

BANDITS' CODE LEADS TO CACHE OF \$650,000 LOOT

Denver, Colo., Oct. 12.—Stevenson, Poe and others have spun stories of buried treasure like that told by Postal Inspector Roy Nelson, who discovered a cache of \$650,000, part of the loot obtained in the \$1,150,000 mail robbery at Trinidad, Colo., last May, but their stuff was fiction.
Following a source from a tip he would not reveal, he obtained the key to the code directions on a chart taken from the bandits, who are in jail here. The chart gave the location of the buried money on a tract of prairie 20 miles west of Trinidad. Following the cryptic directions given on the chart, Nelson located a lone cottonwood tree. Obeying further directions he found a huge boulder near the tree, sighted through a niche in the stone in line with the junction with a certain lower limb of the tree trunk. This brought a certain clump of cactus into his line of vision.
Nelson dug under the roots of the cactus clump and unearthed the \$650,000 in bills contained in a length of pipe.
While Nelson was digging he saw a lone horseman on the opposite side of an arroyo, who was likewise digging. Nelson declared later that this man probably had received the same tip, but had reckoned wrong because he sized over a wronger than the other, thus throwing him off several hundred feet in locating the proper cactus clump, hundreds of which dot the ground in that vicinity.

Scarf About Neck Makes Him Immune From False Arrest

Eugene, Oct. 13.—Because O. H. Jones, clerk of the Eugene school board, wore a muffler around his neck while riding by automobile with two other Eugeneans from Portland to Salem, he and his party escaped "rounding up" by officers near Salem Wednesday night. The officers were looking for three bandits who had held up and bound E. M. Bellus near Oregon City, stealing his automobile. The Jones party was homeward bound from the Knights-of-Fythias convention. The officers mistook Jones for a woman on account of the scarf, remarked that the car contained two men and a woman, and let the machine go on its way.

Through the radio and aboard, the City of Honolulu was able to apprise the world of the plight fire had brought upon them. Every vessel in the Pacific, between the Hawaiian islands and the mainland, was informed and ready to render all assistance possible. It enabled quick checking of positions which revealed the Thomas, the West Farallone and the Enterprise were vessels in best position to make the rescue run. When the news came that the West Farallone had won the race and the Thomas would carry the passengers to land the Enterprise was able to resume her course.
Throughout the day and night wireless kept the world informed of the steps in rescue and through its means a flow of private messages informed friends on the mainland of the safety of the endangered ones once they were safe aboard the West Farallone.
High praise for the conduct of Captain H. R. Lester and the crew of the City of Honolulu was contained in these private messages.

Poor House Inmate Freed of Charge of Slaying Frenchman

San Francisco, Oct. 13.—August Reif, 85, returned to the poor house today, a free man and with a clear conscience. Reif was arrested Wednesday charged with the murder of his room mate at the poor house, Armond Muller, 80, following a dispute.
"I struck him once, maybe twice, with my walking stick—so," Reif told the police. "But I did not hit him hard enough to kill him. Reif, a German, and Muller, a Frenchman, were accustomed to sit in their bare room at the home and stamp their canes in angry argument over the war."
Reif said Muller threw a cup of water into his face. Reif struck him with his cane and Muller sank to the floor.
Dr. John Clarke, autopsy surgeon, performed an autopsy on Muller's body. Dr. Clarke found that Muller had died from natural causes, aided, perhaps, by excitement and anger during the argument.

5000 Gather to Pay Last Tribute To Marie Lloyd
