

ARREST OF MAN PAROLED BRINGS COURT PROBLEM

Is a paroled state convict immune from arrest by the government before he has served out his parole?

This problem was presented to Federal Judge Bean this morning by Tom Garland, counsel for James H. Spencer, alias J. L. Thompson, veteran of the World War. Garland presented a writ of habeas corpus calling for Spencer's release from the Multnomah county jail. The judge set the writ down for a hearing next Monday.

On October 27 Spencer was found guilty of forgery in Circuit Judge Evans' court and sentenced to one year at Salem, but was paroled at the request of the jury.

ARRESTED ON INDICTMENT
On October 27 Spencer was arrested on a secret federal grand jury indictment charging him with posing as a federal dry agent to get two \$20 checks cashed.

Garland represented to Judge Bean that Spencer was illegally arrested on the indictment, claiming that he is actually in custody of the state, although not confined, until October 30, 1932.

According to Garland, Spencer fought four years overseas with the Canadian army, was wounded, gassed and shell shocked. Garland also asked that Spencer be allowed to file his papers under the pauper's oath. The judge granted the latter petition when Garland advised him that Spencer is an American citizen.

BONHAM DENIES IT
Immigration Inspector Bonham said he has evidence to refute the statement, and already has a warrant of deportation for Spencer. If Garland wins his point in court and Spencer is released, Bonham said his office would serve the warrant and hold him in spite of his parole. Bonham says he can prove Spencer was born in England and that he ex-patriated himself from American rights, claiming that when he joined the Canadian army and that he has not been readmitted to citizenship.

The bourse in Rome has been closed until November 6. The Fascist took over most of the opposition newspapers. The fort overlooking Rome, which has been seized by the nationalists, was turned over to the military after Mussolini had been invited to become premier.

The coup of the Fascist, who had concentrated at several points in Italy and were prepared to fight their way into power, was marked with only a few disorders.

At Cremona six Fascists were killed by police when the "black shirts" attempted to take over the government. One man was killed in Rome yesterday afternoon in a conflict between the Fascist and communists.

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heaven, which had every aspect of a revolution.
A sensation was caused when it was learned that Mussolini plans to include socialists and populists in his cabinet. Mussolini plans to reserve for himself the important posts of minister of foreign affairs and minister of the interior. He may hand over these portfolios to others later, but intends to retain them temporarily.
Rome today was virtually cut off from rail communication with the remainder of the country. The Fascist, before it was assured that they would be handed the reins of government, took up the railroad tracks, the parent purpose being to prevent rapid transportation of troops from the provinces to Rome.

**COMMUNISTS ARE COWED;
FASCIST ARE MASTERS**

Paris, Oct. 30.—The Fascist program in Italy is frankly nationalistic and reactionary. The Fascist proclamation announces that "military, political and administrative powers are transferred to a committee of action of four members with dictatorial powers." The rights of workers of all categories will be respected, according to the proclamation, which adds that the new regime "will be generous toward non-militant adversaries, but in inextinguishable towards others." The aim of the movement is declared to be the "safety and grandeur of Italy." The chief points of the interior program appear to be the exclusion of all non-Fascist and strong, patriotic union of all Italy and especially the North and South.

Fascism originally sprang from the disquiet of the industrial and agricultural elements at the government's failure to uphold the laws when the workmen seized the factories two years ago and at the apparent powerlessness of the government to deal with the communist violence which followed. Groups of Fascist were first formed to combat the reds with their own weapons—clubs and riot. They were so successful that the communists were effectively cowed in Italy. The army and navy are sympathetic; the organizations of war veterans are on their side and the race claim to have enrolled 800,000 workmen from the labor unions.

**OLD SCHOOL DIPLOMACY
COULD END IN ITALY**

Rome, Oct. 30.—(U. P.)—Assumption of the premiership by Benito Mussolini, leader of the Fascist, will mark the end of the regime of 50 years of the old school and the advent of young blood in Italian affairs. For the last 20 years the kingdom of Victor Emmanuel has been governed by men who have practically lost all notions as to the meaning of democracy.

Every cabinet made a series of concessions to the radical elements. During the war all sorts of impossible promises, from the free distribution of land to enfranchisement of the illiterate, were made to the Italians in the trenches.

Obviously, most of the promises could not be kept, which caused general dissatisfaction throughout the country and resulted in many Socialist victories at the polls in 1919. In 1920, the Socialists, having had their first taste of power, occupied many industrial plants throughout the country.

This marked the turning point in the situation and was the beginning of a reaction on the part of the conservative elements which culminated in the occupation of Rome by the Fascist.

**FRANCE TO KEEP ALOOF
IN ITALY'S DOMESTIC CRISIS**

Paris, Oct. 30.—Foreign office officials are opposed to intervention in the Italian domestic crisis. When the Fascist appeared about to seize control of the government at Rome, the Italian ambassador, requested that the allies intervene. Officials here take the position that the disturbance in Italy is an internal affair, in which the allies have no business to interfere.

Dispatches from Rome indicated the situation is clarifying and that the crisis will be solved by the fascists taking over the government.

The "black shirts" have occupied additional places, including Pavia, Novare, Tortona, Montara and Novigiana, according to a dispatch from Milan.

**ITALY IS FIRST NATION TO
OPENLY FIGHT COMMUNISM**
London, Oct. 30.—(I. N. S.)—(Radio to International Service)—Italy is the first European country since the war to establish a government aimed directly against communism and against a possible alliance of communism and labor in an effort to the extreme nationalism. The Fascist cabinet is expected to maintain a "military policy, as virtually all the leaders and members of the Fascist were great war veterans. The chief danger lies in the possibility that the Fascist minority will adopt an attitude towards labor which may lead to trouble.

TWELVE WOUNDED IN RIOTS
Milan, Oct. 30.—(I. N. S.)—Twelve persons were wounded here today in rioting about the office of the newspaper, *Avanti!*. Members of the Fascist and Socialists were engaged.

Hundreds of nationalists later attacked the plant of the newspaper *Secolo*, wrecking it.

DRY AGENTS RAD WHOLE VILLAGE OF MOONSHINERS

Astoria, Oct. 30.—The principal industry of the town of Brookfield, Wash., across the Columbia river from Astoria, was broken up Saturday as a result of a raid by federal prohibition agents, who found that the whole village was given over to the illicit manufacture of intoxicating liquor.

The raid was made by five officers, including Federal Agents McKnight and Christensen of Oregon. The agents seized two 25-gallon, one 40-gallon and one 75-gallon copper stills, destroyed more than 1000 gallons of mash, smashed up a dozen stills, and broke up huge quantities of bottled beer, moonshine whiskey and wine, the product of the labor of the "Brookfield community bootlegging fraternity," apparently covering operations extending over a period of several months.

NO ARRESTS MADE
According to Federal Prohibition Agent McKnight of Astoria, about 200 gallons of moonshine whiskey and the four large copper stills are being held as evidence, and while no arrests were made by the officers Saturday, the houses will be searched for more evidence. The officers are looking for the men and women who were involved in the alleged liquor law violations.

The officers approached Brookfield docks in a launch Saturday they were seen by a number of men and women on the wharf, who apparently scented the approach of the law, scattering in all directions. Then men and women scurried up the cliff to their respective homes, and by the time the officers disembarked and reached the town itself, the illicit moonshine business was flying out of windows, men were running in all directions with their arms filled with bottles, mash by the hundreds of gallons was flowing down the hillside into the Columbia river and the beat of axe and sledge on the heads of wine kegs and whiskey barrels could be heard.

800 GALLONS DESTROYED
At one house the officers found the door locked and a woman inside insisted she was having trouble getting it unlocked. Peering in through a window an officer saw the husband of the woman chopping a hole in the floor, through which he was pouring mash. This man had the 75-gallon still and about 800 gallons of mash destroyed by him while the officers sought to gain admission to the place.

In almost every one of the 15 houses visited by the prohibition officers were found many quarts of wine, whiskey and other liquors on shelves, while cellars were well stocked with mash. Agent McKnight expressed the opinion that probably 40 per cent of the moonshine liquor coming into Astoria, the source of which has been more or less of a puzzle for a long time, came from Brookfield.

Quartet Is Held on Felony Accusation On Man's Charge

What police believe to be a gang of "badgers" was held yesterday night with the arrest of Earl Cameron and his wife, "Babe," William Collins and Albert Olestead, north and habits. The quartet face felony charges.

According to inspectors Tackaberry and Phillips, the gang staged a "fake" arrest in a north end hotel and attempted to extort \$100 from Al. Hyland, No. 34 Washington street. Mrs. Cameron operated a barber shop at 62 North Sixth street. It was there she met Hyland and invited him to her room. Hyland complained with Hyland and he accepted the invitation and went to the room. Cameron, Olestead and another woman also were there. In the course of the night, Collins and Olestead, in the disguise of a police star and played the occupants under arrest, according to the charges. The Cameron woman pleaded with Hyland to "fix it up" and Hyland said he gave Collins a check for \$100. Collins took it and left.

After he had left the place, Hyland became suspicious of the "arrest" and the next day stopped payment on the check. Collins was released on \$250 bail and Mrs. Cameron was liberated on posting \$150 bail.

Helix Shooting Is To Be Subject of Official Inquiry

Fanderson, Oct. 30.—An inquest is to be held at Helix today to investigate the death Saturday night of Harry E. Rose, owner of a cigar store and pool room at Helix. Rose was killed by L. D. Clark, town marshal, after Rose had attempted to drive Sim Clark, son of the marshal, out of his store.

The elder Clark is said to have entered the store during the quarrel, but to have left, returning later to engage in the affair which developed into a fight between the two older men.

Clark is said to have called to bystanders to pull Rose off or he "would begin to shoot." His first shot was wild, his second passed through Rose's right hand at the knuckle, going on into his chest and through the body. He lived only a few minutes.

Rose is survived by his wife, and a small daughter. Clark was not arrested.

Fatal Wreck Laid To Both Crews in Deputy's Report

Salem, Oct. 28.—Responsibility for the wreck of the locomotive on the Shavlin-Hixon logging road at Bend last week, which resulted in death of four members of the train crew and the steel crew in a report submitted to C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner, by E. L. Swanson, deputy today.

The wreck, according to Swanson, resulted when a car of rails, which the steel crew was working, plunged down a long grade and into the locomotive which were the four members of the train crew who were all killed. In placing the car, the report points out, it was necessary for the train crew to "not" it the third time, and to block it with a wooden block in order to hold it in place. The heavy load car following the engine down grade twice before it was successfully placed.

MORBID ENVY LURES VANDALS TO SCENE

The only reason that Mrs. Gibson's farm has not been overrun by the curious is that state troopers are here on duty.

VANDALISM EXPLAINED
Not that any of the things looted are valuable. Not at all. Their value lies only in the fact of their connection with a dreadful crime.

This souvenir frenzy which has broken out around the Phillips farm like a plague is, to a psychologist, one of the most interesting phases of the crime. An eminent New York psychologist, who had made an expert study of this crime and whose opinion is vouched for by the fact that he declines publicity even to the extent of allowing his name to be mentioned, has given the writer an explanation of the case.

"The people are drawn to the scene of the murder by a vicarious enjoyment both of the crime and what led to it," he said. "Unconsciously the visitor to such a place puts himself or herself in the place of the victims or the avengers or in the place of both. This is scientific fact."

HORROR IS LURE
"Horror is the lure, but the horror is largely made up of envy, unconscious envy in most cases, but envy just the same. The visitor is quick to condemn the victim, or the slayers, or both. Why? Because the victims or the slayers dared to do something the visitors might like to do, but dare not do."

Who is the "moral" villain? The agency of the community first to scent scandal and to spread it? The rouser himself or the gossip who falls of a place in the limelight of the community's romantic life.

"Taking away relics of a murder scene to keep the thing fresh in the visitor's mind. It is a search for thrills, but a search definitely inspired by morbid envy."

HAS HUMOROUS TREND
The psychologist pointed to the frequency with which people who have been gossiped about are beaten—sometimes killed—by masked bands, amateur gangs of "moral" punts, himself. He said that the emotional crisis of the war clandestine pillaging is likely to increase, moral hoodlumism will increase and with it the frantic rush for souvenirs of horror.

As an interesting note that in spite of Mrs. Gibson's "eye witness" story which places only two avengers at the scene of the murders, the crime—according to psychologists—has all the earmarks of being committed by a group of amateur moral hoodlums. "Either by them or by a paranoiac," the psychologist believes in the placing of the clergyman's card against his shoe, the scattering of the torn love letters roundabout and the placing of the dead man's hand beneath the woman's shoulder, have a grimly humorous trend characteristic of paranoia or of a group of self-appointed moral censors.

PASTOR WARNS
"If a group of avengers, however small, had started out to punish an individual, they would have been the community, news of their intention would leak out. Consequently there would be many people lurking about the spot, and the hapless man would be recalled that half of New Brunswick seems to have been around Derussy Lane on that fateful night."

The elderly clergyman whose task it is to substitute piety for the murderer's words, took for his text Sunday the words:

"Thou, God, seemest me." To a congregation vitally interested in the crime Dr. La Espera spoke at length from Genesis on the story of Hagar, cast off by Abraham at the behest of Sarah. "The atmosphere inside the church was tense."

"Some of us are going to pass through much trial and tribulation," said the minister. "But God loves and sympathizes with us, every one of us. Remember who said 'I hold the keys of life and death.'"

SPECIAL TAX IS ABSOLUTE NEED, DECLARES FUNK

The special 3-mill tax levy for general municipal purposes, on which the people of Portland are called to vote November 7, is an outcome of the high costs of material, labor and supplies which all business men have had to meet," declares George R. Funk, city auditor. "It is not a new tax in Portland, and simply provides the means for raising money absolutely required to carry on the city government without most serious curtailment of public service."

"The city charter provides," says Auditor Funk, "for the annual levying of a tax not to exceed eight mills on the dollar of assessed valuation. It was expected when this limitation was made that the increase in assessed valuation from year to year would permit the raising of sufficient revenues for the conducting of city affairs by levying only three mills on the dollar."

"The budget for the ensuing year was based on the proposition that this money again would be available, but through technical questions raised by the tax conservation commission, it is found necessary to again submit this matter to a vote of the people of Portland."

"The tax conservation commission has given notice to the city officials that it will not certify to the levying of the special 3-mill tax unless the voters again approve it; but the commission also recommends that a change about the building of Linnah, Irving and 21st streets. 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Edsel Ford Denies Father Is Owner Of 2 Billion Cash

Los Angeles, Oct. 30.—(I. N. S.)—Refusing to affirm or deny the report that his father, Henry Ford, would be a candidate for the presidency at the next election, Edsel Ford, son of the great manufacturer, now in Los Angeles, did take occasion today to deny a Wall Street rumor that his father is worth \$2,000,000,000 cash. He also denied that a new Ford plant would be built within the near future in Los Angeles.

Regarding his father's candidacy, Ford stated that any comment on that subject should come from his father, and in reference to the proposed new Los Angeles Ford factory to serve the Pacific coast, he said the time for it had not arrived.

The statement that his father was worth \$2,000,000,000 cash was a mistake, he said.

HARDING LOSING
There is incidentally a reaction here against the Harding administration. The president swept this state more than 50,000. Last year the Democrats turned the tide wave the other way and won nearly four fifths of the legislature. If the vote for Mr. Bruce should be higher than 10,000 it will be unquestioned evidence that the state is turning its back on the Democrats who made a 1930 excursion into the Republican party.

Otherwise the result would seem to be explained almost entirely on the ground that the Republican candidate lost the support of his party.

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
