Oregon Squad Training for "Winged M"

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 12.—Working with a squad of men nearly a fourth of whom are cripples, Shy Huntington is bringing his Lemon-Yellow football gang into shape to meet the heavy Multnomah team Saturday.

Unless some more injuries occur or unless some of the injured men recover sooner than expected, the following lineup will start the game: F. Shields, right guard; Vonderahe, right tackle; Brown, right end; Byler, center; Parsons or Dick Reed, left guard; McKeown, left tackle; Spear, left end; Johnson or Gus Brown, quarterback; King and Jordan, halves; Latham, fullback; Jordan and Kirtley and King and Tergeson, as well as the King-Jordan combination, will probably be used at halfback positions. Bill Johnson may get a shot at center unless Byler does considerable improving, and Zachary is almost sure to be used at guard.

Huntington would make no statement about the coming contest with the "Winged M" Thursday night. He is probably less sure of this game than any he faces, due to the fact that neither Chapman, Chapin, Shields nor Callison will be ready for use until the Whitman game, October 20. His only consolation is that he felt sure that both teams would score.

WASHINGTON AND IDAHO.
TO OPEN CONFERENCE SEASON
University of Washington, Seattle, Oct. 12.—The University of Washington's football warriors will meet the University of Idaho's team in the second conference battle of the season Saturday in the University of Washington stadium.

The coming battle with the Vandals is looked forward to with keen interest as Coach Mathews of the Idaho team was a member of the Washington football coaching staff last season. This will be the first contest for the Idaho eleven since they were admitted to the Pacific coast conference last year.

Washington's goal line has not been crossed so far this season. Coach Enoch Bagshaw's team has piled up 74 points for their opponents none. Coach Bagshaw will use practically the same lineup against Idaho as he used against the Montana team last Saturday. Although the Vandals defeated Whitman 3 to 0 the lineup is still undecided. Coach Mathews has been drilling his men hard during the past week and several changes will probably be made before the Washington game.

With only five lettermen left over from last year's team, Mathews has been working hard trying to develop several of last year's freshman squad.

Coach Bagshaw is playing his last year of college football, as is H. B. Shears and Jim Neal. Dale Vohs and Abe Groff are playing their second year on the gridiron for Idaho.

What "Mathews" is doing is a much debated question on the campus. That Mathews is coach to be feared and respected is a recognized fact on the Washington campus, and Bagshaw is opinion little in regard to the coming clash.

PACIFIC U WILL BATTLE OREGON AGS SATURDAY
Pacific University, Forest Grove, Or., Oct. 13.—Saturday the Pacific Badgers will battle the Oregon Aggies at Corvallis, and they are expecting to make a much better showing this week than they did at Eugene. During the last week Coach Frank has been reorganizing both the defensive and the offensive but will be paid the time stick to the offensive. The team suffered no great injuries in the last game and are on the whole in pretty good shape. They will be considerably out-weighted, however, as the Pacific line will not average more than 175 and the backfield more than 165.

Coach Frank plans to take 20 men to Corvallis. Stanley, half back; Emerson, fullback, and Watrous, quarterback, new men, who have been showing up well, may get a chance to play against the Aggies.

WASHINGTON FROTH TO PLAY

Iowa-Yale Football Game Talk of Pigskin Fans

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—The attention of the football world will be focused upon the Yale-Iowa game Saturday not only from a football standpoint but from a sentimental one. In the first place, it is an East-West match.

In the second place, the teams are coached by brothers, each of whom has an enviable record, not only as a coach but as a former player on the Yale team. Tad Jones, the Yale coach, played quarterback and Howard Jones, the Iowa mentor, played end.

Each has previously coached Yale teams. Howard coaching back in Ted Coy's time. Iowa won the Middle West conference championship last year but at that time Iowa had Aubrey Devine, Slater and Belding, three stars, who are now lost.

FIRST HARD GAME
So far this year neither team has struck stiff opposition, although both have found at that in modern American football something is necessary besides ability to stop pounding into the line. Yale so far has met no line which could hold or punch back her forwards from tackle to tackle. Iowa will bring on Thompson, 200 pounds; Minnick, 190 pounds; Heldt, 196 pounds; Kries, 200 pounds, and Engander, 196 pounds, to stack up against Diller, Cross, Landis, Cruckshank and Storrs, the Yale forwards, who entered the North Carolina game, and whose weights will compare well with those of the Iowa outfit.

In other words, the writer doubts very much whether either team will find much profit in simply pounding into the middle of the line although Yale has a shade the better of it in the openings she makes just on and inside tackle.

JEFFERSON high school football players were returned victorious over the Benson Tech eleven Thursday afternoon on Multnomah Field, 9 to 0.

Benson's penalties and fumbles paved the way for the scoring of the points by Jefferson. In the first quarter, the Blue and Gold scored a place kick from the 25-yard line, after Benson was penalized 15-yards twice. Fullback Stern booted the ball between the uprights.

Jefferson's touchdown was scored in the third quarter, after Wetzel recovered a Benson fumble. Line smashes by Stern and Clark gave Jefferson its touchdown after five downs.

Benson lost its only chance to score in the final quarter through a 5-yard penalty after a nine-yard gain. Maizon then attempted to score via the kick route but failed.

Iowa will have Captain Locke, Miller and Shuttlesworth behind the line. Jordan, if he is fit, will be the best line plunger on the field and even the powerful Iowa line will have trouble in holding him. Locke has more varied possibilities. Outside of the two opposing stars, the backfields are fairly even. Cutler and Hulman are likely to start for Yale as against Kadesky and Hancock. If O'Hearn were in, Yale would have the better of the kicking game. As it is Iowa's kicking should be somewhat more regular. If Heldt, Iowa's center, gets hurt, McIntyre is a first class substitute. Yale is fixed the same way with Landis and Norris. Injuries in the backfield cripple each team but especially Yale with so many injured stars on the side lines. But Yale has a far greater number of extra men available for the line and can keep sending in fresh men if the game develops much kicking and forward passing.

PIT LEADER INJURED
One of the worst blows to Pittsburgh is the continued trouble with its injury that their star quarterback and captain, Holleran, is experiencing. He had the bone scraped last summer but it still bothers him and as Warner has no other field general in his class, it will be pretty serious if Holleran does not round to. With the loss of Stein, his star center and Harmon, one of the best tackles on the gridiron, his line had a hard knock through graduation. Nevertheless he is building up a heavy trunk of forwards with very promising ends and is trying sacks, last year's guard, as center on defense.
