

ANTI-SALOONERS WILL CHECK UP ON DRY ENFORCEMENT

A resolution directing an investigation of the records of every district attorney, sheriff and judge to ascertain their attitude and action in the enforcement of the prohibition law, was passed at the annual meeting of the Anti-Saloon league which met at the Y. M. C. A. Thursday.

A campaign will be inaugurated during the next two years against supporting in the primaries any district attorney, sheriff or judge who may seek election who is not aggressively enforcing the law. In the report of W. J. Herwig, superintendent of the work, who was reelected for the ensuing year, it was stated that 206 law enforcement conferences and mass meetings were held during the year.

In the pronouncement of law enforcement adopted by the board it was declared that bootlegging and moonshining have become one of America's greatest industries and that they breed crime and political corruption and that "it is obvious that a county or state which does not deal effectively with this form of lawlessness either is feeble or possesses a government corrupted or scandalously inefficient." An appeal is also made to citizens to organize themselves into law and order leagues and assist in creating a stronger sentiment for law enforcement.

Nurses at St. Vincent's hospital report today the seven victims of a collision between two Depot-Morrison streetcars at 19th and Gilean streets Thursday afternoon are apparently out of danger and resting quietly.

The injured were Mrs. Bertha Baron, No. 787 Northrup street, chest injuries and cuts and bruises; Mrs. Georgia Klaus, No. 429 Columbia street, injury to leg; Mrs. N. D. Watson, No. 108 Fremont street, bruised leg; Mrs. Della Carlson, No. 700 Irving street, cuts and contusions; Harry Hale, No. 681 Thurman street, conductor of one car, cuts on head and knee; J. C. Kennedy, No. 1112 Vaughn street, badly shocked, and Miss Georgiana Giesler, No. 631 Elm street, injured leg.

One streetcar was going east on Gilean street at a high rate of speed and after jumping the track on the curve crashed into the car going north on 19th street.

Officials of the P. R. L. & P. company say leaves on the track made it impossible for the brakes to hold the car.

New Industries to Be Goal of Sheridan

Sheridan, Oct. 13.—Plans for development and extension of the city's industries were made at a meeting of the Sheridan Boosters' club here, addressed by Dan C. Freeman, manager of the Associated Industries of Oregon, and Chairman E. N. Welch of the Committee of One Hundred of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. Efforts to secure a laundry and a sawmill were begun.

ASSERTS CHAOTIC AFFAIRS DUE TO MORAL BREAKUP

Present chaotic conditions in the world, especially in Russia, Turkey and China, are directly traceable to the desire of nations to attain intellectual and commercial instead of religious progress, declared W. C. Pearce of New York city, associate general secretary of the World's Sunday School association, upon his arrival in the city today. Pearce will be the main speaker of the closing session of the Oregon Sunday School association convention at the First Methodist church tonight.

Pearce arrived in Portland this morning after a 14 months' tour of Asia, Africa, Australia and the Orient in the interest of the organized Sunday school work.

The leader announced this morning that he would review chaotic conditions in Russia, Turkey and China tonight. He attributed present conditions to a breakdown in morals, not to a breakdown in economics.

"Lincoln and Bismarck were contemporaries," he declared. "Likewise were

Francis Willard and Nietzsche contemporaries. We have seen the results. The World was started by Germany was contemporary with prohibition in America. The evidence is plain that a nation does just what its youth is taught to do."

Pearce said he found the entire world interested in education, with increased appropriations in practically all centers. In the Philippine islands he found nearly a million in the schools against 5000 about 20 years ago.

Pearce is not in favor of religious education being carried on in the public schools of America. "Because of the religious liberty guaranteed us, the work of religious education must be done by the church and not through tax-supported schools."

"The day is not far distant," he continued, "when all people, regardless of their religious beliefs, will look to the public schools for the intellectual training of their children and to the church school for the religious training."

Fire Prevention Parade Will Be Held on Saturday

Fourth; south on Fourth to Columbia; where the parade will disband.

The fire department will have 30 floats in the parade. An airplane will fly above the parade and drop fire prevention literature. The plane will be piloted by Strobe, Graham & Leon, and from it C. S. Woodruff will make

photographs of the parade and the street crowds.

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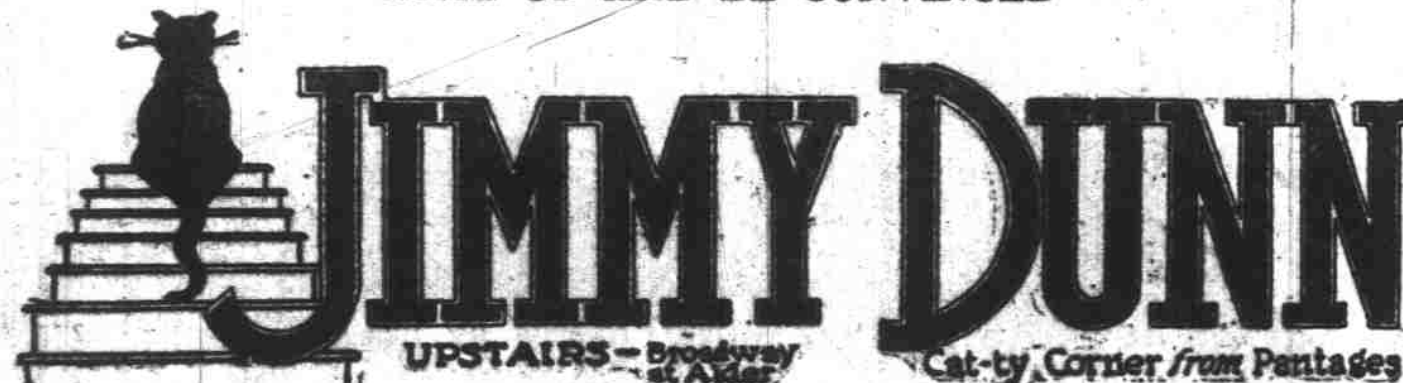
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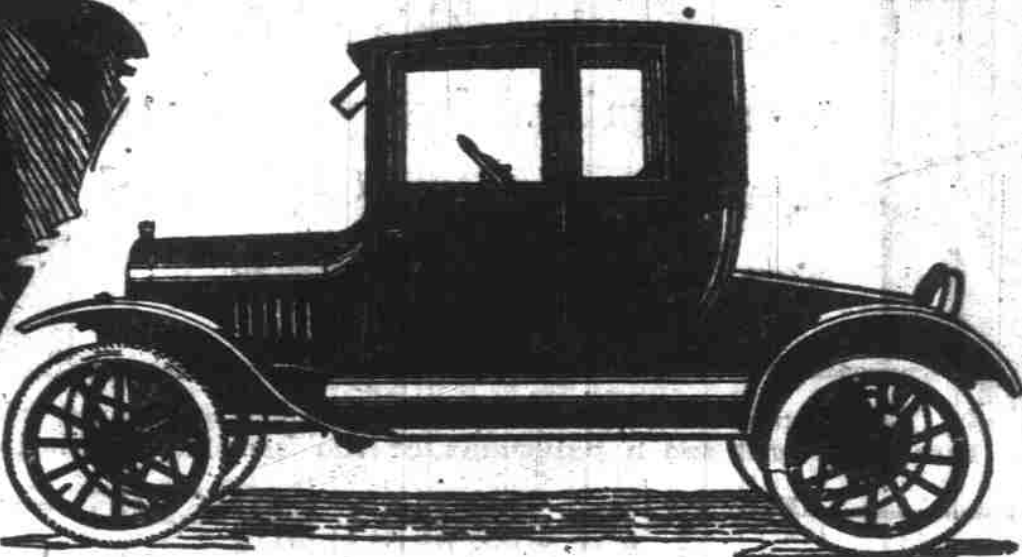
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
