

ADMIRERS PAY TENDER TRIBUTE TO FRANK BACON

Chicago, Nov. 21.—While the entire city mourned Monday the death of Frank Bacon, creator of "Lightnin' Bill Jones," and hundreds of members of the theatrical profession here prepared to pay homage to the actor at funeral services Wednesday, a flood of telegrams poured in from all the world conveying sympathy to Mrs. Bacon.

More than 500 such telegrams were received during the day, it was learned, and practically every person connected with the theatre in Chicago, as well as thousands of people who saw Bacon in "Lightnin'" here have sent messages.

Judge Keneas M. Landis will deliver a short eulogy at the funeral services in the Blackstone theatre, where Bacon played his last performance on Wednesday morning. The services will be simple, and will be held under the ritual of the Christian Science church.

Although the services will be public indications were that the crowd seeking admission would be so great as to make it necessary to distribute tickets, theatrical folk being given the first privileges.

A committee composed of Ernest Truex, Ralph Morgan and Bertou Churchill, now playing in productions here, is cooperating with a committee from the "Lightnin'" cast in arranging details for the service.

Mrs. Bessie Allen and Lloyd Bacon, daughter and son of the dead actor, will attend the service with their mother.

Annie MacSwiney, Sister of Mary, Faints From Hunger

Dublin, Nov. 21.—(I. N. S.)—Annie MacSwiney, who went on hunger strike at the gates of Mount Joy prison five days ago in protest against the imprisonment of her sister, Mary, collapsed today, broken by starvation and exposure. She fell in her tracks. Friends made a bed for her near the jail gate and covered her with rugs. She had complained of great pains in her head, which, she said, were getting worse and worse. Friendly women with tender hands bound her head with bandages which they moistened with water.

Inside the prison Mary MacSwiney, weak from 17 days of self-imposed starvation, tossed upon a hospital cot.

Rivalry Keen for Official Residence Of Oregon Bishop

Pendleton, Nov. 21.—Evidence of the rivalry between cities of the Eastern Oregon missionary of the Protestant Episcopal church for the honor of being the official residence of Bishop William Paul Remington, newly installed, was seen here Monday in an offer from four members of the Episcopal church at Baker, who stated that \$15,000 was being raised there with which to build a new home for the bishop if he would decide to reside there.

Pendleton has made no overtures of such a broad character, nor have the Dalles, Hood River or La Grande, other contestants. Bishop Paddock made his home in The Dalles, at the western boundary of his territory. Pendleton is centrally located and hopes are high here that Bishop Remington will see the advantages of Pendleton and choose it for his home. He has not announced any decision.

Fresno Would Have Portland Fireman Departmental Head

Fresno, Cal., wants as its new fire chief James Dillane, battalion chief of the Portland fire department. The position has been urged upon him for his acceptance, but he has not yet determined whether he will accept. If he does, it probably will be under an arrangement whereby he may obtain a leave of absence from the Portland fire department, so that he may eventually return to the service here after he has completed the reorganization of the Fresno fire department.

Dillane at present is at Barview, Wash., for a short vacation. He may return today and give his decision on the matter.

He is a native of California, having been born in San Francisco, but came to Portland when a boy and has served in the Portland fire department for nearly 25 years, much of the time in charge of engine company No. 2. He has been a battalion chief for five years.
