

BURNSIDE STREET WIDENING NEEDED TO RELIEVE JAM

Widening of Burnside, Morrison and Madison streets from the river bridges is probably fifth street is advocated by City Commissioner Barbur as a step towards properly caring for the constantly increasing vehicular traffic and in anticipation of the rebuilding of these bridges with widths of 90 feet at least.

Commissioner Barbur proposes to call a meeting of the property owners directly interested within the next few weeks, and to invite the city planning commission to participate in this conference.

In the case of Madison street, he points out, there is an entire vacant block opposite the city hall, and the next block to the east is park property which could be utilized for street widening. The buildings between that and the river on this street are of such character that they could be cut back or razed, so as to provide the necessary width for street and sidewalk purposes.

Lists of property owners on these three streets, between the river and Fifth street, are being checked up, and as soon as this work is completed, a bill will be issued for the conference on the project of street widening.

ESTIMATE ON HARD-SURFACE

FOR EAST MORRISON ASKED
Because of the intolerable condition of the street surface on East Morrison, from East Water street to Union avenue, Commissioner Barbur recommends that the city council pass a resolution requesting City Engineer Laugaard to make an estimate on the cost of hard-surfacing this street. At present it is paved with wood blocks and the period

for maintenance has expired, but Barbur reports that the street is in such bad condition that some immediate steps must be taken for its betterment.

CITY HALL BRIEFS

A permit to erect 11 one-story structures for garages at a location on East Davis street, between East Eleventh and East Ninth streets, is asked for by Flora Olive Priester. Priester has been filed against granting the permit, and the matter will be referred to Commissioner Barbur for his recommendation.

Max L. Skibbe wants a permit to erect a one-story building for a public garage and as an extension to his present building fronting on 18th avenue, between 4th and 5th streets southeast. W. M. Deacock has applied to the city council for a permit to erect a lumber shed and frame building for a planing mill at a location on East Irving street, between East 5th and East 5th streets.

Application for a permit to erect and maintain a building for a motion picture theatre at the northeast corner of Jefferson and 13th streets has been made to the city council by M. Paley. W. E. Watson and others have applied to the city council for the vacation of all that portion of East Everett street which lies between the line of East 17th street, except 30 feet in the intersection of East 16th street. The matter will be before the council at its meeting on December 13.

Fines Assessed to Three Violators of Oregon Game Laws

Alvin Smith of Malin, who accidentally shot and killed Evan Taylor of the same place while hunting for quail November 4, was fined \$75 at Klamath Falls Saturday for hunting quail out of season, according to a report filed at the headquarters of the state game commission today.

Reports of two other trials also were received from Klamath Falls. Rega for hunting without a license and Sconchins of Chiloquin was fined \$25 "Dutch" Crawford, also of Chiloquin, \$25, for hunting game birds during closed season.

VISITS PORTLAND AFTER 57 YEARS

Time has dealt kindly with Louis Knapp and with the city of Portland during the last 57 years, but the two have developed along widely variant lines, and when Knapp came up from Port Orford last week to attend the livestock show he found little to remind him of the city of 1885, which was the date of his last visit. For nearly half a century Louis Knapp has operated the Knapp hotel at Port Orford and has made few journeys to the outside world and none to the larger cities.

Knapp is a most kindly and hospitable gentleman, given to a habit of courtesy sadly lacking in the present generation. His hotel at Port Orford is the mecca of the sportsmen who go to Curry county to fish and hunt.

LUMBER MANAGER FINED

Richard Sato, export manager for the Robert Butler Lumber company, was fined \$100 this morning by Judge Bean on his plea of guilty to attempting to smuggle five bottles of liquor into Portland from a company steamer moored at Marshfield. Sato is a graduate of the University of Japan and the University of Chicago.

VETERAN DENIED WRIT

In an opinion handed down this morning Federal Judge C. B. Wolverton denied to James H. Spencer, ex-Canadian World war veteran, his petition for a writ of habeas corpus. Spencer, who is on parole from the state of Oregon for one year, claimed immunity from arrest by the government until his parole expired. The federal court later indicted him for alleged perjury of a prohibition agent.

URGES CHRISTMAS MAILING

Postmaster John M. Jones today issued an appeal to all persons who

are preparing to send Christmas packages abroad to get them into the mails early. The overseas holiday period of mailing begins November 15, and the last "Christmas ship" will leave New York about December 14 or 15. Directions for proper preparation of packages for mailing may be had from the postmaster at each station in the city. It is important that each package be properly addressed and prepared for the mails before the rush season.

ALLIES HUMILIATED BY TURKISH LEADER

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were unable to take measures which might lead to war without the consent of their respective governments. The cabinet of the British government was received almost at once, giving a free hand to General Harington and Sir Bumbold, but the replies of the French and Italian governments have not yet been received, though a week has passed since the suggestion was made. General Harington decided that though the situation was critical and that more firmness should be shown, he would be unable to carry out the suggestion of the high commissioners alone.

Negotiations with the Turks continue and it is believed that a compromise will be reached, but they are convinced that this will last but a few days and that the Nationalists will soon find new ways of enforcing their laws at the expense of the allies.

The Turkish police started operating, though the allies had not agreed to give up policing the town. People suspected of being anti-Nationalist were arrested and murdered. Sometimes the British succeeded in saving a few, but generally after a fight.

The cable connecting Constantinople with Europe and the United States has been damaged and as soon as the news was known the Turks cut the emergency wire connecting Constantinople with Chank, thus depriving the allies of their main means of communication with their governments.

The fears of the Christians are not unfounded. A secret association has been formed in Constantinople, the members of which have taken an oath on the Koran "never to allow the Greeks or Armenians to remain in Turkey, and should foreigners interfere with the sacred discussions of the Nationalist assembly, the members will shed their last drop of blood for the sacred cause." The membership of the association, which began on November 7, has reached 70,000 and it is still increasing rapidly.

EVIDENCE FOUND \$60,000 FIRE SET

Haines, Nov. 10.—The plant of the Commercial Creamery company here was destroyed by fire early this morning. Sugar valued at \$2000 and 50 tons of coal were included in the loss, which is estimated at \$60,000. The fire was discovered shortly before midnight and evidence was found that it was of incendiary origin.

The plant was engaged principally in the manufacture of sweetened milk and was equipped with the only atmospheric drum drier for making powdered milk west of Canada. A. H. Goodhue, president of the company, wires from Spokane that the company will rebuild as soon as insurance adjustments are made.

Window Smashed, Overcoat Stolen; Suspect Taken

Shortly after a \$500 plate glass window in the Hart, Schaffner & Marx clothing shop, No. 248 Washington street, was broken in at 2:30 o'clock this morning and a \$40 overcoat stolen, the police caught A. J. Jordan, reputed longshoreman, wearing the garment. He was arrested and lodged in jail on a charge of burglary.

In the arrest of Jordan, the police believe they have found one of the men who has been making them so much trouble in the business district of the city. Their theory was strengthened when T. H. Stachford, night clerk at the Eaton hotel, advised them that he had seen Jordan carrying a revolver, jimmy bar and flashlight. A thorough search of Jordan's room failed to reveal the burglar tools. Police suspect Jordan has them hidden some place outside the hotel.

When arrested Jordan feigned drunkenness, and claimed he had purchased the coat last week. Police answered his alibi by showing him the Rosenblatt store paper tags still on the coat.

does Alex Sweek, Portland attorney, and connected with the U. S. land office during the administration of President Wilson. W. F. Homan, former Democratic member of the legislature from Ontario, Malheur county, and now in the banking business there, also would like the same job.

Paul H. Strook of Portland is being mentioned by his friends as a possible candidate for the commissionership. He is, incidentally, the only insurance man in the lot.

Henry Downing of Salem wants to be warden of the state penitentiary, a position exclusively in the hands of the governor. So does Johnston Smith, who was prohibition enforcement officer during the Wilson administration, and who was, in the years gone by, an employee of the penitentiary.

Will Moore wants to be chief grain inspector for the public service commissioner, which office has its headquarters in Portland.

Herman Wise, former postmaster at Astoria, would like to be appointed state highway commissioner, or to membership on one of the other major commissions.

A. M. Dalrymple of Salem has his eye on the job now held by R. B. Goodin, as clerk of the state board of control. This place pays \$3000 a year, but it is under the jurisdiction of the state board, consisting of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer.

O. B. Pierce of Salem also wants a job of a clerical nature; and, in addition, there are others who have commenced active campaigns to land themselves on the state payroll, ranging all the way from heads of institutions, physicians at the same, down to guards at the penitentiary, attendants at the state hospitals and general utility men on the highway commission.

Incidentally, the rumor has also sprung up that one of the first things the coming legislature will be asked to do when it convenes will be to repeal the more or less famous "Moser bill,"

which places the tenure of office of all appointive officials absolutely in the hands of the appointing power.

This law was enacted during the closing hours of the 1915 session, after a long and bitter fight, and at the instance of Governor Withycombe for the purpose of giving him a free hand in "cleaning house" of the few remaining remnants of the West administration. Prior of that time all appointive state officials carried a definite term, generally for four years from the date of appointment.

The Moser bill specifically did away with all definite tenure, placing the power of removal in the hands of the appointing power at its discretion. This law is still in force as to practically all the subordinate offices with the

exception of the insurance commissioner.

Harvey Wells, during his term as insurance commissioner, secured an amendment of the insurance code which not only continued him in office for a definite term, but increased his salary and specified that the insurance commissioner should hold for four years. This act, being later than the Moser bill, repeals that law in so far as it applies to the insurance department.

But now, with a Democratic governor coming in, those who got in in 1915, or since that time, under the kindly execution of the Moser bill, want to see the Moser bill junked, so they can stay in, and Pierce can not get them out.

General Martin Is To Be Dinner Guest

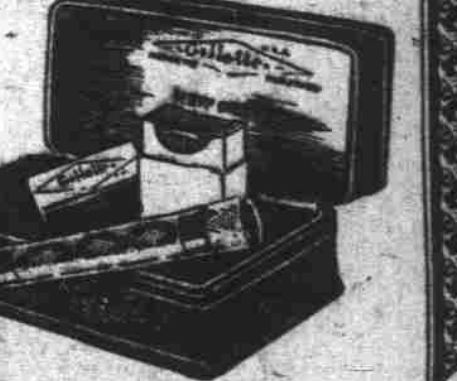

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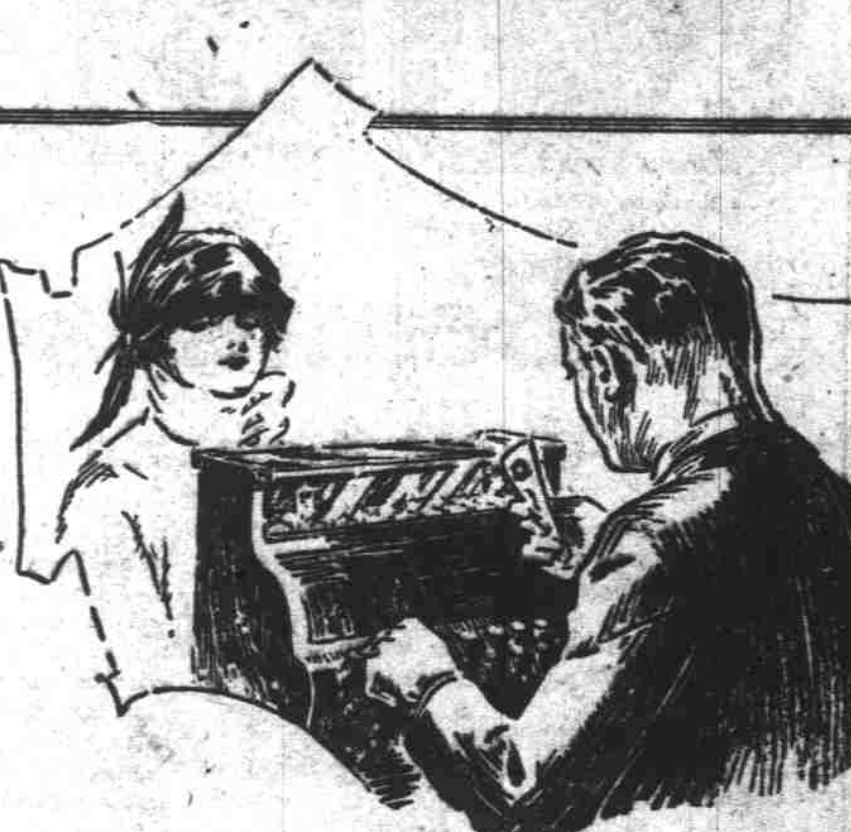
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
