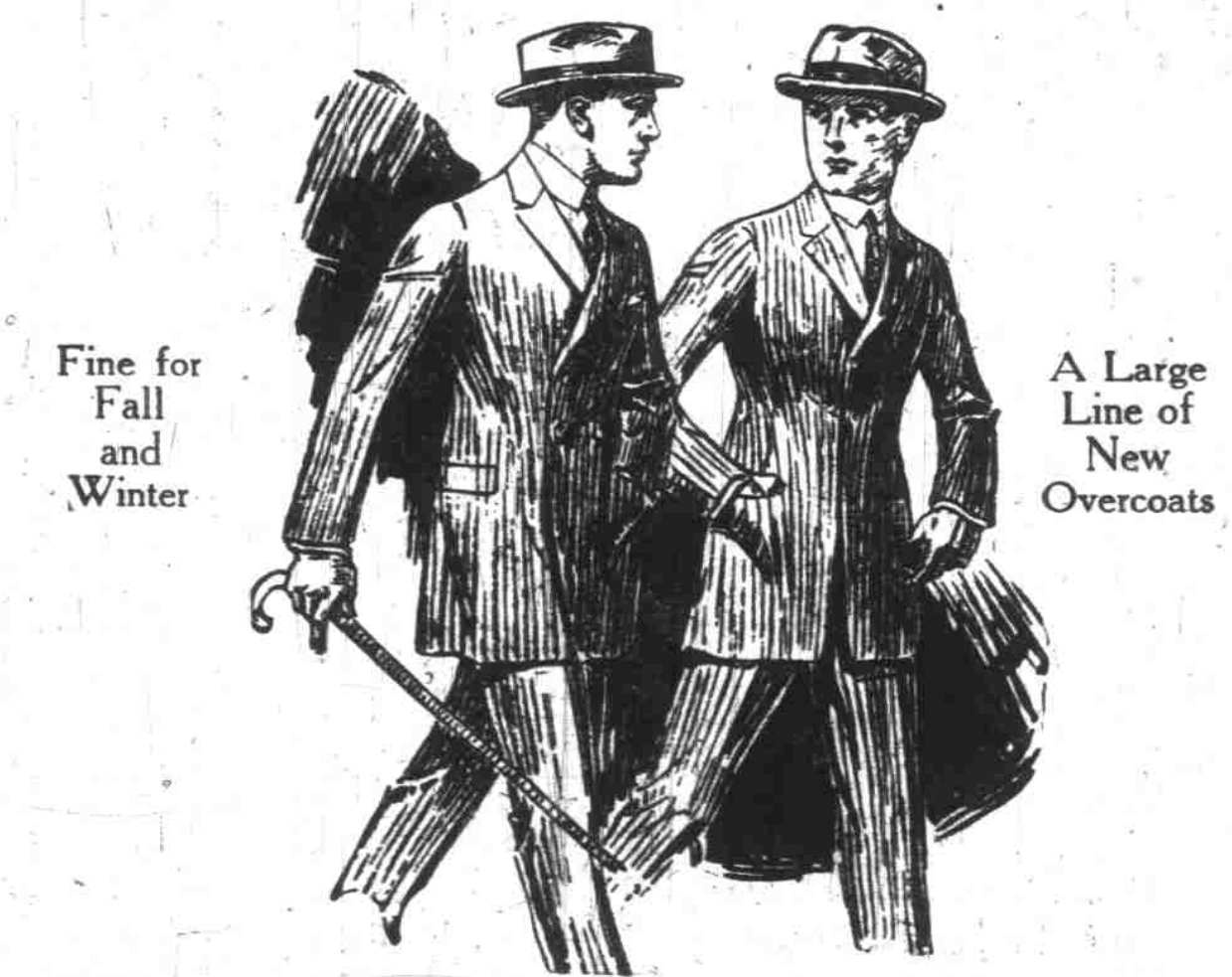
