

URGES WIDENING OF APPROACHES IN TRAFFIC PLAN

Final solution of the traffic problem in this city cannot be achieved until a comprehensive change is made for the betterment of waterfront conditions, by widening the bridge street approaches and effecting permanent grades near the waterfront.

This is the declaration of the special committee on one-way traffic, recently appointed by Mayor Baker, and which will present its recommendations for one-way traffic before the city council at its Wednesday session. The council will then set a time for a public hearing on the recommendations, which have been outlined in previous issues of The Journal. It is probable that a series of hearings will follow before a final decision on all details is reached by the council.

The report urges that "street railway reconstruction provided for in the new plan should be permanent, and not affected by any further permanent improvement to be undertaken on streets leading to the approaches of the bridges."

A new feature in the report provides for the elimination of all auto parking on Morrison, Alder, Washington, Stark, Burnside, Third and Fifth streets, and Broadway between 4:30 and 5:30 p. m. in order to give the full street width to the movement of vehicles to and from the bridge approaches.

Rancher's Family Nearly Lose Lives When Home Burns

The Dalles, Nov. 21.—The ranch home of William Hix, in the Kingsley section, 20 miles south of The Dalles, was completely destroyed by fire early Sunday morning, according to word reaching here Monday, and members of the family narrowly escaped death. During the night, Mr. and Mrs. Hix were awakened by the crash of falling rafters and found flames roaring through the house. A bed occupied by the children was already on fire when Hix reached it, and the parents barely had time to carry the youngsters to safety before the entire house was ablaze.

Nothing was saved, not even clothing, the family fleeing in their night clothes. Hix is a prosperous wheat rancher and is the son of County Commissioner John W. Hix.

U. S. Army Officers Hunt for Alleged 'Spurious Major'

Army officials all over the country are looking for an adventurer dressed in the uniform of a major, who is peddling the states with bogus checks and displaying worthless credentials. The man, whose name is supposed to be Paul Kaye, answers to a string of

aliases including Major Paul Kaye, Major H. Hixson, or Charles Hixson. He generally obtains the confidence of one of the officers and persuades him to make possible an introduction at some bank where he obtains money on the Riggs National Bank at Washington, D. C., and on the Washington Mutual Savings Bank of Seattle.

The war department reports that there is no such officer on the records and that in each instance the checks have proved worthless.

The man is about 25 or 30 years of age, height 5 feet 7 1/2 inches, slender, brown hair, ruddy complexion. He is said to have a scar on the left side of the nose and has slightly uneven teeth.

The following minors were arrested there: Lester Cox, 17; Paul Henry, 20; George Smoke, 19; Leonard Hazlett, 20; Andrew L. Freisinger, 19; Arnold Michaelson, 18, and Percy Gardner, 16. Oscar Sharp, 16, was arrested in Keiser's place and charged with drunkenness.

Ernest Halvon, a clerk, was arrested in a poolroom at No. 1823 East Gilean street, where Ralph Thompson and Vinton Barnard, both 20, were taken into custody.

on skates by teams selected from among the Epworth league chapters of the Portland district will be the feature of a party to be given by Portland leagues on Friday evening at The Oaks rink.

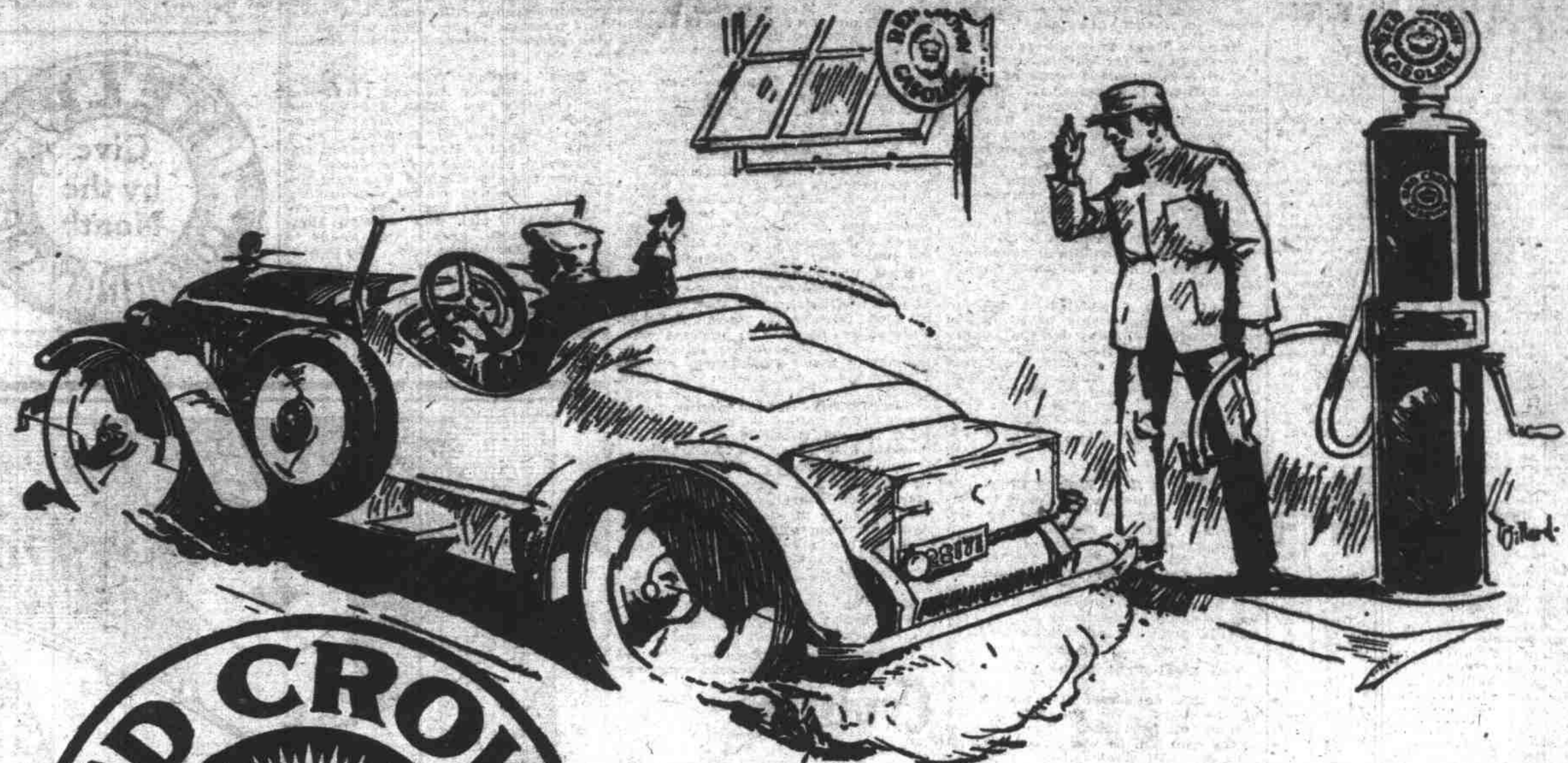
