Problem of Meet ALL ALONG THE WATERFRONT The steamship Admiral Farragut, of Proposed elimination of the tax exemption privilege from issues of state, county and municipal bouch was one of the most important problems discussed by the investment bankers of the country at the recent convention of the Association of Investment Bankers of America at Del Monte, Cal. While no formal action was taken at the convention the question of federal taxation of state and municipal securities was under frequent discussion among the delegates and the concensus of opinion favored the idea, according to E. D. Brooks of the Continental & Commercial Trust and Savings bank of Chicago, who visited Portland today on his way kome from the convention.

"The great majority of members of the Inhestment Bankers' association undoubtedly believe that a halt should be talled in the issuance of tax free bonds." Brooks stated, "both because issues communities are in danger of taxing themselves to the point of bankruptey, and because tax exemption tends to divert too large a proportion of the nation's savings into unproductive channels. Whatever action is taken on the matter could not be made inimacdiately operative, as an amendment to the constitution would be required to enable the federal speechment to tax, securities of states and other political subdivisions.

"Such an amendment would be subject to the approval of two-thirds of the states and must walt upon the meeting of various state legislatures. Whatever legislation may eventually be passed would not be retroactive and present holders of tax exempt securities would continue to enjoy their privileges." 
