

WALTER TOOZE FIRES SHOT AT REMARKS OF 'H. A.'

Walter L. Tooze Jr., chairman of the Republican state central committee, takes verbal umbrage at the remarks of "H. A." published in The Journal in behalf of the candidacy of Walter Pierce for governor. In response to this letter he has indicated a "call down" in his habitual calm and logical dictation, which he has forwarded for publication. It is as follows:

In tonight's Journal, your correspondent appearing innocently under the designation of "H. A." undertakes to defend Walter Pierce and to smoke out the Republican state chairman upon the issues of this campaign. We take pleasure in being "smoked out" upon the paramount political issues.

Mr. Pierce, during the primary campaign and afterwards, stated backing the question of tax reduction was the paramount issue. We agreed with him that that is the paramount issue, but while Mr. Pierce was weeping over this deplorable condition, for which he, as a legislator, was responsible, without offering any rational solution of the problem, the Republicans of Oregon were giving careful and serious consideration to the same and met in Portland in a state conference and there placed before the people of Oregon a constructive policy for tax reduction. Unfortunately, we do not have a "million dollar angel" to provide the state is invited, so that we might take the people into our confidence and give it the details of this pledged party policy.

But Mr. Pierce deserted the tax issue. Mr. Hall entered the field and his removal was necessary to the interests of Mr. Pierce, so to gather votes and find the one responsible, the Democratic party, sponsoring another issue as the paramount issue, according to the Republican party. Mr. Hall. Now we find him changing heart again. At Albany Mr. Pierce said: "There is only one problem on issue, before the voters of Oregon to vote, that is the tax problem. Nothing counts." We are again deceived by him, but why this change of heart? Is it because he has read the Republican platform? Does he now renounce the school bill as "the paramount issue"? Is he double-crossing Mr. Hall? Please, Mr. Incognito, remove your veil and enlighten us that the people may know it is hard to keep up with the various "jumps" of Mr. Pierce and his paramour issue.

The compulsory educational bill is not a party issue; to make it a party issue would be an insult to the intelligence of the Oregon electorate. Under our system the will of the people as expressed at the polls is supreme; that question is now before them for decision, without regard to political affiliations and the Republican state chairman, like "Mr. Incognito" and all other "H. A.'s," will go to the polls election day and vote upon this question according to the dictates of his own conscience and not by reason of a promise or votes, nor under the lash of a party whip.

Mr. Pierce is falsely charging the executive with responsibility for high taxation, knowing his claim to be false, as does everyone else who reads it. A thought, at the "million dollar banquet" at Albany, Mr. Pierce weeping said: "I came to this state 40 years ago when I was a wandering boy. I have been in public office more than half the time I have been in the state." It is to be noted here that a Republican state chairman, elected by Mr. Pierce in the Oregon legislature, and particularly during the time when he claims taxes are raised rapidly.

Will "Mr. Incognito," or "Mr. Pierce's Million Dollar Angel," please point out the measure which he introduced in the legislature, or even advocated, that had for its object the reduction of taxes, or which tended constructively to check the increase which the records will show, he was instrumental in causing both by his voice and vote?

Mr. Pierce's tax reduction talk, like his fight on the compulsory school bill as the paramount issue, is the molasses of the demagogue to catch fly votes. Please "Mr. Incognito," if you want real interesting reading upon tax increases, "smoke out" Walter Pierce upon the public record as a legislator. I imagine it would make interesting reading. Let's go.

Bondsmen Get Back Money Put Up for Lightner

Bond of \$2000 on Dave Lightner, alleged narcotic peddler, which was forfeited last summer when Lightner fled to the Orient to escape prosecution, was ordered refunded to the bondsmen in an order signed this morning by Federal Judge Wolverton. The bondsmen are C. M. Sienosky and A. Molesworth.

United States Attorney Humphreys did not resist the motion, as the bondsmen have borne all the expense necessary to return Lightner here for trial. Although the bond was returned, Judge Wolverton refused to release Lightner from the bond, so that Lightner is now held in the county jail in default of \$15,000 bond instead of \$10,000, as was generally believed. When it was learned that Lightner had fled last summer Judge Wolverton set bail at \$10,000 on a bench warrant.

No date has been set as yet for Lightner's trial, as the rushing of business in the prosecutor's office, it is probable that a trial date will not be asked for until some time next month.

Death Lurks in Moonshine Jug, Court Declares

Death lurks in the moonshine liquor jug. A gallon of the beverage is sufficient to kill a half dozen people. The only way to keep people from manufacturing it is to inflict penalties that will prevent them from doing it.

These are the "hot shots," which Federal Judge C. E. Wolverton directed Attorney Frank Longenecker, this morning, after the attorney made a plea for leniency for his client, Ben Pugliese. The court had just fined Pugliese \$250 for having a gallon of moonshine liquor in his possession. The judge finally consented to reduce the fine to \$200, when it was explained that Pugliese was a poor man with a large family.

Three bootleggers who appeared before the court this morning on charges of selling liquor did not fare quite so severely as Pugliese. They were H. C. Porter, J. H. Harris and George Emery. Fines of \$150 were imposed in each case.

City Commissioner Bigelow Is Out to Seek His Reelection

City Commissioner Bigelow will be a candidate for reelection at the city election November 7, when he will be in office continuously as a commissioner since the adoption of commission government.

Bigelow was one of the first proponents of the public market and during his term and since the establishment of the market has had charge. Also he has had charge of the fire bureau, the street cleaning bureau and the city's finances.

For some time he has been debating the reason for his reelection and for this reason his announcement was more or less of a surprise.

Vernonia Logging Activities Open Within Few Days

Logging activities have started on the Kansas City Coal & Coke company property near Vernonia and several trainloads of logs will be ready for movement over the Portland, Astoria & Pacific railroad when operation is started about the middle of the month, according to announcement made today by A. J. Davidson, general manager of the S. P. & S. system, lines depot his return from an inspection trip over the road.

Davidson was accompanied on the trip by C. A. Vermillion, assistant to the president; Robert Crosby, comptroller; E. E. Little, superintendent of car service; G. B. Lintner, construction engineer, and C. Riffled, superintendent of maintenance of way.

Mr. Stanton died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Cook, 224 E. 12th, father of Edmond, Alberta, was with him. The accident occurred on a side hill, the car turning over. Mr. Stanton's work was broken. Interment was in Rose City cemetery.

WALLOWA COUNTY FAIR DRAWS 4000, NEW HIGH RECORD

Enterprise, Oct. 6.—Under cloudless skies, the Wallowa county fair had the largest attendance in its history today, more than 4000 people being on the grounds.

A long program of races and contests is given daily and the exhibits are large and varied and numerous than for years.

The first days of the fair were crowded with spectators and the attendance was large, as the country has formed the habit of making the fair the great gathering of the year.

Premiums for exhibits and prizes for races total \$2000. The competition for precinct or community exhibits, Lottine won first prize, Joseph second, Promise third, Wallowa fourth and Imnaha fifth.

Guy and Manfred Cash of Grangeville are among the leading contenders for the prize awarded by the fair association to the winner of the bucking contest. Chris Tippetts, winner of the Hamley saddle at last year's contest, suffered injury in the relay race Wednesday and another rider was substituted for the remainder of the race, in which four strings are running. Joe Candler of Lostine was the winner of the Ford relay race.

GRANDSTANDS PACKED AT BODEO IN KLAMATH FALLS

Klamath Falls, Oct. 6.—The second day of the Southern Oregon rodeo opened here today beneath smiling skies and with packed grandstands. Buddy Sterling and Ray Bell of Pendleton fame are running neck and neck for first honors in the bucking contest. Bell won first yesterday in the calf-roping, thirty-seven riders rode yesterday, and the same number are riding today. Finals will come Saturday. Holbrook's relay string is in the lead in the three-day race. Klamath has declared a holiday to celebrate the rodeo and plans are being laid for a bigger and better show for July 4.

Tank Car Explodes In Wreck; Flames Burn Whole Train

Fond Du Lac, Wis., Oct. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Twenty-one cars of a Soo railroad freight train are in the ditch near Neenah, reports reaching here today stated. One of the cars derailed was a tank car loaded with gasoline. This exploded and the flames rapidly spread to the entire line of cars. All will be destroyed, it was stated. No one was injured in the wreck.

Alleged Attempt At Wreck Fails

Los Angeles, Oct. 6.—(I. N. S.)—A supposed attempt on the part of railway strike sympathizers to wreck Southern Pacific trains on the Valley line near Puente was thwarted today when employees of the company discovered that the railway signal wires along the track had been cut. A suspect was arrested near Puente and held incommunicado. Traffic over the line was halted today while repairs were being made to the signals.

Shopmen Lose Two Points by Rulings

Chicago, Oct. 6.—(U. P.)—Federal Judge Wilkerson denied the motion of 400,000 railroad shopmen for an immediate rehearing of the Daugherty injunction, before three circuit court judges. The court also denied the request of the defense for a bill of particulars at this time.

FOREST EXAMINER ON JOB

Thornton T. Munger, forest examiner in the forest management division of the U. S. forest service, returned to his desk this morning after an absence of several months spent in regaining his health after a siege of septic sore throat early last spring. Munger spent the greater part of the summer at the beach and in the mountains.

DAY'S RECEIPTS OF BALL GAME GO TO CHARITY

(By United News)

New York, Oct. 6.—The entire proceeds of Thursday's world series game, amounting to \$10,000, will be turned over to charity, Commissioner Landis declared in a statement several hours after the game.

This decision was reached at a meeting with representatives of the Giants and Yankees clubs called because of a demonstration by fans against the action of Umpire Hildebrand in ending the game in the tenth inning with the score 3 to 2.

"Wounded" war veterans and charities of New York city will be given the money, it was stated. The suggestion that the receipts be devoted to this purpose met with the sympathy of Colonel Jack Ruppert, Yankee delegate at the meeting, and was accepted without protest by Charles A. Stoneham for the Giants.

JUDGE APPEARS CALM

Judge Landis met the newspaper reporters in his hotel room, appearing in his shirt sleeves. He seemed quite calm after his rough treatment at the hands of the howling fans in the Polo grounds. He coolly lit a cigarette and then read a prepared statement to the press. His statement followed:

"Under the baseball law the umpires are charged with the sole authority of calling a game on account of darkness. In the exercise of this authority today's game was called by them at the end of the tenth inning. Many of the spectators were of the opinion that the game might have continued. Of course the umpires in the field are in a much better position to judge conditions and their effects upon play.

"But regardless of any question as to whether this decision was erroneous, the two New York clubs, acting for themselves and their teams, decided, with the approval of the commissioner, that the entire receipts of the day's game will be turned over to funds for the benefit of the disabled soldiers and to the charities of New York city."

PLAYERS SHARE INCLUDED

Judge Landis explained informally that the players' share of the proceeds is included in the money to be given to charity. However, the players will still get their percentage of the four games to which they are entitled, their share being taken from another game to compensate for the percentage given up Thursday.

Judge Landis was not in a mood to discuss his treatment at the hands of the crowd just after the game was called. He was called by them at the first part of his statement, that some people appeared to have an idea that he, rather than the umpires, had called the game.

His statement made it clear that the game was stopped by the umpires themselves, however.

REGAINS GOOD HUMOR

The venerable judge's thick white mane was still somewhat tangled, but he had regained his old time good humor.

"How's your stroke, judge?" some one asked, referring to the cane with which the commissioner had laid about him when threatened with violence by the crowd.

"For a moment I forgot that damn stroke," Landis replied. "I nearly got strangled in the mob."

The commissioner had no criticism of Umpire Hildebrand for calling the game on account of darkness. It was the crowd's official derogation, Landis said, to judge when dark was dark. Asked if the players knew beforehand that the game would be called, Landis answered:

"I don't know."

DELINQUENT TAX TOTAL TO REACH MILLION DOLLARS

Taxes delinquent on the second installment for Multnomah county, which should have been paid not later than Thursday probably will reach nearly \$1,000,000. It was estimated today. Sheriff Hurlburt said he would be unable even to make an estimate, but that he was urging his clerks to open all mail as soon as possible and make a total of the money received by check.

Until this is done no positive total on the delinquencies can be prepared. When the doors of the tax receiving department closed at 5 o'clock Thursday night, \$1,093,311.82 had been received. On this second installment \$12,250,847.49 was due. This leaves over \$4,000,000 either delinquent or not yet mailed. The checks received in the mail will account for the most of this, Hurlburt said.

All taxes now delinquent are bearing interest at a rate of 12 per cent per annum. In addition to this penalty, a flat fine of 5 per cent will be levied on all taxes not paid by November 5.

PROMOTER IS GIVEN TEN DAYS IN WHICH TO PLEAD

Ten days in which to plead to charges of obtaining money under false pretences were granted to L. G. Stinger, president of the Northern Development company, who was arraigned before Presiding Judge Stapleton Thursday afternoon. Stinger is said to be the owner of a coal mine in Alaska. He is accused of falsely representing the value of two shares of stock, which he gave to J. W. Morris as security for a \$750 loan. Bail was reduced from \$5000 to \$2000. He was also arraigned on statutory charges involving Segriff Seaberg, pleading not guilty to these charges. His bail on the second indictment was reduced from \$1000 to \$500.

EVANS HEARS MOTIONS

Because of a slight illness which prevented Presiding Judge Stapleton from occupying the bench today and caused him to be confined at his home, Circuit Judge Evans disposed of all ex parte matters and assigned the cases, caring for the customary routine matters in the presiding court.

ATTORNEY IS ARRESTED

Cassius R. Peck, an attorney, was arrested today on a warrant charging him with failing to report a traffic violation of a vehicle registered on his own recognition by District Judge Richard Deich. J. N. Tooney signed the complaint, which charges Peck with failing to report a collision between his automobile and Tooney's automobile August 5 on the Sandy road.

MRS. V. B. COX

Pasco, Wash., Oct. 6.—Mrs. V. B. Cox, wife of the president of the Cox Investment company, died Thursday. She was prominent in civic, social and club life and active in musical circles. Her husband, three sons and a baby daughter survive.

LOUNSBURY RETURNS

H. E. Lounsbury, general freight agent of the Union Pacific system, returned from Bend today, after attending the opening session of the Oregon Irrigation conference. Lounsbury said that there were about 125 delegates from all parts of the state present at this meeting.

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Forest Examiner To Stock Lakes With 10,000 Fish

To act as escort to about 10,000 fish, Forest Examiner H. M. White will leave Sunday for Castle Rock, Wash. The fish, temporarily domiciled in four cans, are being shipped by W. G. Hurlford, state game warden of Washington, for stocking Meta and St. Helens lakes, in the vicinity of Spirit Lake.

After their train ride White will take them automobile 50 miles to Spirit Lake.

Two cans will be packed on a horse and taken seven miles over a trail to Meta lake, and the other two will be back-packed two miles uphill through brush without any trail to St. Helens lake.

"We have been trying all summer to get these fish," said Supervisor Adam Wright of the Columbia national forest. "These two lakes are directly tied into the Spirit Lake recreational area, and persons camping at Spirit Lake usually hike to the other two lakes. Both these lakes have hitherto been barren of fish."

Rainbow trout will be the species used for stocking.

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COURT IS ASKED TO TRANSFER DUNCAN PHONE RATE CASE

Request that the telephone rate suit which Robert G. Duncan, John P. Riley and Dora B. Shreve brought against the Public Service commission and the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company be transferred back to the state circuit court for trial, was made in the federal court Thursday afternoon by Riley and Dora Shreve. The motion will come up for hearing at 10 a. m. October 18.

The movers allege that the suit belongs in the state circuit court, where they first filed it, and that the defendants had no right to have the case transferred to the federal court. Their three motions against the removal, which are general in nature, are: The United States district court does not have jurisdiction; there were no grounds for removal; and the case was improperly removed.

The motion was filed by W. E. Richardson, counsel for plaintiff, who bitterly contested the transfer in the circuit court, when defendants made their demand on the representation that the case belonged in the federal court owing to the diversity of citizenship of the contending parties.

Robert Duncan, who was chairman of the Public Service recall committee, has filed a petition to the city council asking that it return to him \$150 paid as rental for The Auditorium for public meetings.

ENTERED DIVORCE ORDER

Vancouver, Wash., Oct. 6.—An order was entered by Judge Everett Smith Wednesday in the suit of Frances Mitchell for divorce from E. L. Mitchell. The decree grants the plaintiff's \$1500 war saving certificate in her possession, to use the proceeds for court costs and alimony.

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
