

EMBARGO FIXES REGULATIONS FOR USE OF BOX CARS

Embargo orders regulating the handling and use of box cars on railroads of the country, have been received by the lines serving this territory, according to announcements made today by local operating officials.

The embargoes were issued by the car service division of the interstate commerce commission and are more drastic than the car orders issued by the railway executives' association 10 days ago. Since the car supply has dwindled to approximately 25 per cent on lines serving Portland as against an average of 45 per cent 10 days ago, rail officials admitted that some drastic order was necessary.

Effect of the two orders will be to reduce the small supply almost to nothing during the next two weeks before the effect of movements from Eastern lines is felt, according to rail executives.

The first order provides for the discontinuance of all local loading of cars belonging to other rail lines and the immediate movement of these cars either loaded or empty to owning lines on their junctions. Automobile cars under this order are to be moved loaded or empty in direction of auto leading territory.

The second order confines the loading of all box cars to grain, flour and other food products, where such cars are fit for this class of trade. Further provision discontinues the loading of foreign line cars in local service and the loading to home lines for Eastern loading of grain, flour and food products.

Since the Western lines are having difficulty in obtaining a return of their own cars these orders are expected to do a large amount in relieving the car shortage condition, so far as box cars are concerned.

To Deport Greek Who Was Head of Disorderly House

Foreigners who earn their living in American by running disorderly houses belong back in the country where they came from, ruled Federal Judge R. S. Bean this morning, when he refused to release Tony Kotsakis, a Greek, from the Multnomah county jail. Kotsakis sought release on a writ of habeas corpus, claiming that Immigration Inspector R. P. Bonham is holding him illegally.

Bonham is holding Kotsakis on a deportation warrant. Kotsakis was arrested with George Takis several months ago, when both were found operating a dive. Both were given hearings by the Immigration department, at the conclusion of which they were ordered deported. The evidence showed the men had been living off the earnings of women.

Takis hearing was held Monday, the verdict being the same as in today's case.

Although Kotsakis has filed notice of appeal it is probable that he will be started off with Takis.

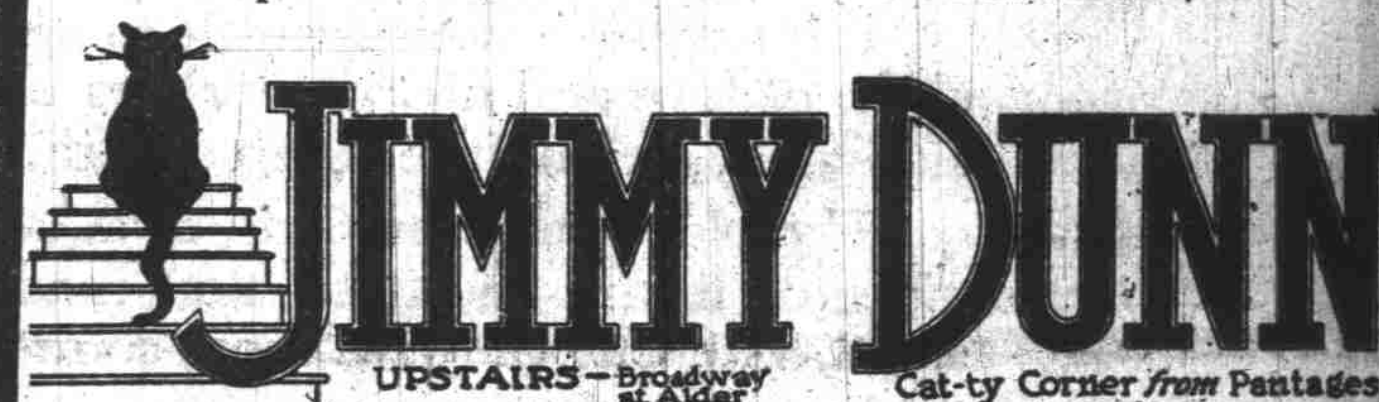
