

DIVORCE SOUGHT BY MRS. TIERNAN; CRUELTY CHARGED

Sensational Climax Added to Recent Tiernan-Poulin Paternity Case in South Bend, Indiana.

South Bend, Ind., Oct. 7.—A sensational climax to the Tiernan-Poulin paternity case came this afternoon when Mrs. Augusta Tiernan filed action for divorce against her husband, Professor John P. Tiernan of Notre Dame university. Mrs. Tiernan charges cruel and inhuman treatment on the part of her husband and asks the custody of her three children. Professor Tiernan announced that the suit would not be contested.

TRIAL IS RECALLED
Mrs. Tiernan recently brought her third child, "Baby Billie," born last November, into court here and charged Harry Poulin, the campus haberdasher, with being its father. After a dramatic trial in which Mrs. Tiernan bore the most intimate relations of her home life and of her illicit love romance with Poulin, the defendant was found not guilty of being the child's father and was discharged.

During all the trial Tiernan aided his wife in her charges, and it was alleged that they had been reconciled. At the conclusion of the trial, however, in which Judge Chester Ducomb stated he believed the story of the "woman scorned," but refused to hold that Poulin was "Baby Billie's" father, the reconciliation was declared off and Mrs. Tiernan went to the home of her mother in Bronson, Mich.

Notorious Fugitive From California Awaits Deportation

El Paso, Tex., Oct. 7.—(U. P.)—"Arizona Phil" Alquin, alias Benito, a notorious fugitive from California, who has defied American authorities from his hiding place at Juarez, Mex., was to be taken to the Chihuahua state penitentiary tonight to await deportation orders, local police were informed late today.

A second attempt to capture Alquin and bring him to this country, where he was to have been placed under arrest, was frustrated by a mob several nights ago and three members of the kidnapping party were held in prison at Juarez 48 hours as a result.

Secretary Davis And Borah to Aid Poindexter Fight

Seattle, Oct. 7.—(U. P.)—Senators W. E. Borah of Idaho and Ralph Cameron of Arizona, Secretary of Labor J. J. Davis and Tasker L. Oddie of Nevada, compose the imposing list of national figures who are coming to this state during the next few weeks to campaign for Senator Miles Poindexter's re-election.

Senator Poindexter, who has been resting since the primary election, will resume his campaign Monday, remaining in Eastern Washington until the last week of the race.

W. T. Vaughn and Cellars Support Educational Bill

Supporters of the compulsory education bill at the meeting of the Oregon Civic League Saturday at the Hotel Benson were George B. Cellars and W. T. Vaughn. Cellars directed his talk to discussing the attacks being made upon the bill.

Norman F. Coleman retorted that he had expected to hear some arguments in favor of the measure, but none had been made. Richard W. Montague asked Cellars if the bill was not directed at the Catholic schools. The response was that the bill was aimed at the "great good for the American people." Mrs. W. A. Elliot spoke against the bill and W. L. Brewster declared the measure based on "ignorance and prejudice." Other opponents were J. P. O'Hara and E. L. Griffith.

J. H. Sweeney spoke briefly on fire prevention week. A. C. Newell, president, announced that Major Philip Carroll will be the speaker next Saturday, his subject being his recent observations in Russia.

ABERDEEN LEVY LOWER
Aberdeen, Wash., Oct. 7.—Aberdeen's tax levy will be about 31 mills, 2 mills less than a year ago. The council passed the annual budget, fixing the amount to be raised by taxation at \$245,872, \$50,000 less than a year ago. The total valuation of all property of the city on which taxes are to be collected is \$7,947,626, a decrease of \$250,000.

WORLD NEEDS HELP, DECLARES STRAUSS

So it is an effective plan. Politicians of this country best know why America has been kept out of world affairs and it would appear that this country must soon, from a standpoint of political expedience, give the assistance needed.

"Some day America may be faced with the peril of an invader. America will then need help. Can she expect that help if she holds herself aloof from Europe today?"

"America possesses most of the gold reserve of the world, and this fact places her where a collapse of the world's economic structure would bring ruin to this nation. If we want to maintain civilization, all of the civilized countries of the world must stand together. This is not merely my opinion, but the opinion of the majority of the people of Great Britain."

In regard to the present trouble with Turkey, Strauss expressed surprise at the attitude which France had taken in the question, although Italy's move did not seem to be a source of surprise.

It has been 27 years since Strauss visited the Pacific coast, and he said that this trip was made primarily because he believed that the west coast of the United States had a great economic future, particularly since the completion of the Panama canal.

The distinguished visitor expressed interest in the hop production of Oregon, since he is the largest dealer in hops and barley in the world. For several years he has been chairman of Great Britain's hop control board.

His interest in hops and barley is second only to his wheat business. He said that the wheat market at present was firm but that with prohibition on wheat and barley exportation from India lifted, he expected to see these two commodities affected to a great extent.

Strauss has been a member of parliament for 16 years from North Southwark, the great hop producing section of England. He is the senior member of the board of directors of the Northern Grain & Warehouse company, the Port Costa Dock company and the various Strauss organizations of the United States.

Strauss will leave Portland Tuesday and will proceed to New York, where he is scheduled to leave for London, October 21.

Chicago Gangster Leader Shot Dead

Chicago, Oct. 7.—(U. P.)—The bullet-riddled body of George W. Heller, notorious police character, was found by police in an alley here today. Heller had five bullet holes in his back—inflicted, police believe, by one of his enemies in the underworld. Heller was convicted in 1936 for the murder of a man in a saloon in the same district in which his body was found today. He was sent to Joliet and released in 1930, according to police. He returned to his old haunts, where he was a ring leader among gangsters.

Baseball Results Will Be Broadcast At 3:30 P.M. Today

To accommodate baseball fans wishing to get results of the world series between the Yankees and Giants by radio this afternoon, Hallock & Watson will broadcast the returns at 3:30 p.m. This hour has been chosen as it will not interfere with attendance at church services in the morning or the Sunday dinner hour. Bulletins prepared by The Journal will be sent to the Hallock & Watson station and the set started at 3:30 sharp.

That the services of The Journal and Hallock & Watson in sending the returns of the series out by radio is appreciated is shown by a wire received late Saturday night from Hood River. The message reads:

"A large number of baseball fans in Hood River, Wasco and Klokhat counties are loud in their praises of The Journal's radio service in the world series, broadcast by Hallock & Watson."

In some of the more isolated sections local radio fans reported the results many hours before it would have been possible to receive them by any other means. Governor Edwards Demands Arrest of Slayer of Couple

New Brunswick, N. J., Oct. 7.—(U. P.)—Governor Edwards today sent an ultimatum from Trenton that the murderer of the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs. James Mills, leader of the choir of the church of St. John the Evangelist, must be arrested.

"I am standing behind this investigation," said the chief executive at the state capital.

"Too much time already has been lost. I sent Colonel Schwarzkopf, head of the state constabulary, to the scene of the crime with orders to get the murderer and not to come back until he did."

"I want the murderer arrested and punished, whoever he is."

"I expected an arrest yesterday, and am surprised that one has not yet been made."

400,000 Gallons Of Wine, Valued at \$1,000,000, Seized

San Francisco, Oct. 7.—Prohibition agents making up a raiding party reported to headquarters this afternoon that 400,000 gallons of wine, valued at approximately \$1,000,000, had been seized at four Sonoma county wineries. A number of arrests were made at the wineries and at a half dozen bootlegging places raided. Two of the wineries are located at Healdsburg, one at Cloverdale, and one at Oakdale.

It is believed the raid followed an investigation of alleged infractions of law by large wineries following the revelation that dry agents had been "grafting" on the wine men to the reported extent of \$100,000. Two dry agents are under arrest in this connection and two are sought.

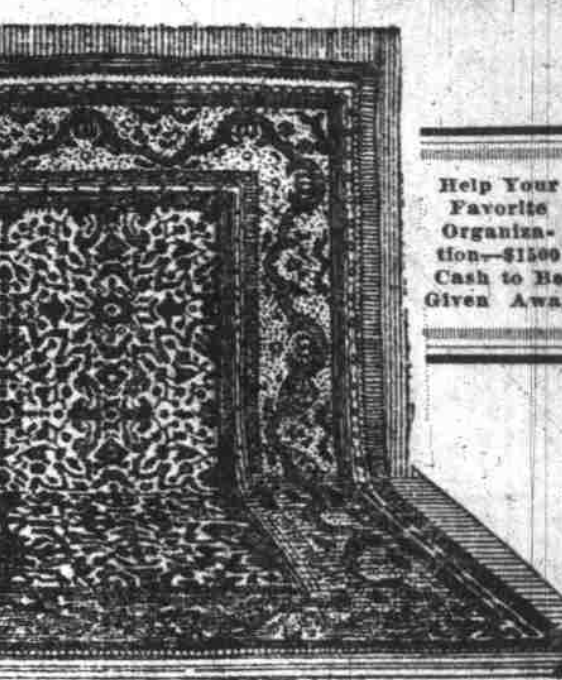
