Journal Flashes Election Returns To Large Crowds

Great milling crowds jammed the street in front of The Journal election bulletin board last night, heedless of the damp, raw wind, and watched with laughing, round-eyed surprise as the scattered returns were flashed on, telling of the avalanche in certain parts of the country.

The scenes were mad natured, the winners, of course, exultant. But most everyone was startled at the extent of the swing away from the present administration, not only here but all over the country.

The real enthusiasm was found among the thousands in front of The Journal, watching the bulletins on the canvas. The early reports, showing that Pierce and the school bill were sweeping the state, were cheered to the echo.

Streetcar motormen stopped their cars to watch, and motorists craned their necks as they craved through the crowd.

Rumors of great bets won and lost passed from lip to lip, from end to end of the crowd.

A jester spoke up:

"Now I'm going to start a petition to prohibit the sale of fish on Friday. The crowd broke up about midnight."

FERRIS IS AFTER NEWBERRY SCALP

Grand Rapids, Mich., Nov. 8.—(U. P.)—Woodbridge N. Ferris, his election apparently assured by an increasing majority throughout the state, said Wednesday that his first act, after being sworn in as United States senator, would be to scalp the Newberry case.

"We can get him out of there," said the newly elected senator. "We have the votes now to do it and we will do it. The first chance I get after going to Washington I will demand a rehearing of the case. This can be accomplished quickly, because we have more than enough backers."

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 8.—Conference to take place within the next few days will be fraught with significance for Senator Truman H. Newberry, he indicated here today when asked if he would resign because of the defeat of Senator Charles E. Townsend, Republican, who championed Newberry's cause in the senate.

"I can say nothing about my future until I have heard all of the returns from the state and from several others," said Mr. Newberry. "I will have to hold a conference with friends that will have a bearing on things outside the state before I can reach any decision as to resigning or remaining in office."

"It appears as if Mr. Ferris has taken the seat," Newberry conceded. "I certainly have taken no steps here or at Washington that would lead to the belief that I have given my resignation to Governor Grosbeck, to take effect in case Mr. Ferris won."

POINDEXTER RUNNING BEHIND C. C. DILL IN PIERCE COUNTY

Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 8.—(U. P.)—In 123 out of 190 precincts, Pierce county has given C. C. Dill, Democratic candidate for senate, a plurality of 1891 over Miles PoinDEXTER, his Republican opponent for the voters' assembly.

Dill 9578, PoinDEXTER 1185; Congressman Johnson got 10,432 to his opponent's 4599.

All Republican candidates for county offices are apparently elected, although upsets may yet occur for prosecuting attorney and sheriff. Farmer-Laborites have apparently captured the state senatorship in the third district, and five, possibly six seats, in the 35th, 37th and 38th and 39th legislative districts.

Mrs. Blanche Funk Miller, former city clerk, was elected Tacoma's first woman justice of the peace.

The county vote was overwhelming for repeal of the poll tax. For the 10-10 school tax plan the vote stood 10,445, against 11,770; on referendum 12, for 6497; against 9993. The vote was "no" on the other referendum and on the amendment to revise legislative pay.

Large Log Raft Breaks From Tow Off Cape Flattery

Aberdeen, Wash., Nov. 8.—Loss of the second raft built by the Quillayute Log and Drilling company, in which Aberdeen men are interested, was reported Tuesday in a telegram to J. S. Waugh, president of the company. The raft, which contained about 800,000 feet of spruce logs, was towed away from Cape Flattery in a heavy southwest storm which prevailed Monday.

The raft went ashore Monday morning, but according to report received, was still intact. Unless driven ashore and broken up it is possible the raft may be taken in tow by a passing steamer and brought safely into some port.

The raft was built on the Quillayute river and was the second of an experimental plan to bring logs to Grays Harbor and to mills of other harbors. The first one was towed safely here several months ago. The second raft was to have been taken by the pulp and paper mill at Port Angeles.

Another raft which left the Quillayute at the same time as the one which broke away weathered the storm. It was of oak construction while the lost raft stood well out of the sea and was more buffeted by the waves. The raft was valued at about \$2000 and insured for about \$4500.

San Francisco 'Wets' Win Election Fight

San Francisco, Nov. 8.—San Francisco voters by a vote of 2 to 1 elected the city board of supervisors to meet tomorrow, asking modification of the Volstead act to permit light wines and beer returns today showed. The vote so far counted gives wets 2284, and no 1175 on the proposition.

COERCION PLOT IS CHARGED TO DOUGLAS FIR CO.

Charged with attempting to control the export lumber business of the Pacific coast by illegal methods, the Douglas Fir Exploitation & Export company was made defendant at a hearing started today in room 303, near Postoffice building, before W. W. Sheppard, examiner of the federal trade commission. The hearing will continue for several days. It was announced and will be followed by a similar investigation at Seattle. "Practically 75 per cent of the lumber mills of the Northwest are controlled by the company," said a headquarter in San Francisco, and opposed to its alleged unfair trade methods are a number of the largest lumber manufacturers of Portland.

TEN PERSONS MISSING

Ten missing persons, the largest number reported to the police in weeks, were shown on the police bulletin issued this morning. This list included two minor girls, believed to have run away with men older than themselves, and six youths, all of whom are under 21 years of age. The other two are grown men.

WITNESS MAKES CHARGE

The specific charge brought out at the hearing today was that G. C. Thompson, general manager of the Douglas Fir Exploitation company, with his associates, attempted to coerce local lumbermen into joining their organization and, failing in this attempt, tried to destroy the local export lumber trade in China. Charles Dant of the Dant & Russell Lumber company was the principal witness at the forenoon hearing. Other witnesses appeared by the prosecution are William D. Wheelwright and William R. Payne of the Pacific Export Lumber company; B. Vanduser of the Imperial Lumber company; Frank H. Ransome of the Eastern & Western Lumber company; Frank C. Farnsworth of the R. J. Brown Lumber company, and N. E. Ayer of the St. Johns Lumber company.

Thompson took the witness stand for a short session today, completing testimony begun at a hearing last week at San Francisco. His company is represented by S. Barrett Carter, attorney for the federal trade commission. Henry Ward Biers of Washington, who won fame as attorney for the federal government in its prosecution of the sugar trust some years ago.

MANY FIRMS MEMBERS

The Peninsula Lumber company has been a member of the Douglas Fir Exploitation & Export company's organization for the past five years and the Jones Lumber company is also a member, while it was shown that the Clark & Wilson Lumber company had done business through the organization at various times. Many of the Columbia river and Puget sound mills handle their export trade through the defendant company and branch offices are maintained here and at Seattle.

In the testimony elicited from Dant today it was shown that early in 1919 the Douglas Fir Exploitation company lowered the rate on lumber exported to China, the cut being intended to force competing mills from that territory. Losses to the company's mills engaged in the China trade were alleged to have been covered by a rebate absorbed by lumber business with countries not affected by the cut in price. Both Thompson and his attorney denied that any rebate had been paid to member mills.

'MURDER CRY' BY WOMAN MYSTERY

Police are trying to find out who the woman was who rang up headquarters this morning about 4:30 o'clock and screamed that burglars were trying to murder her. The voice, according to the desk sergeant, was not that of a drunken woman, nor did it sound like some crazy person. The sergeant is convinced that somebody was in real trouble, for the voice was that of a frightened woman trying to get help.

"They're coming now!" cried the voice hoarsely and then there was silence. The sergeant tried to trace back the call through the telephone office but without result.

American Invited To Manage Health Program of League

(Special Cable to The Journal and the Chicago Daily News)

Geneva, Nov. 8.—Another of the numerous Americans who, despite the official aloofness of their country, desire to cooperate in certain phases of the work done by the League of Nations, has arrived in Geneva in the person of Edgar Sydenstricker, statistician of the United States public health service, under the treasury department in Washington. He has been offered the direction of all the health activities in Europe and elsewhere now under control of the League.

He made a special trip to Europe to look into the position offered him. He has not resigned his post in Washington but I understand that he has been given a year's leave of absence.

If Mr. Sydenstricker accepts the work here, or of his principal tasks will be to arrange for coordination between the different health services of the world according to a plan recently worked out by the league as it is desired to arrive at a common international standard in this line. At present a number of delegates from the leading sanitary services of the old world are gathered in Brussels to study international health matters in their application to Belgium. From Brussels the group will proceed to Rome.

Every important nation is said to be represented officially in this body except the United States. The Rockefeller foundation has contributed \$50,000 towards attaining international health cooperation and has given a subsidy of \$25,000 for the compilation of a useful epidemiological statistics.

Mr. Sydenstricker will be able to dispose of both these endowments if he remains in Geneva.

3 OF FREE STATE SOLDIERS KILLED, 20 ARE WOUNDED

Dublin, Nov. 8.—At least three Free State soldiers were killed and 20 wounded in a violent battle with Republican irregulars at Wellington barracks today.

Irregulars attacked the barracks, which were occupied by Free State troops. The fight lasted more than an hour, with the irregulars making desperate efforts to capture the building and make prisoners of the opponents.

The irregulars' casualties are not known but are believed to have been heavy.

ROSEBURG MAN SEEKS DEATH

Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 8.—Leaving his property to S. V. Jones, his roommate, W. B. Gilmour, 28, of Roseburg, Or., attempted suicide here yesterday afternoon by swallowing poison. He is in the county hospital and probably will recover. It was said there this morning that Gilmour has been in the city only a few days. It was said, coming here from Roseburg. He was recently divorced from his wife, who, with two minor children, lives there. The police were informed by Jones.

Jay McKinley, City Fireman, Goes to Vote; Disappears

Jay McKinley, member of the city fire department, left his home at No. 331 College street, at 10 a. m. Tuesday to vote, and has not been seen or heard from since. He was apparently in good health. His wife and friends know of no reason why he should disappear.

McKinley has been employed on the city fire department for six years. He is 39 years old, about 5 feet 9 inches in height, and of a stocky build, weighing around 200 pounds. He is of light complexion, has blue eyes and is bald. The police are searching for him.
