ters to make the passengers as comfortable as possible.

STILL BURNING
A radio message to the Federal Telegraph company at 7:30 o'clock stated the work of transfer was then well under way.

The same advices stated the liner City of Honolulu had been gutted beyond repair by the fire.

While prior messages had indicated she was in a sinking condition, today's report said she might remain afloat, although it would be two or three days before she could be boarded on account of the heat. She was still smoking and blazing in spots today, and the heat from her twisted steel beams was so terrific it was impossible to approach her closely.

Breaking all speed records, Captain Matt Falk of the West Farallone beat his own estimate of the time required to reach the scene of the fire by an hour. His crew was ready for rescue work the moment the big freighter hove in sight of the circle of small boats which had gathered to await rescue about a mile from the burning ship.

The lifeboats were lying in a wide semi-circle and four boats from the West Farallone were immediately launched and set about picking up the women and children first. At 3 o'clock the first boatload was lifted to the deck of the rescue ship and by 4 o'clock the entire list was safe on board.

Poker Game Raided By Bandits; Pot of \$400 Robbers' Loot

Bend, Oct. 13.—Holding up a poker game in a bunkhouse at Shelby-Hixon camp No. 1, 10 miles south of Bend, two men, wearing strips of a brown sweater tied about their faces to conceal their features, "stripped the pot" of \$400 Thursday evening and drove away in a small car in which they had appeared in camp a few minutes before.

One of the five men sitting in the game had just said, "I'll raise you five," when one of the masked men, who had entered the building without being seen, said, "I'll raise you for the whole pot. Stick up your mitts."

The other bandit held a revolver in a trembling hand. One of the men in the game was ordered to "frisk" his comrades, turning their pockets inside out, while the unarmed bandit swept the money from the table. Then they drove away in the direction of Spring River.

Previous to staging the holdup, the men had cut the telephone wires leading to Bend. Sheriff Roberts was not notified for over an hour after the holdup occurred. Men at the camp started in pursuit shortly after the two disappeared.

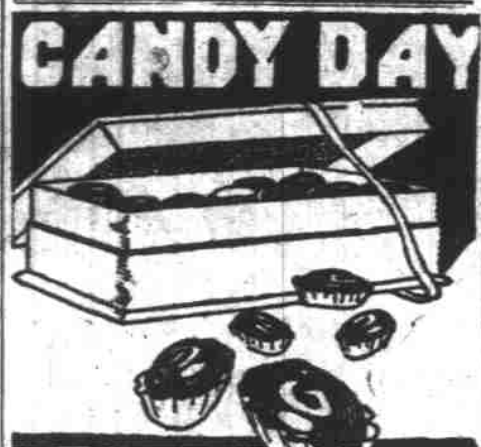
Proposal Is Accepted For Building a Road To Peninsula Timber

Aberdeen, Oct. 12.—At a mass meeting here Thursday night a proposition of John Cain of Fort Angeles to build a railroad from Grays Harbor into the Olympic peninsula was accepted and business men will undertake to carry it through.

Cain proposes that Grays Harbor men raise \$300,000 and the timber owners of the peninsula another \$300,000. With this amount of cash he proposes a bond issue of \$1,500,000 additional, which will build 60 miles of road, the necessary length to reach the peninsula.

If the plan goes through, sufficient timber would be available for Harbor mills to run them 50 years.

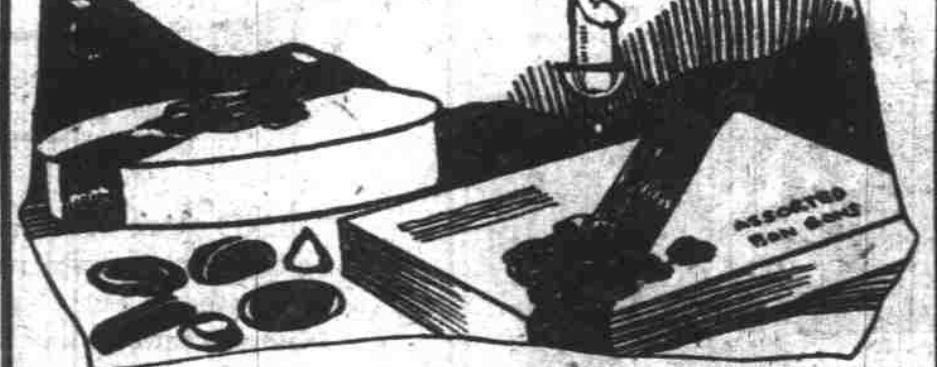

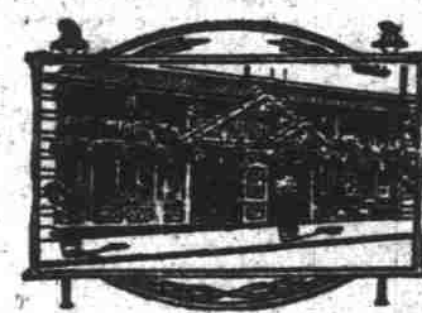
