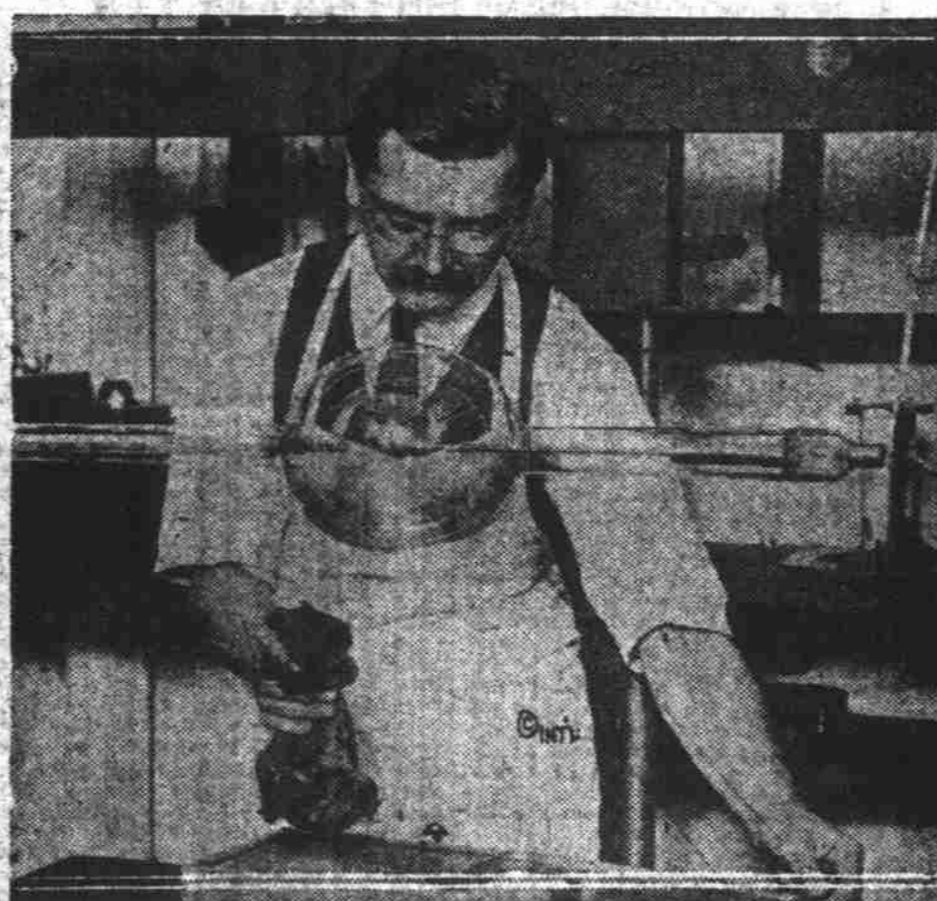

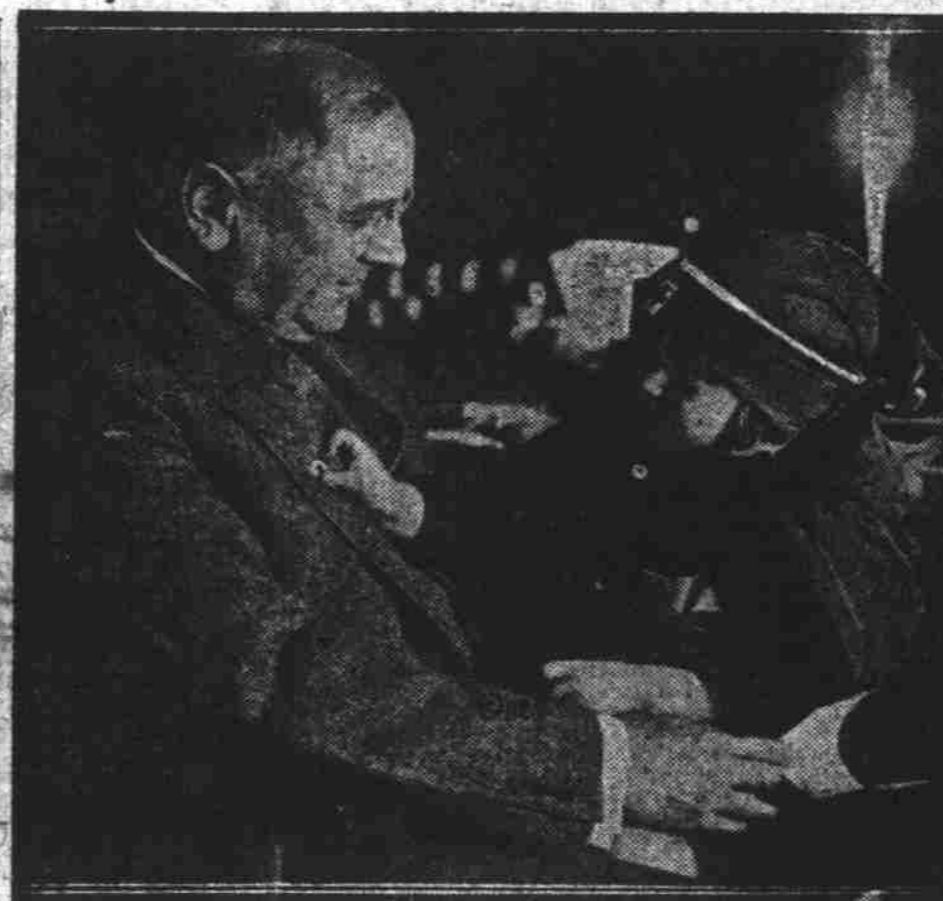
Miss Vera Bloom, American girl, is holding the first Fascisti emblem to be received in this country.

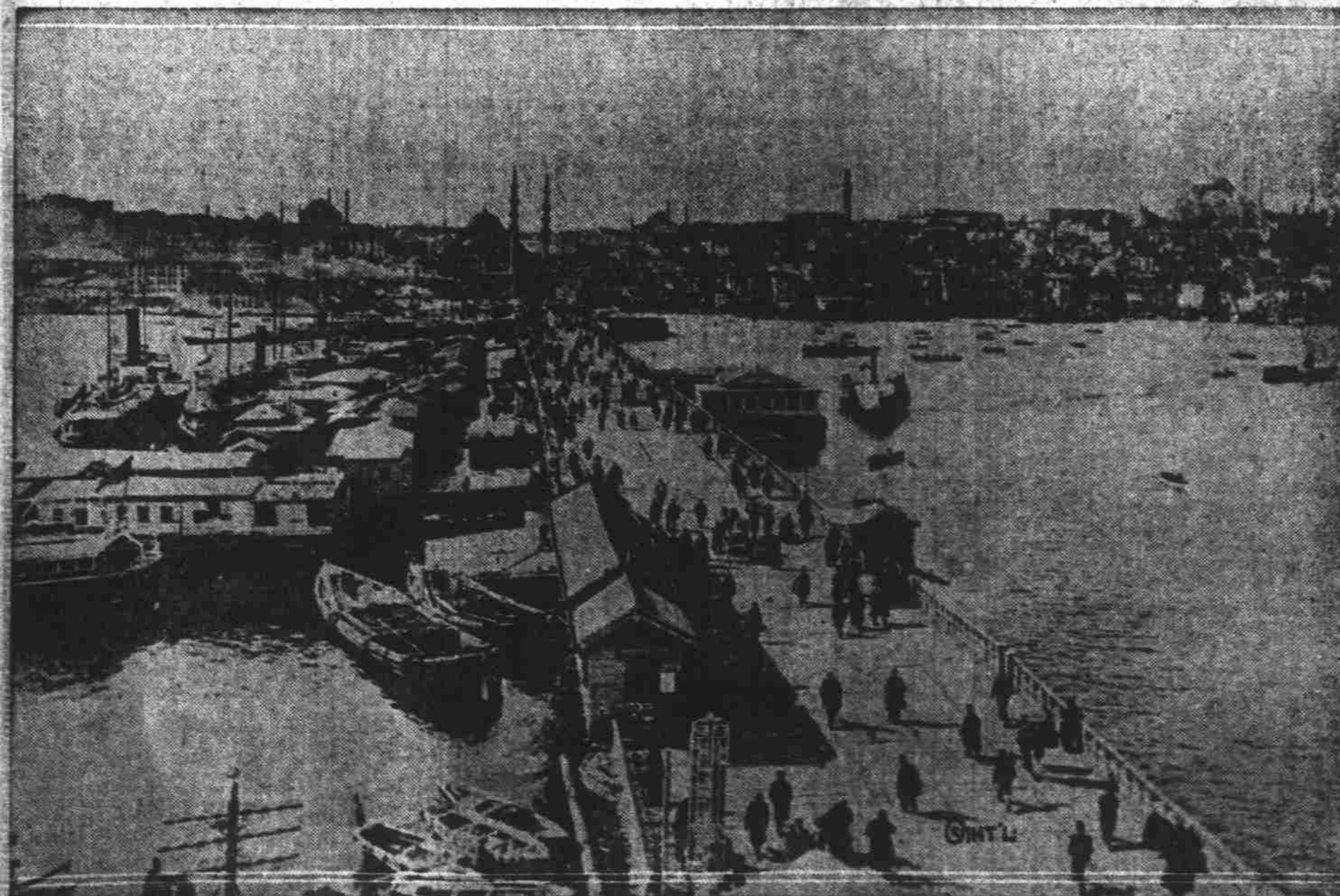

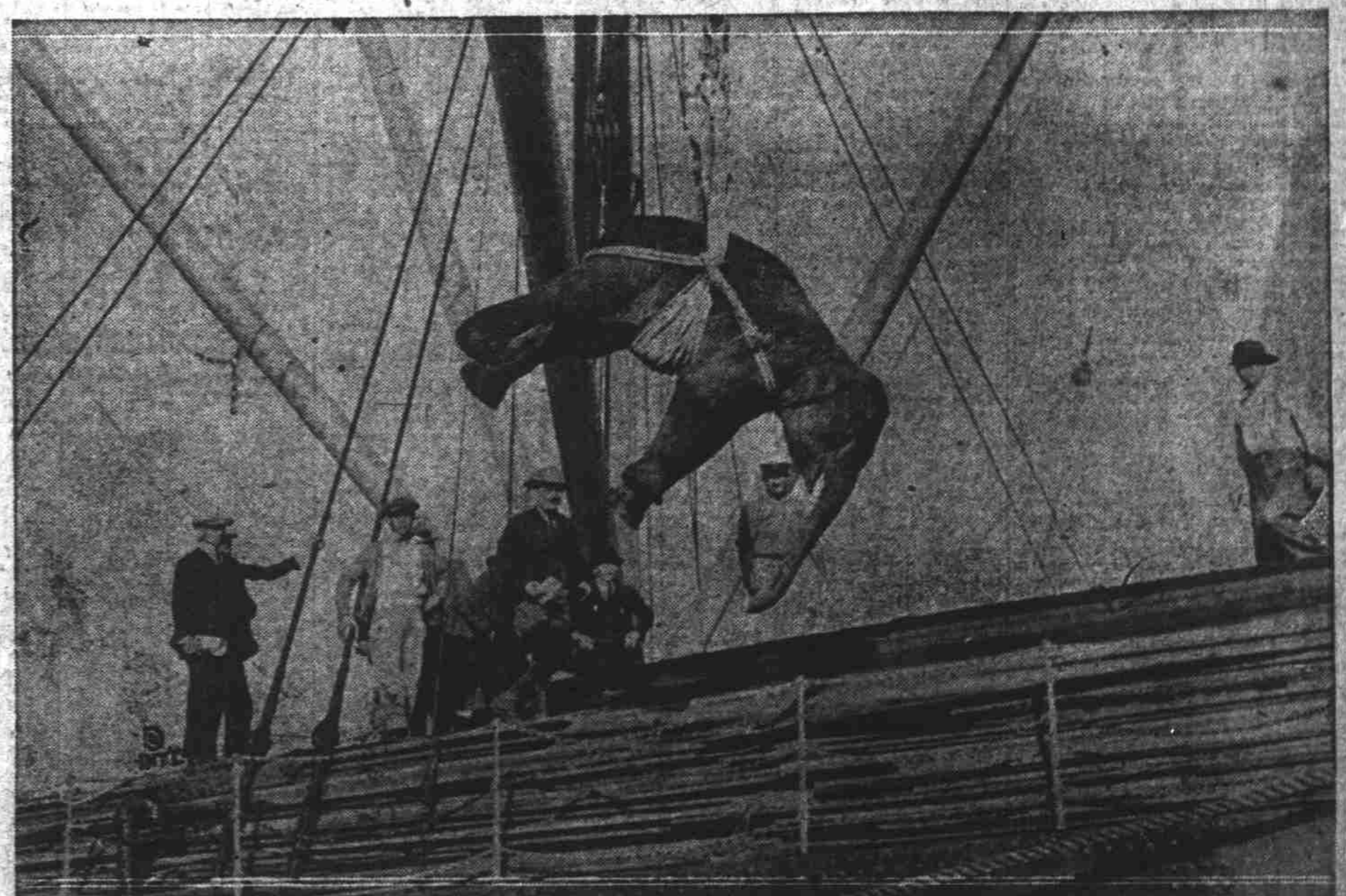
Captain Adolphus Andrews, U. S. navy, who has just been appointed commander of the presidential yacht, Mayflower.
