

WOMEN SEEKERS OF SENATE SEATS MAKE HOT FIGHT

Political Atmosphere in Wisconsin and Minnesota Sparkles as Gentler Sex Covers Field.

New York, Oct. 21.—Two women—one in Minnesota and one in Wisconsin—are setting political mileposts these days, though the country at large may not be aware of or particularly interested in it.

Mrs. Anna Dickie Olsen in the former state, and Mrs. Jessie Jack Hooper in the latter, are staging one of those "first time in history" affairs, as candidates of a major party for the United States senate. Never before in this country has one woman, much less two, been nominated for a seat in the upper branch of congress.

And while interest, generally, is at low ebb in the campaigns this year, as testified to by the low registration figures, there is going on in Wisconsin and Minnesota a political fight which, when ultimately extended to other states, may revolutionize and elevate campaigns in general.

EXCHANGE BON MOTS
Out in Missouri Senator Jim Reed and R. R. Brewster are exchanging bon mots of a character which may make the ultimate decision in that contest dependent upon which candidate demonstrates the greatest capacity for creating abusive phrases about the other.

In New Jersey the great question of which has the redder face, Senator Frelinghuysen or Governor Edwards, and if so, why—may settle a senatorship.

In Nebraska the problem of which is worst, that Bryan should support his former enemy, Senator Hitchcock, or that Howell, the Republican candidate, and alleged to be "ultra progressive" should be supported by the conservative Updike.

Similar "paramount issues" have been raised in numerous other campaigns. But in Minnesota and Wisconsin there is another type of contest, singularly lacking in oratorical thunder, in exchanges of abusive personalities and defiant challenges on this and that.

In these two states there is but one issue: Should a woman rather than a man sit in a senate seat as representative of a great commonwealth? **CAMPAIGNS QUIET**

They are relatively quiet campaigns, because they are restricted to a discussion of national issues. The misfortune in them is that, generally speaking—and this comprehends the men's vote rather than the women's—the result will be regarded, whoever wins, as a result of the fact that one candidate was a woman and the other a man.

Whatever the outcomes of these contests, Mrs. Olsen and Mrs. Hooper are blazing a trail that will widen in future political contests. Sensing their handicaps because of their sex, both are campaigning "as men." Mrs. Olsen has hit a pace from the outset of her campaign that would prostrate almost any man old enough to have senatorial aspirations. This human dynamite is winding up one of the most intensive campaigns that ever has been staged in this country.

"SOME CAMPAIGNERS"
In 13 weeks she has covered nearly 16,000 miles in a "Democratic" sedan, presented by Democratic women of Minneapolis. She has addressed audiences in more than 200 towns and has delivered from two to seven speeches a day. She has traveled from early morning until late at night, many of her audiences having waited until 11 p. m. to hear her.

Mrs. Hooper, in Wisconsin, undismayed by the avalanche of votes rolled up by Senator La Follette in the primary election, is vigorously campaigning the state as the Democratic candidate. Her spirit may be further realized when it is known that the Democrats failed to cast a sufficient number of votes in the primary to nominate any of their candidates and hence all Democrats are running as independent Democratic candidates.

In both of these election campaigns, the issues have been raised to a national level as perhaps in no other state in the Union. Nothing of personalities, none of the petty personal slanders which is the stock in trade of the average campaign orator.

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G. O. P. ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETS

Vote Carries to Send Out Campaign Pamphlet Urging Support of Full Ticket.

The "advisory committee" recently appointed by Walter L. Toose Jr., chairman of the Republican state central committee, held its first meeting yesterday afternoon at the state headquarters in the Imperial hotel. R. A. Booth, chairman, presided. There were about a dozen members of the committee present.

Toose outlined the work of the committee. He had appointed it, he said, from among prominent citizens of the state, but not from among politicians. Various members, including Chairman Booth, Frank Miller of Albany, Senator L. L. Patterson, R. S. Martin, W. B. Dennis and the Rev. Martin Freshetson of Salem, made short speeches.

The committee voted to send out a campaign pamphlet compiled by C. E. Ingalls, publicity director of the state committee, and urging the support of the party ticket. The allocation of speakers to various sections of the state was also discussed and the committee adjourned subject to the call of the chair.

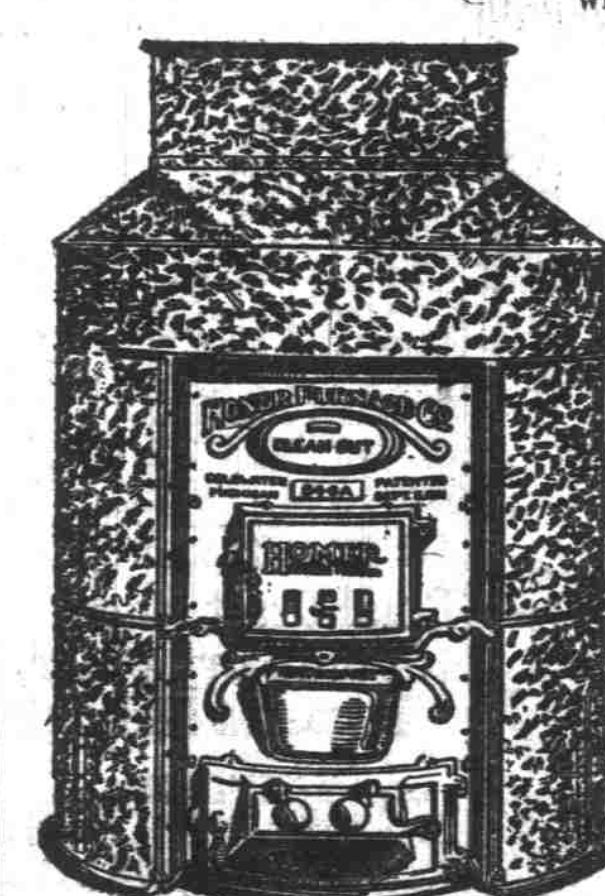

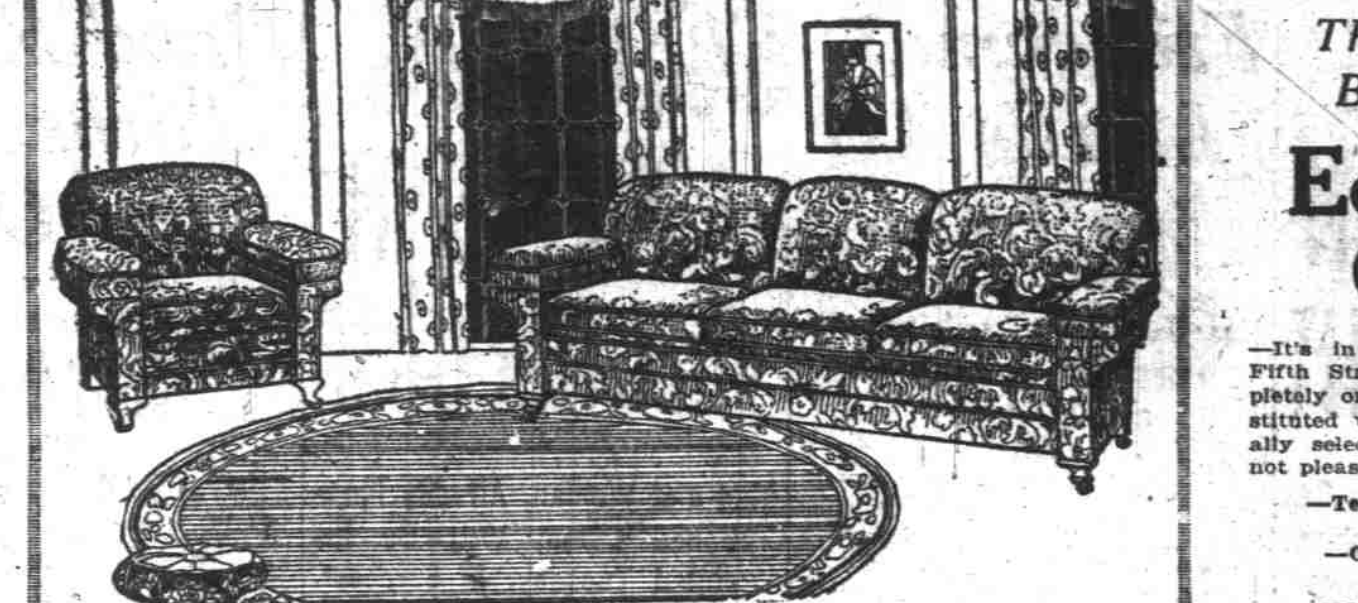
