

MAN BEATEN FOR REFUSING CHARGE AGAINST HOSPITAL

Investigation was begun Monday by Stanley Myers, district attorney, into an attack by a Gresham mob Sunday night on Michael P. Brennan, Portland ex-convict, while he was distributing pamphlets defending St. Vincent's hospital, a Catholic institution, against attacks made on it by former Sister Lucretia at a meeting in the Gresham Masonic hall.

The meeting was announced as being for men only and was largely attended. The former Catholic sister, it is understood, made charges of a gross nature against the hospital management.

Brennan appeared at the entrance of the hall distributing handbills to those who entered or passed by. The bills bore statements contradictory to those made by the former sister and carried a large number of names of prominent physicians of the city, virtually all of whom are of the Protestant faith.

One of the bills was taken to the stage and read, causing a considerable stir in the hall.

Where is he? some shouted and the entire audience made a rush for the door.

Brennan took to his heels and ran into a grocery store, followed by the mob. He told the district attorney that he called the operator and wanted to put in a call to Portland but was informed she was under orders to refuse any calls from him. Falling, he said, to get any assistance over the telephone, he ran from the store and was overtaken.

According to his story to Myers, the crowd knocked him down, beating him severely.

Myers indicated Monday night that so far as he has learned, the distribution of the handbills was not sponsored by any Catholic organization.

Deputy Sheriff Christofferson and Beeman went to Gresham Monday and questioned the citizens on the way. Christofferson stated that so far as he could see, Brennan's story of the affair appeared to be true. He said he would make further investigations with Myers to determine who was responsible for the trouble.

who is also subject to attacks of epilepsy, said:

"Cliff Hayes is innocent. If any one did the shooting it was a boy who wildly hated my father."

At the Hayes cottage, Joseph Hayes Jr., elder brother of Clifford, said:

"Because of the political situation the authorities had to find a 'goat.' They picked on Clifford. My Cliff knows nothing about the revolver. Last night the detectives searched our house and took away two pistols. One was a four for the Fourth of July pistol shot. The other was a little .22 caliber pearl-handled revolver with a broken trigger, that couldn't possibly fire an automatic shot."

STATEMENT ISSUED

Hall and Mrs. Mills were killed with .22 caliber automatic bullet.

Thomas H. Hagerly, a Democratic state committee man, appeared today as counsel for the accused boy. After a short interview with the lad, Hagerly said:

"I am convinced my client is innocent. He told me he was not at the scene of the shooting on Thursday night. I believe him. He is a clean, straightforward boy."

Although the authorities shifted uneasily when questioned, it was learned that Schneider had absolutely no doubt that either he or Hayes had cut the throat of Mrs. Mills or had arranged the bodies in the manner in which they were found.

"If I had committed this crime, do you think I would be foolish enough to stay here for three weeks?"

HAYES REMAINS COOL

Remarkably cool, in face of the grave charges that have been lodged against him, Hayes thus expressed himself last night in jail. He continued:

"I don't see how Schneider could have said these things about me. If he really did say them, he lied."

"I cannot believe he was in his right mind when he made the so-called confession."

"Of course I was not subjected to any third degree, and I cannot say what they did to Schneider before he signed the paper. The authorities just kept me awake all night. Every once in a while they would come in and ask me questions."

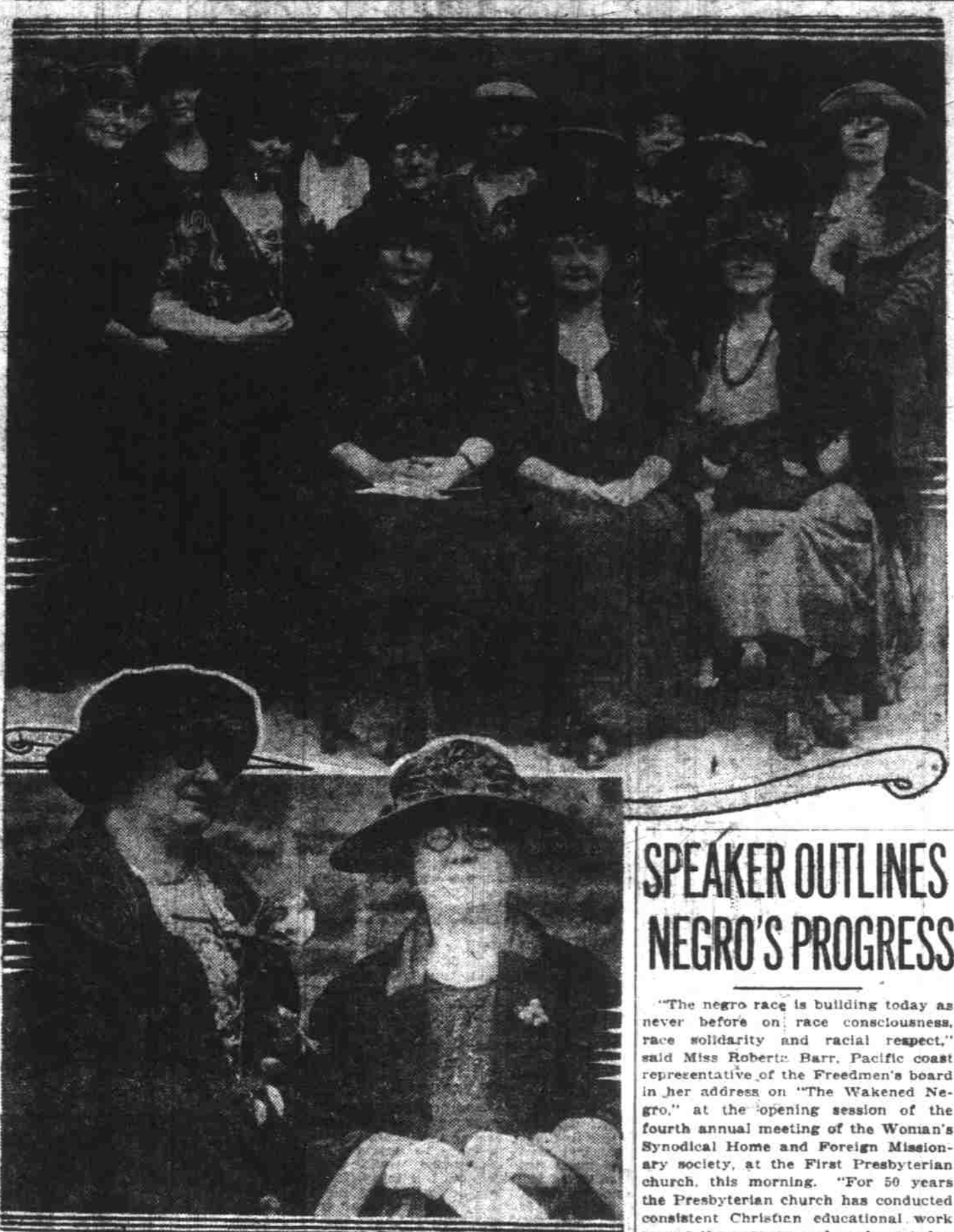
"I am innocent and everyone in New Brunswick knows it."

The Bahmer girl, insisting that Hayes was innocent, said:

"I was out with Schneider until 10 o'clock on the night of September 14, then I went home. My father was intoxicated and he asked me to take a walk with him, so he could sober up. I didn't want to go, but he forced me."

"Cliff Hayes, Schneider and Leon Kauffman were following us all the time. When near the Johnson & Johnson factory, Ray took off his coat and told my father he was going to fight

him if he did anything to me. After an hour we returned home.

"Saturday morning I saw Ray and we went walking. He led me directly to Delussey's Lane. We had never been there before. When we got near the apple tree I saw the bodies. I told Ray there were some people there. He asked me why I didn't mind my own business."

"But we walked over and saw a dead man and a dead woman. Ray looked at them and remarked that the bodies didn't look as though the persons had been killed there. I saw a watch chain on the man's body. It was there when I ran down the lane to get help. The chain was gone when I got back."

Monday I got a letter signed Mrs. Raymond Schneider, Ray's wife. Pearl displayed the note. It read:

"You will pardon my writing you, but I wish you to keep away from my husband. When this case comes to trial, I am going to beat you to it."

Pearl continued:

"That same afternoon Mrs. Schneider came to my house. She asked me to take her to the spot where the bodies were found. I did so. I don't know what her object was."

SAYS BOY IS INNOCENT

"I hope Cliff gets off, because I am sure he is innocent," Mrs. Lamber said. James Mills, husband of the murdered woman, expressed doubt concerning Schneider's confession. He said:

"Ray might have had to say something just to keep from being questioned. I know how it is, for I have been through some grilling myself."

When told that the murders appeared to have been a mistake Mills said:

"A mistake? Who is going to pay for it? I have got to say for the funeral expenses."

When asked her servants and is getting along all right.

"But my family is all broken up. My daughter is in the last year of high school and I cannot take her out. I have to get my own meals and wash my own clothes. My check from the church is immediately indorsed to two physicians who performed an operation on my wife."

There are a number of points that have not been cleared up. According to Schneider, the shooting took place after 10 o'clock Friday morning, September 15. According to persons living in the neighborhood, screams and shots were heard coming from the Phillips farm just before midnight. Instead of after that hour. Other witnesses tell of seeing an automobile, perhaps two, speeding down the lonely little lane leading from the old Phillips farm.

Schneider said nothing about that. Nor did he explain how Mrs. Mills' throat came to be cut nor how it came about that the bodies were carefully arranged with arms folded and torn love letters scattered around.

Here are the summarized points the authorities are trying to clear up and the questions are being asked in New Brunswick today:

How could an excited boy, firing on an impulse to avenge a friend, shoot so true as to send one bullet crashing into the doctor's brain and put three bullets into the woman's forehead, not more than an inch apart?

Why should Mrs. Mills' MILLS?

Why should Mrs. Hayes have shot the woman he thought to be Pearl Bahmer when vengeance was desired by his friend only on the step-father?

Why were the love letters of the pair scattered about their bodies, as if to tell the world that a flaming vengeance had laid them low?

Woerndle Loses Point in Move To Disbar Him

Salem, Oct. 10.—In overruling a demurrer interposed by Joseph Woerndle, Portland attorney, in the disbarment proceedings instituted against him, the supreme court this morning in effect holds that the accusations brought against Woerndle constitute sufficient cause to justify his disbarment, according to attorneys here.

The demurrer filed by Woerndle to the complaint of the grievance committee of the Multnomah Bar association and the state bar association asserted that the facts alleged in the accusation do not disclose any legal grounds for his disbarment.

This demurrer is overruled, and Woerndle is given until October 25 to file an answer to the accusations.

An attorney who commits perjury, whether committed inside or outside of his professional employment, is subject to suspension or disbarment, without his having been first indicted and convicted, was the opinion of the court, which was written by Justice McCourt.

"An accusation is sufficient which alleges the facts constituting such perjury," the court held, "and it is not necessary that he made false affidavits in securing a passport for himself which he is said to have given to one Hans W. Boehm, alleged German spy, to assist the latter in returning to Germany from this country."

STATION MOVE DENIED

Salem, Oct. 10.—Authority to move the station at Hugo in Josephine county was denied the Southern Pacific company in an order handed down by the public service commission today. The proposed move was objected to by Hans W. Boehm, alleged German spy, who said that residents would be inconvenienced.

TEST MONY BEGUN IN FEDERAL AGENT DEATH CASE TRIAL

Dallas, Or., Oct. 10.—Taking of testimony in the trial of Philip Warren, Grand Ronde Indian, charged with first degree murder for the killing of Grover C. Todd, federal prohibition agent, began here this afternoon at 1:15 o'clock. The jury was selected this morning, after the state had exercised one peremptory challenge and the defense four.

Todd and Glenn H. Price, also a federal agent, were killed September 3, at New Grand Ronde, after they had arrested Warren and he had escaped and secured a gun. Self defense, it is said, will be Warren's plea.

states that the bill "proposes no religious restriction; it contemplates no limitation of the right of the parent to teach religion to his child in his way and according to his own belief; it raises no issue of religious difference," but that it is "purely a measure to insure that all children by attending the public schools shall be taught alike during their grammar school years, so that their outlook may grow to be an unified outlook for the common weal and for their country and its institutions."

Were it not for the fact that the Ku Klux Klan here is strong and that its candidate came within 500 votes of winning the Republican nomination for governor in the usual type of anti-Catholic fight waged by the Klan, signed by the supporters of the bill that they are not aiming it at Catholics but all denominations would not be so much a subject of controversy. There are more Catholic parochial schools than any other denomination, and the Catholics cannot be convinced that the measure is aimed elsewhere.

In the same official pamphlet, signed by the supporters of the bill, are given the affirmative and negative arguments of the bill "by the Oregon and Washington district of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio and other states."

Some of the leading business men and bankers, several of them Masons, signed another argument against the bill, contending that it is a denial of the right of a parent to choose teachers for his children, a revival of the Prussian method of education and as the system of Bolshevism, which treats the child as the ward of the state.

FEAR DISCORD MAY COME

Presbyterian ministers and other clergymen have appealed with members of the Catholic Civic Rights association in declaring that what the country needs is harmony, not discord. They say that the measure will not accomplish the objects sought, even if enacted.

Who owns your child? The state? Do you? asks the Lutheran group in their official appeal to voters of Oregon. "Who feeds and clothes your child? The state? Not while you are living and able to care for your own. Why do you feed and clothe your child? Because it is your child. If you don't own your own child, what in the wide world do you own? Now you own your own child and are in duty bound to feed and clothe it, you have 'some say' about your child's education and its teacher. The state has a right to compel you to educate your child just as it has a right to compel you to feed and clothe your child. But the state has no more right to choose a teacher for your child and the school it shall attend than it has to tell you where to buy your child's clothing and what style of clothing it must wear."

ALLIED GENERALS MEET IN CONSTANTINOPLE

END OF REIGN NEAR

London, Oct. 10.—(L. N. S.)—Mohammed VI, sultan of Turkey, has definitely tendered his resignation to Mustafa Kemal Pasha, head of the Angora government, but acceptance has been withheld pending the outcome of the armistice negotiations at Mudania, says the Morning Post today.

the curtain will roll back to disclose strong British forces, ready to take advantage of a line of defense that cuts off Kemal's troops from Constantinople and the straits.

The Mudania conference is temporarily adjourned pending the Turkish reply. Allied representatives forced this state of affairs, the French threatening to lead a bolt from the parley if Ismet Pasha did not secure an immediate answer.

PESTILENCE BREAKS OUT

More than 400,000 Greek refugees, women, old men and children, massed in Greece, Thrace and upon islands in the Aegean sea are threatened with death from starvation and exposure. All were driven from their Near East homes by the war between the Turks and Greeks and all are penniless.

The British and French are now turning their entire attention to the relief of the Greek and Armenian refugees. Hundreds of thousands of them will have to be evacuated from Constantinople and Thrace before the peace treaty is signed and the Turkish soldiers occupy both these districts.

To add to the horrors which confront these homeless, penniless, starving hordes, pestilence is decimating them. Medical supplies are lacking and there are only a few nurses and physicians to care for the dying.

FOOD SUPPLY SHORT

It is probable that both England and France will vote a sum of money to be administered by the League of Nations and Commissioners Dr. Fridtjof Nansen and the Near East relief committee to supervise the relief work. Dr. Nansen had wide experience of this work in Russia.

There is a famine and bread shortage throughout Greece and thousands of refugees are compelled to seek shelter in warehouses and barracks and churches.

Dr. Nansen probably will go to Broussa first, then Athens.

The refugees are being concentrated in 12 principal cities. American relief stations have been set up and are now functioning with typical American efficiency.
