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BORAH RECEIVES OVATION ON HIS ARRIVAL IN BOISE

Boise, Idaho, Oct. 5.—Wearing the old Borah smile, but not the famous black slouch hat, United States Senator W. E. Borah marched into the Owyhee hotel late Wednesday night at the head of more than a hundred Boise men who motored to Nampa to meet him. Several hundred political and personal friends were waiting at the hotel to greet him on his first visit home in two years. For more than an hour he was the center of a veritable mob of friends. Borah announced he would open headquarters at the Owyhee hotel and remain in Boise several days looking into the political situation. Relative to his attitude on recognition of the Russian soviet government, he said:

"I desire very much to go into this matter for the benefit of the acquaintances while here, and shall probably speak on that subject when I address the teachers' institute Thursday night. I firmly believe that such recognition is contrary to our work only for welfare and good of all concerned."

Senator Borah is undecided at present as to the length of his stay in Boise and Idaho. "I have promised," he said, "to go to Washington state as a national speaker for the Republican campaign this fall and am supposed to return to Indiana to assist Senator Beveridge if I have sufficient time. Meanwhile I will be in Boise to receive friends."

Senator Borah was the guest at an informal noon luncheon at the Chamber of Commerce today.

Man Is Sought on Liquor Sale Charge

Determination to pursue and prosecute Henry Pettit, New Grand Ronde Indian, who escaped from federal prohibition agents at the time of the slaying of Glenn H. Price and Grover Todd on a charge of selling moonshine whiskey, was reached today by Prohibition Director Linville's office. As a result a formal complaint charging Pettit with the sale of liquor was signed before United States Commissioner Frazer by Earl Marshall, one of the agents in New Grand Ronde at the time of the shooting. Pettit escaped at the time of the shooting and is still at large.

Norwegian Church Men Will Oppose Educational Bill

Opposition to the proposed compulsory educational law was voiced this morning at the conference of Norwegian Lutheran churchmen of the Oregon circuit, in session at Our Savior's Lutheran church, East 16th and Grant streets. The delegates decided not to pass a resolution as a body in opposition to the bill, but were unanimous in their determination to fight the bill on "the Americanism issue," holding that the bill was an attack on the religious liberty guaranteed by the federal constitution.

Brush Prairie, Wash., was chosen as the site for the next conference, six months hence, and the following of officers were elected: President, the Rev. H. J. Thorpe of Bethlehem Lutheran church, Portland; vice president, the Rev. Carl Losen of Astoria; secretary, the Rev. S. Stensteth of Bend; treasurer, the Rev. F. C. Knutsen of Portsmouth Lutheran church, Portland.

The Woman's Missionary Federation meeting Wednesday night was largely attended, and a large offering was received for the advancement of the work. The principal address was given by Professor O. J. Ordal, president of the Pacific Lutheran college. The conference adjourned at 5 o'clock this afternoon.

Gold Beach-Agnes Forest Road Need Is Held Important

The most important road need in the Siskiyou national forest in Southwestern Oregon is a road between Gold Beach and Agnes, a little way up the Rogue river, says T. P. Flynn, forest examiner, who has just returned from a trip through the forest with Supervisor E. H. MacDaniels. This would make Agnes more accessible and would be a great thing for the settlers besides being important from an administrative standpoint, Flynn said.

A suspension bridge is to be built across the river at Agnes within the near future, according to Flynn, in which the settlers will cooperate with the forest service to some extent.

Pendleton Pastor Goes to Spokane
