

BIG-EYED BABY TAKEN TO STAND IN MURDER CASE

Presence of Infant at Trial of
Woman Accused of Killing
Husband Angers Prosecutor.

Philadelphia, Oct. 28.—Baby Richard Rosier, big-eyed and delighted with his chubby fist, was carried to the witness stand today as the trial of his mother, Mrs. Catherine Rosier, charged with slaying her husband, Oscar, and his stenographer, Mildred Reckitt, dragged through its 10th day.

The wives and daughters of politicians with a "pull," who packed the courtroom, gasped and smiled through their collective lognettes.

District Attorney Speer was furious as he stalked back and forth before the bar, declaiming: "Cheap stuff—rough work."

John R. K. Scott, attorney for Mrs. Rosier, hurried to his witness, Mrs. Mary L. Chappell, to tell her she must find someone else to hold the baby while she testified.

PROSECUTOR ANGRY.
The prosecutor derided:
"Oh, keep it there, by all means. Paint a label on it."

Judge Barrett had previously ruled that the 22-year-old defendant could not hold the infant in the courtroom.

Dr. Raymond Harris, family physician for Mrs. Rosier, added his testimony to the long list of those who have already told of the "melancholy change" that came over the frail wife of Rosier after the baby came last October.

At this time, the defense would prove, Arthur Rosier, the slain husband's brother, began tormenting the young woman with tales of her husband's inconstancy.

Magistrate Edward P. Carney, who went to the hospital to take the death statement of Miss Reckitt, testified:

WIFE HAD POISON.

"The doctor told her she was going to die and asked her if she wanted to make a statement. She turned her head away and looked at Arthur Rosier, who was standing by her side, and said:

"For God's sake, Arthur, don't tell mother what has happened."

Patrolman John E. Nolan, who took Mrs. Rosier into custody on the day of the tragedy, testified she had a bottle of poison when arrested.

The defense has sought to prove, that twice before the murders, Mrs. Rosier attempted to take her life, despairing of winning her husband back. They are also seeking to prove that on the day she shot Rosier and his stenographer she was before them to take her life and was driven to her mad act by the sight they presented to her.

**Cape Belonging to
Woman Introduced
At Murder Trial**

Klamath Falls, Oct. 28.—A blood-stained cape, admittedly the property of Mrs. Ollie Blowers, and a tassel from the cape found by Sheriff Low near the body of Tom Montoya, was the startling evidence that figured today in the trial of Mrs. Blowers, charged with first degree murder in connection with the death of Montoya.

The cape, it was brought out, was found in Mrs. Blowers' hallway house on The Dailes-California highway.

She asked permission to wear it upon her return to this city with the officers, but was refused by Sheriff Low, who offered his coat in its stead. It is expected the case will go to the jury Monday.

MYSTERIOUS VIAL OF POWDER FOUND, PETTIBONE CASE

Son Scores Police for Alleged
Failure to Follow Up Case of
Suspected Poisoning.

Believing that the city police did not exercise proper diligence in seeking the apprehension of Adrian Batchelor after he had disappeared from the home of Mrs. C. A. Pettibone, his mother-in-law, last Sunday when Mrs. Pettibone was taken violently ill, E. K. Pettibone, elder son of the distressed woman, has been doing some detective work of his own which resulted Saturday in his discovery of a vial containing a white powder near the back porch of the Pettibone home.

Although he has not had it analyzed, he believes it is the same drug which he says caused his mother's illness.

Batchelor's arrest in San Francisco Saturday, following the reappearance of his wife—once believed to have been done away with—appeared to have closed the case when Deputy District Attorney Hammerly decided the best disposition was to hold in abeyance a warrant sworn out charging Batchelor with assault with intent to commit murder through administration of some unknown drug.

WOULD DROP CASE.
So long as Batchelor remains out of the state, Hammerly held, the best procedure would be to drop the case.

To this procedure, however, Mrs. Pettibone and her sons have taken violent exception, declaring the belief that reported previous threats on Batchelor's part to kill both his wife

and mother-in-law constitute sufficient evidence to justify the state in bringing him back for trial.

The elder Pettibone son, who has been out of the city, declared Saturday night that the police failed in handling the case in the following particulars:

That they did not follow up the poisoning theory when a city physician reported after a perfunctory visit that Mrs. Pettibone probably was not poisoned at all but was suffering from hysteria.

When the examination conducted for the police by a chemist showed no drugs in the coffee-cup from which she had drunk.

DISREGARD INFORMATION.
When the police disregarded information that a telegram had been received the day after the woman's illness and after Mrs. Pettibone had gone to Roseburg in response to a "take" telegram presumably sent by Batchelor himself. This real telegram, he said, would have shown that Mrs. Helen Batchelor, the daughter, was alive and well.

As a matter of fact, Pettibone declared, Batchelor left for San Francisco by train Sunday night. So far as he was able to ascertain, he said, the police did not follow up any of the suggestions Mrs. Pettibone had made as to where Batchelor might have gone when he left the Pettibone home.

Batchelor's confession to San Francisco police that he had put some "sleeping powders" in a cup which Mrs. Pettibone had taken by mistake is discounted by Pettibone.

"As a matter of fact, my brother Charles was taken ill later in the day,

suffering the same symptoms," he said.

Mrs. Pettibone had endeavored on several occasions to induce her daughter to leave Batchelor, which fact Batchelor well knew, the son said.

That he contended, would provide a motive, as Batchelor was much in love with his wife and intensely jealous of her.

**Gov. Allen Opens

**Son's Spectacular
