

LONG TWO-YEAR FIGHT IS PLANNED ON MOONSHINERS

Moonshiners must get out of Oregon. Penalties for those who remain must be increased.

Briefly stated, this is the first objective of the Anti-Saloon League of Oregon in a 24-month anti-moonshine campaign, which has just been launched by W. J. Herwig, superintendent.

The league has announced that it proposes to ask the next legislature to pass an anti-moonshine law, making the provisions of the present Oregon laws dry law even more drastic. Under the proposed law the moonshiner would be put into the felon class, and the minimum sentence for first offenders would be three months in the county jail and a \$500 fine. Second offenders would face a minimum sentence of one year in the state penitentiary and a \$1000 fine.

REWARD FOR TIPS

In view of the number of prohibition agents killed recently in the performance of duty, it is proposed to make it a felony punishable by imprisonment in the state penitentiary for not less than one year or more than three years, for any bootlegger or moonshiner to carry firearms or any deadly weapon, while manufacturing, transporting or selling liquor. It is also proposed to offer any citizen \$50 reward who gives information leading to the conviction of a moonshiner, the amount of the reward to be assessed against the moonshiner as court costs.

The proposed new law would also make it mandatory for every still in the state to be registered with the county clerk, excepting physicians, dentists, druggists, who are licensed hospitals and schools. This act would make it unlawful to manufacture a still, or to have possession of a still, or any of its parts.

To assist prosecutors in establishing the ownership of a still or mash found in a vacant building, the new law would specify that any mash or still found on any premises shall be deemed prima facie to be the property of the person in possession of the premises.

TO JOIN OTHER STATES
Following the adjournment of the Oregon legislature in February, the league proposes to continue its drive by joining forces with those of other states and presenting a solid front at Washington.

In March, when the United States congress will convene, the letter reads, "the liquor interests of the country will bring every possible pressure to bear to weaken the Volstead law in order to make possible the manufacture of beer and wine. The temperance forces must meet this crisis without fail. The results of the recent election clearly indicate that the fight in congress is not yet ended."

Herwig concludes his letter by stating: "If we can hold our own during the next 24 months, we are confident that we will have broken the backbone of the liquor propaganda."

The two-year program also includes the checking up on every judge of the prohibition law and every judge pronouncing sentences upon bootleggers and moonshiners. The purpose of this check, the letter states, is "that the temperance forces be informed and that no official be supported in the primaries who shall neglect to enforce the law."

Along with the letter announcing the 24-month campaign was included a subscription blank asking for contributions to the drive.

Dragon Flag Flies At Peking for Boy Emperor's Wedding

Peking, Dec. 1.—As a courtesy from republican China, the dragon flag flew over the forbidden city today for the first time since the abortive monarchical coup of 1917. This was the boy emperor's wedding day. Ceremonies of age old origin began yesterday.

The bride's proxy entered the palace yesterday afternoon. Today the bride arrived with all the pomp due her new station. Behind the walls of the forbidden palace followed the Chinese wedding ceremonies consummating the marriage.

Chang Tso Lin, Wu Pei Fu and all high officials of China sent valuable presents to the palace in honor of the occasion, but because of their position in the republic were excused from kneeling.

The young emperor's pleasant and independent personality, together with today's event, has greatly enhanced his popularity. He has installed many modern innovations at the palace. Some time ago the emperor, who speaks excellent English, issued an edict naming himself Henry and his empress Elizabeth, after British royalty.

America Advised To Join Big League By Oscar Strauss

Atlantic City, N. J., Dec. 1.—This country should become an associate member of the League of Nations, Oscar Strauss, former ambassador to Turkey, said Thursday in an interview.

This, he said, would be in keeping with the ideas of President Harding as expressed in his 1920 campaign. "We can by our moral and economic influence aid in restoring world peace," he said. "The European situation is not likely to become better as time goes on, and it appears that Germany and Russia will unite with the Balkans to precipitate another war."

"Only among the allies, including America, is the only remedy. Turkey has profited for 400 years by the policy of the European powers and this has kept the world either in war or within the shadow of war during all this time, with few intermissions. My attitude during my three missions in Turkey will show I am not an enemy of that country. While sinning, Turkey has been much sinned against. The Kemalist government has elements of strength."

Lower Taxes. Not New Revenue, Held Real Oregon Need

Salem, Dec. 1.—Lower taxes rather than new sources of revenue is Oregon's greatest need, according to State Senator A. M. LaFollett of Marion county, veteran member of the upper house of the state legislature.

"I am not in favor of any commission getting out and hunting up some means of getting more revenue by any special tax system," LaFollett declares. "The more money we get by taxes the more likely are we to find some means of spending it."

LaFollett declares that he has no bills in mind for introduction at the legislative session looking toward tax reductions, but insists that he has several ideas along this line which he will air when the opportunity offers.

Dallas, Or., Dec. 1.—Siet Van Staaveran has been appointed postmaster of Perrydale, Polk county.

WM. ROCKEFELLER DIES AT MANSION

New York, Dec. 1.—(U. P.)—Unlimited wealth and services of the best specialists money could command failed to save William Goodell Rockefeller, one of the world's richest men, from death when stricken with double pneumonia.

He expired at 10:20 p. m. yesterday at his mansion on Madison avenue.

Rockefeller, who was 52 years of age, was a son of the late William Rockefeller, a nephew of John D. and a brother-in-law of James A. Stillman. He complained of a chill Monday and was ordered to bed. By Wednesday his condition had become critical and the final relapse set in yesterday.

Several members of his family were at his side. His wife is in Europe. Until 1911 Rockefeller was treasurer of the Standard Oil company. He gradually withdrew from business and at the time of his death was a director in six companies.

Gunmen Shoot Up Waiters' Club; One Dead, One Wounded

Chicago, Dec. 1.—(I. N. S.)—Gunmen invaded the Waiters' club in the downtown district early today and without warning opened fire, killing Frank J. Ragan, manager of the club and former president of Waiters' union No. 7, and shooting Police Sergeant Archie Cooper just above the heart. There were at least 15 gunmen in the invading party. About 40 men were in the rooms when the gunmen entered.

Ragan, fearing trouble, had asked that policeman be assigned to protect the club.

At 7 o'clock this morning 20 men were under arrest in connection with the killing.

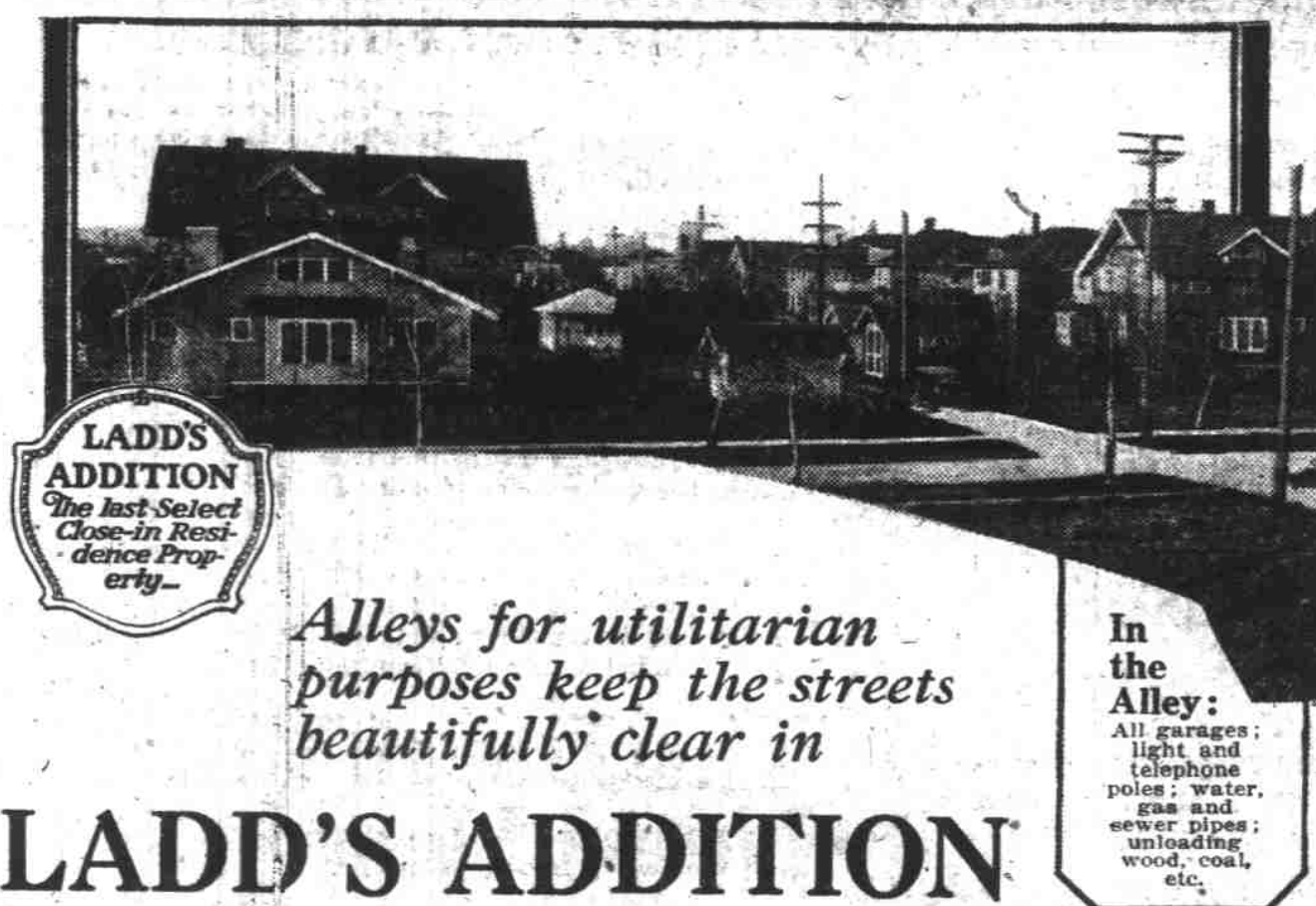

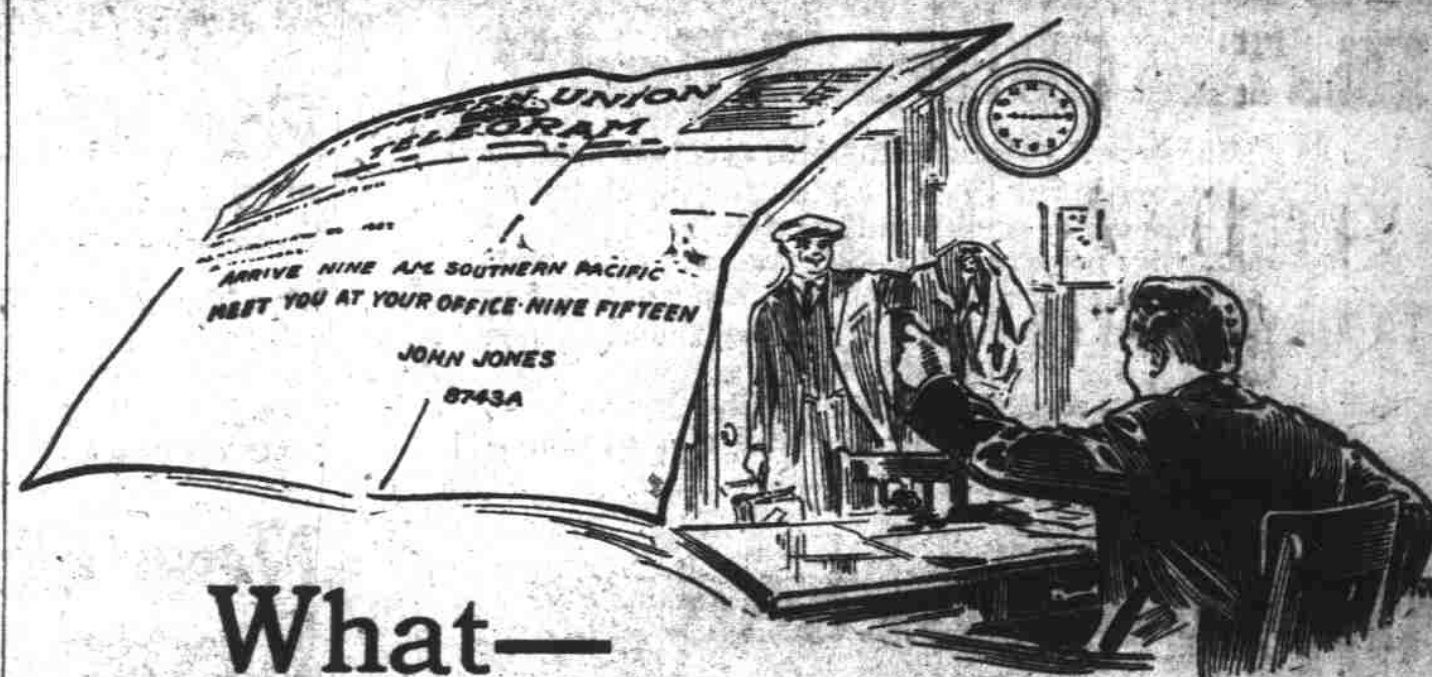
