The heaviest rainfall reported was 1.50 inches at Chicago, Ili. The weather is much colder in parts of Montana and North Dakota and the adjacent Canadian provinces, and in the District of Columbis, and is much warmer in parts of Nevada and Washington. Relative humidity at Portland: Noon yesterday, 85 per cent; 5 p. m. yesterday, 76 per cent; 5 a. m. today, 94 per cent.




