

VETERANS TO USE CARE IN HANDLING INDIGENT FUNDS

Commanders of war veterans' posts in Multnomah county will be more careful hereafter in dispensing money provided by the county among indigent veterans and their families, the commanders agreed this morning at a hearing before the tax supervising and conservation commission.

Charges and counter charges among the commanders themselves caused the hearing. Some of the G. A. R. commanders in particular were at odds, but their differences seemed to be largely personal and Chairman Mulvey of the tax body attended them with a wave of his hand.

Real trouble developed, however, in the discussion of the county budget for relief of the indigent soldiers. The county commissioners made the budget out for \$32,000, which is the maximum under the present law, as interpreted by the district attorney.

The old soldiers pointed out that \$32,000 was provided last year and that this sum was exhausted at the end of seven months. The emergency fund had to be drawn upon during the remainder of the year. They asked that \$31,200 be voted for the G. A. R. and \$31,200 for the other organizations. Disabled Veterans of the World War, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Spanish-American War veterans, Italian War veterans and Veterans of the World War.

Both the tax body and the county commissioners doubted if the law, as it stands, will allow this. Robert A. Sawyer, commander of the Spanish War veterans, said he believed the law was intended only for the G. A. R. T. Broutelle, assistant adjutant general of the G. A. R., suggested that a questionnaire be made out to be filled by each indigent soldier and his family for relief. The questionnaires to be sworn to before a notary. This would relieve the commanders of much grief, he said. His suggestion was adopted. Under the system in vogue, money is paid to soldiers without question. In most cases, on recommendation of the commanders.

JAPANESE ON TRIAL

I. Mizuma, Japanese contractor, went on trial in Circuit Judge Tucker's department this morning on a charge of manslaughter for the killing of Ernest Hayeski at Fourth and Everett streets August 11. The state maintains that Mizuma, a large man for a Japanese, had taken a gun away from Hayeski and that the latter was feeling when Mizuma shot. The defense, on the other hand, pleads self-defense.

Ballot Ruling Riles Democratic Circles

Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 20.—Indignation was rife in Democratic circles here Thursday as a result of a ruling by State Attorney General L. L. Thompson to the effect that the name of S. C. Munroe, Republican nominee for the office of county superintendent of schools, could be stricken from the ballot, regardless of the fact that Munroe failed to file with the county auditor 20 days before proof that he had taught in the schools of the state one year of nine months, together with a copy of his teacher's certificate, as required by section 102 of Oregon's code of the state statutes. Thompson held that the law in this regard is directory and not mandatory.

Body of Fisherman Is Found on Beach

Reedsport, Oct. 20.—The body of Henry Stafford, who, with John Hella, was drowned October 15, while crossing the bar at the mouth of the Slushaw river when their boat capsized as they were returning from a fishing trip, was found Thursday on the beach near the mouth of the Umpqua river. The coroner of Douglas county took charge of the body and brought it to Gardiner, where it was identified.

Major Gen. Morton Due Saturday on Army Post Journey

Major General Morton, commanding general of the Ninth corps area, U. S. army, comprising all the Western states, will arrive in Portland Saturday night, to remain here until next Thursday, according to announcement made by the 9th division headquarters. General Morton, who is next in rank to General Pershing, will be accompanied by Mrs. Morton. From Portland they will go to Camp Lewis, Wash.

Before leaving the state General Morton will motor to Salem, where he will pay his respects to the governor and will visit Eugene, Corvallis and the coast defenses of the Columbia. In Eugene and Corvallis he will inspect the reserve officers' training corps units.

General Morton entered West Point in 1879. He has been through all the grades and now is the second highest ranking officer of the United States army.

During the World War General Morton was in France, in command of the 38th division, made up of troops from Virginia, Maryland and the District of Columbia. After the war and prior to his assignment to command the Ninth corps area he was in command of the department of Hawaii.

Room Still Left On Excursion Train For Washington

Several compartments and lower berth spaces remain open on the trade excursion special which will leave Portland Sunday under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce for a tour of the Grays Harbor and South Bend districts of the state of Washington.

T. Broutelle, chairman of the excursion committee, announced today that interest was being manifested in the excursion during the last minutes of the booking and predicted that every space would be filled when the train pulled out of the Union station. This trip will be the first Portland business men have made to the Washington territory in six years.

Says He'll Charge Halloween Damage To Municipality

If Halloween hoodlums damage the property of Robert C. Wright, he proposes to hold the city responsible, and will make claim for the payment of damages. Wright, who is the owner of the property, said he had a communication sent to it today.

Wright says: "This city has made a safe and sane Fourth of July but it has signally failed to make a safe and sane Halloween. For years past property has been destroyed or damaged by gangs or mobs of hoodlums and human life has often been endangered. It is no defense to say that parents or police cannot control these mobs."

He says existing ordinances probably are sufficient to cover the situation, but suggests that if they are not then a more drastic measure should be passed at once. He also suggests that a "police corral" be provided in some dark basement, where all roving, lawless Halloween gangs can be rounded up without waiting for damages to occur, and that charges of disorderly conduct be preferred.

"The undersigned, as a citizen and taxpayer," says the communication, "gives notice that full protection of his property is demanded of the city against such gangs and mobs, and if damages are caused by their acts, claim for indemnity will be made against the city."

COLONEL THORPE IS DEAD

WATKINS AGAIN 'LATHERS' PAT

Elton Watkins persists in his attempt to get his opponent, Representative "Pat" McArthur, on record one way or the other as regards the compulsory public school bill. An interchange of letters between the candidates earlier in the week availed nothing. Today Watkins addressed the following communication to McArthur:

It is true, as has been frequently demonstrated in your own case, that it is a waste of soap to lather an axe and from the halter you have been wearing for these many years, to which you have become so accustomed, I wonder why anyone should waste either soap or halter, but my question is still unanswered. I repeat it: Are you, or are you not, in favor of the compulsory school bill, or are you against it?

In an address before the East Side Business Men's club last evening Watkins made a forceful indictment of the 1927 exposition and the results accruing therefrom. In a second address at the library at Multnomah Watkins again flayed McArthur on his record in congress, including his vote against the soldiers' bonus. This evening Watkins is billed for an address at Artisans' hall, Killingsworth and Alberta street. Saturday he will speak at the Rockwood grange at noon and at the Fulton school, Second and Logan streets, at 8 o'clock Saturday evening.

Bonham Checks Up On Prisoners Who Are to Be Deported

A. P. Bonham, U. S. immigration inspector, has returned from Salem, where he has been checking up on state institutions in the interests of his department. Three men in the penitentiary are subject to deportation at the expiration of their sentences, one is a Russian, one a Mexican and the third a German citizen.

Other items listed on the records of the immigration office include the report of the imposing of a fine of \$250 against the German bark "Harold" for failure on the part of the captain to present on arrival a record of the alien crew. According to the war time ruling, which has never been revoked, for every member of the crew who leaves the ship the captain is held under \$500 bonds.

Three Chinese cooks were arrested on the American oil tanker "T. Harper," seriously crippling the culinary department of the ship by their removal. The men have never been admitted to the United States and therefore are unlawfully engaged in coastwise trade and are liable to deportation.

Takaji Matsoku, Japanese, who escaped from the Nankai Maru several nights ago and was caught the next morning by the police, will spend his time in jail until the ship departs when he will be deported by the immigration authorities.

GRAIN WAREHOUSE BURNS

Amity, Oct. 20.—The large warehouse at Bridwell station, one and one half miles west of Amity, burned to the ground early this morning. Many

farmers had their grain stored in this warehouse, and whatever was not covered by insurance is a total loss. The building was owned by the Sam Boyer Hay & Grain company. Cause of the fire has not been determined.

Donors Thanked by W. U. Student Body

Williamette University, Salem, Oct. 20.—Resolutions were passed today by the associated student body of Williamette university expressing appreciation to Robert A. Booth of Eugene and E. S. Collie of Portland for gifts of \$100,000 each to the forward movement of Williamette university. By this noon report indicated that \$600,000 had been secured toward the \$1,250,000 fund, including \$350,000 promised by the Rockefeller foundation on condition \$500,000 is raised.

William Scott Dies Of Heart Disease

His wife, Mrs. Anna Scott, has been working in a millinery store at Corvallis, and during his absence he had been taking his meals with his mother, Mrs. H. W. Williams, at the home of his mother, Tuesday morning Mrs. Williams went to his home and found him dead. Scott was a son of Carlton's pioneer, C. G. Scott.
