

PRINCESS HERMINE FELL IN LOVE WITH KAISER AT SIGHT

Bride-to-Be Not Without Rivals
For Love and Affection of
Lonely Exile It Is Revealed.

Berlin, Oct. 28.—The Princess Hermine intends to use the title of kaiserin and queen of Prussia after her wedding to Kaiser Wilhelm at Doorn on November 5. The wedding itself is the result of the former kaiser's earnest wish that the kaiser's widow, free himself from loneliness and despair in exile.

The princess has given friends this information. Simultaneously, it was revealed among other facts that she conquered a love battle for the kaiser's affections in which was pitted against her the 60-year-old Queen Charlotte, widow of the king of Wuertemberg, the widow of Duke Johann Albrecht von Mecklenburg, kin of the Dutch prince consort, and a marriage probably desired by Dutch royalty and also Frau Von Schachow, the kaiser's one time housekeeper who, according to the princess, had his esteem but not his love.

ACCEPTED IN FUN
It was also revealed that the princess, after being invited in March to go to Doorn, accepted in fun. Princess Hermine encountered the opposition of the crown prince and Prince August, but her own charm overcame the original objection as well as that of Prince Heinrich, the kaiser's brother.

In the circle of the friends of Princess Hermine it was said a family conspiracy sought to hinder the match—evidently fearing the princess would rob them of their prerogatives.

The princess has made it clear, however, that she does not desire any family privilege to which she is not entitled. For instance, the kaiser offered to adopt as his own her five children and give them the name of the princess, but she urged him to do so.

LOVE AT FIRST SIGHT
At her first meeting with the kaiser she was impressed with his good fellowship and youthfulness and fell in love with him at first sight.

The kaiser told Hermine that the kaiserin on her deathbed approved of remarriage, and as he viewed the possibility, he regarded her as the worthiest woman to fill the place the kaiserin had occupied.

He was very frank about the opposition of the crown prince. He desired to give the command which would halt the intrigues against remarriage. The princess found it embarrassing that she was not approved by the kaiser's associates who had no right to snub her. Incidentally his family preferred that he wed the 60-year-old Charlotte.

Texas Faces Hot Political Fight; Candidate Barred

Washington, Oct. 28.—Texas will see the hottest campaign winnow of any state in the Union as a result of the court decisions, which have barred from the ballot the name of George E. B. Peddy and let Earle Mayfield's name go on.

Both are candidates for the senate to succeed Senator Cullback. Mayfield is a Democrat; Peddy an independent Republican with the active backing of President Harding.

Peddy's name was kept off the ballot by court action based on the fact that he was not nominated at a primary. Mayfield's name goes on because the state supreme court yesterday overruled a lower tribunal which had decided Mayfield should be kept off.

Mayfield was attacked on various grounds, one being that his campaign fund was in excess of the amount permitted.

The fight on Mayfield really is a fight on the Ku Klux Klan. Peddy was put forward by anti-Klan Democrats in concert with what Republicans Texas has.

**Bouillon Will Not
Represent France
At Peace Parley**

Paris, Oct. 28.—Franklin Bouillon, who is credited with having convinced Mustapha Kemal and the Turkish Nationalists at the Modana armistice conference, now refuses to act as the French representative at the forthcoming Near East peace conference, because of what he terms a "needless campaign against him in the British press."

Franklin Bouillon says the British press raises the question of his impartiality. He has long been a personal friend of Mustapha Kemal and is generally recognized as having kept the Turkish Nationalist in a cooperative frame of mind during the delicate armistice negotiations a few weeks ago.

Women to Launch Drive for Equal Rights in States

Washington, Oct. 28.—Representative women from all states will meet here November 11 and 12 to inaugurate what promises to be the biggest drive yet undertaken for equal rights.

With the object of "painting the country white," these women, all officers of the National Woman's party, are meeting to plan ways and means of making 1923 "equal rights" year in 43 states.

These states, in each of which the state legislature meets during the coming year, will be added if possible to the equal rights honor roll of the Woman's party, a roll in which every state which grants to its women full equality with men occupies a place on the "white list."

So far, Wisconsin, pioneer equal rights state, has a position of lonely grandeur on this pioneer roll, since it is the only state in which the entire equal rights bill is now law.

The 43 states where the campaign will be launched this year are:

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Attempt Made to Scare Chancellor Wirth Out of Office

Berlin, Oct. 28.—Having failed to get Chancellor Wirth out of office through political maneuvering, the conviction is settling upon governmental circles that the reactionary elements are endeavoring to "scare him out."

General police headquarters, the security police and the government itself are deluged with alleged information concerning plots to murder the chancellor. This has succeeded in making him extremely nervous and resulted in guards being kept with him day and night.

There was a sensation in the central part of the city when motor trucks filled with soldiers and police suddenly appeared in Wilhelmstrasse and surrounded the chancellor's palace and the foreign office. They searched the buildings for several hours and carefully scanned the gardens back of the offices, where it was reported that bombs had been placed. Nothing was found.

Another report that reactionary forces would suddenly appear today and seize the foreign office made Wilhelmstrasse extremely nervous. But again nothing happened.

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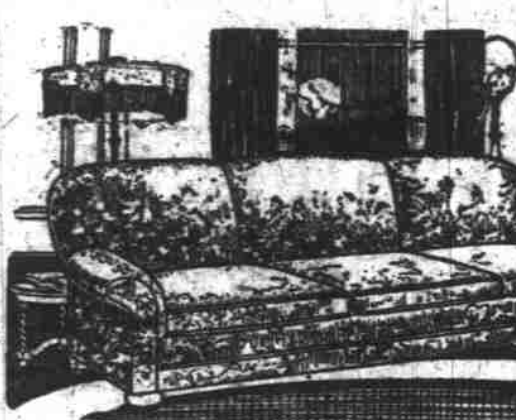

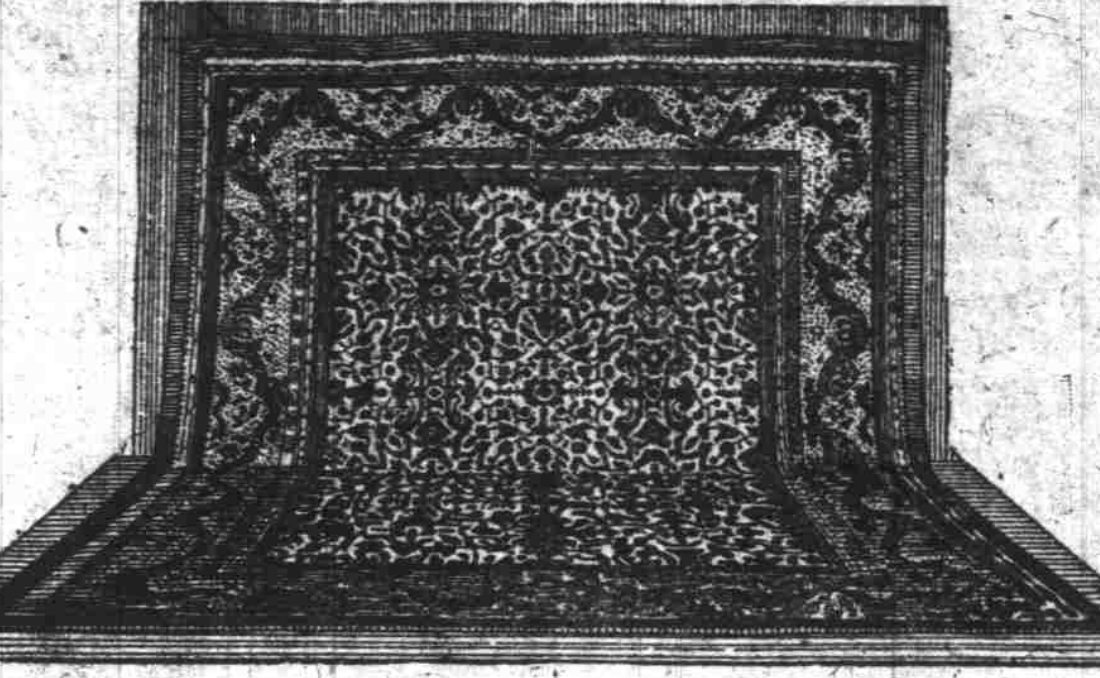
