

Beckett Wins Decision in Moran Bout

LONDON, Oct. 12.—Joe Beckett, England's champion heavy weight champion, has at last won a fight. He beat old Frank Moran here Thursday night.

Moran, whose famous "Mary Ann" would have quickly stopped Beckett when Frank was at his best, was no match for Beckett in his present condition. The referee stopped the fight in the seventh round to save Moran from further punishment. Beckett and Moran were scheduled to go 20 rounds, and Beckett may now be the next opponent of Siki, the so-called Sene-galese, as a result of his victory.

Before the bout tentative arrangements were made for the winner to meet Siki, November 23. Georges Carpentier, now recovered from the beating that Siki gave him in Paris, was at the ringside.

While Beckett reversed his usual order and won, Bombardier Wells, who is on the knock out list of most of the heavyweights in the world, fought true to form. He was knocked out by Jack Bloomfield in the sixth round of a scheduled 15 round go.

The fights featured a special heavyweight card at Albert Hall.

The Beckett-Moran fight was a slug-fest from start to finish, both men being on the verge of a knockout several times before the battle was stopped.

Beckett hammered Moran to the floor with rights to the stomach in the second round, but the bell saved him. In the third round Moran punched Beckett to the floor during a net exchange, and in the fourth "Mary Ann" connected. The old overhand swing floored Beckett for the count of seven.

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Rival Heavies to Face Each Other in New York Tonight

New York, Oct. 12.—Billy Miske and Tom Gibbons will be shooting at heavy money tonight when they meet to an official decision at Madison Square Garden and for this reason, among others, we look for one of the greatest heavyweight bouts of the year. Both are championship contenders.

Miske was beaten down in three rounds by Dempsey in Benton Harbor several years ago when a semi-cripple. But he is now bigger, stronger and better than the Mike who first came East years ago to tear Jack Dillon, Battling Levinsky and other near greats into human slithers. He is one of the most interesting comebacks in ring history.

Gibbons has lost only one fight in nine years and that one almost ruined a perfectly good reputation. He was out-slapped by Harry Greb, a ring freak, here last year. Nothing strange about that, for Greb is likely to maul anyone in a limited engagement. But it left Gibbons' ability under a cloud. He must live that one down if he hopes to get anywhere. Likewise, Miske overcame local prejudice growing out of the Benton Harbor affair.

Therefore, tonight's entertainment should be no buck and wing.
