

BOOM COMPANY'S PLEA FOR OREGON ROLLWAY HEARD

Hearing of the petition of the Oregon Boom & Log Co., company which seeks a franchise to erect a rollway on Oswego lake and bring logs to the Willamette river, was begun today before the public service commission. From present indications the hearing will require some time.

The logging company contends that under state law any logging company has the right of eminent domain over land adjacent to a navigable stream. They propose to erect a rollway on the north side of Oswego lake a quarter of a mile west of the east end of the lake, with a flume under the highway to the Willamette river at Green street in Oswego.

WOULD PROTECT SCENERY

The project is opposed by the Oregon Iron & Steel company, riparian owners, represented by Wood, Montague & Mathieson and A. J. Padillo, riparian residents of the lake shore represented by Walter P. La Roche and the fish and game commission represented by F. M. Brown.

The morning hearing was consumed by the testimony of E. D. Haley, civil engineer, who gave expert testimony on the cost of installing the operating plant as proposed by the company.

The Oregon Iron & Steel company contends that if this is a legitimate enterprise, there are other ways of getting the logs out without ruining the scenery and destroying the fish.

SEEK NEW SUPPLIES

The boom company argued that timber supplies on the Columbia were being depleted and new supplies must be tapped to make sure mills would continue operation in the future. They proposed to accept logs from any one who could obtain them from the public service commission. The company is represented by Robert McGuire and Oliver E. Hudson.

McGuire stated at the close of his opening statement:

"Without criticizing anyone's aesthetic taste, I would like to say the trouble with Oregon today is we are not giving enough attention to our scenery and not enough to our pay rolls."

La Roche contended that, instead of its providing an insulator valuable to Oswego and the small timber owner, the project would put such a vast quantity of logs into the territory that the small logger in the territory would be throttled because the Portland mills would be enabled to dictate the price of logs while they hold their own valuable untapped timber in reserve.

The opponents of the project claim the enterprise is unworkable and therefore the amount of destruction it would cause and the reduction in lake shore property values, do not make it worth while from the standpoint of public service.

The commission will resume hearing of telephone rates December 15.

Tree Hits Logger; Skull Is Fractured

North Bend, Dec. 6.—Frank Arnot, whose home is at Coon, across the lake from North Bend, was seriously injured Tuesday while felling a tree at the famous logging camp. He was brought to the Mercy hospital at North Bend, where it was discovered his skull was fractured, and the doctors have little hope of his recovery. Arnot is a widower with four small children, who are being cared for by his mother. He is a man of considerable prominence in the community, a member of the local order of Odd Fellows and the Moose lodge.

It will be all that is necessary to decide the issue. Years ago Glenada was founded by saloon men in order to sell their goods in a county where all existing cities were dry by local option. For years they held their own, but when the state went dry it went dead. The expense of maintaining government has become too much for the few saloonmen who have not deserted.

McNary to Offer 2 Waterways Plans

Washington, Dec. 6.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—Senator McNary is having prepared two amendments for waterway surveys to be included in the army appropriation bill. One covers Unatilla Rapids, with a view to canalization and consideration of irrigation under plans proposed by the open river association; the other a survey of the Skippaw river with a view to federal aid for deepening of the channel, upon which Warrenton and Astoria have already spent large sums.

Southern Pacific to Give Holiday Rates

Reduced holiday excursion fares for Christmas and New Years will be placed in effect by the Southern Pacific company, according to announcement made by John M. Scott, general passenger agent for the Oregon lines. The reduction will be 25 per cent on round-trip tickets where the one-way fare is \$10 or less. Tickets will be on sale December 12 to 31, inclusive, with final return limit of January 4.

MISS BOOTH WILL RETAIN CONTROL AT LEAST A YEAR

Chicago, Dec. 6.—Evangelina Booth will retain command of the American Salvation Army for at least another year, General Bramwell Booth, world commander of the army, announced in a cable received here Tuesday. General Booth's statement, which declares that no definite action on proposed changes in the American organization has been decided on, is interpreted as a victory for the American Salvation Army, and its friends in the United States who resented an announcement made by General Booth from London last September that the office of American commander would be abolished and the country divided into three districts, each directly responsible to him as world head of the order.

The reviewers were J. C. Alnoworth, C. L. Marshall and C. J. Frostman. The plan called for extension in three sections, first from the end of the present boulevard to the Boone's road, then to the city limits and then to the county line.

Royal Grandchild Is Expected Christmas

London, Dec. 6.—(U. N. S.)—A "happy and interesting event is expected at the home of Viscount Lascelles and the former Princess Mary within a fortnight," the Daily News announced. The princess, who is the only daughter of King George and Queen Mary, is expected to become a mother near Christmas. This will be the first grandchild in the royal family.

Car Supply to Be Normal Again Soon, Says W. F. Turner

Within a month or six weeks the car supply of railroads serving Oregon and Washington will be placed on a normal basis, according to W. F. Turner, president of the S. P. & S. lines, who returned Tuesday night after a two weeks' business trip to St. Paul, New York and Washington, D. C.

Dublin, Dec. 6.—(U. P.)—The Irish tricolor was raised today over the vice-regal lodge. The British union jack was hauled down as the Free State came into being. After simultaneous announcement of the formal constitution of the Irish Free State in Dublin and London, Timothy Healy, the new governor general, was sworn in and the first meeting of the Irish parliament summoned.

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POLICE CHIEF FINDS GRAFT AMONG FORCE

immoral women, narcotic peddlers and petty criminals. Although the heads of the department know that certain policemen accept bribes, they cannot lay their fingers on any specific overt acts which would cause these men to be discharged from the force. Patrolmen and others of slightly higher positions are known to get incomes varying from \$15 to \$30 and \$75 a week for "protection" of north and character.

MAN WAS "HITCHHIKED"

The quality of the police force, only get their regular side incomes but also get big "rolls" when special occasions demand "protection." A home was raided recently in Irvington and considerable liquor was taken. The owner of the liquor would not believe that he was being really arrested. He said he had been "hitchhiked" in many times before that he could not conceive that the particular raid was bona fide.

Other cases have been cited, but the officials have not been able in some to get positive proof that would stand the test of a trial. The personal morality of some of the policemen has been found to be so far objectionable that several have been "fired" for their conduct. Others are being caught. Recently C. L. Chamberlain, a driver attached to the morals squad, was discharged. G. H. Schulze, a special patrolman who was formerly a regular, was released Tuesday for conduct characterized by Chief Jenkins as "far from becoming an officer." These two men had been caught, while others have managed to escape.

SQUAD DECLARED CORRUPT

The morals squad is the hotbed for corrupt policemen. The personnel of the squad has been changed repeatedly and its commanding officer has been changed from time to time but to no avail.

Finally, "as a last resort," as Chief Jenkins puts it, the squad will be under the personal direction of the chief and Inspector Klingensmith.

The chief declared this morning that his action does not cast any reflection on Sergeant Oelmer, present head of the squad, who will retain his position and carry on most of the active work. The drive on the city's vice conditions will be started in the police department. It is a part of the campaign.

DISRESPECTFUL TREATMENT OF THE PUBLIC

Unbecoming conduct and the personal attitude of the members of the department will also come under scrutiny. Recently a patrolman in the traffic department told a woman that she "could not run her own business." The patrolman almost lost his job. This is one instance of hundreds where the public is not given courteous treatment.

STEPS TAKEN TO CLEAN UP THE DEPARTMENT

The steps taken to clean up the department and the rest of the city resulted from a recent conference of Mayor Baker, District Attorney Stanley, Chief Clerk Jenkins. The plans now developing, however, have been brewing for months. Other more drastic measures will be taken later, it was indicated.

TO ATTEND MEETING

Approximately 20 business men of Portland have made tentative arrangements to attend the Pacific Northwest Foreign Trade conference in Seattle, December 14 and 15, according to registration made at the foreign trade department of the Chamber of Commerce. More business men have pledged attendance already this year than were registered at the conference in 1931.

SNOW BENEFITS GRAIN

Lewiston, Idaho, Dec. 6.—The snowfall Monday was general throughout this vicinity. In the valley the ground is not frozen and grain, pastures and orchards will be greatly benefited by the moisture.

BOSSSES REFUSE TO CONFER WITH UNION LEADERS

New complications in Portland's waterfront strike developed today with the refusal of the Waterfront Employers' association to deal with A. J. Chlopek, president of the International Longshoremen's association, and representatives of the local union, in an effort to arrive at a settlement. A meeting of the local union, to decide on its next move, was scheduled for 4 o'clock this afternoon. No information as to what action union men are considering has been made public. The request of Chlopek and his associates was refused by the employers' strike committee, according to information made public today, on the grounds as follows:

REASONS ARE STATED

That dealing with President Chlopek and representatives of the local union, as Chlopek defined in his peace proposals, would be indirectly dealing with the I. W. W., with whom the International Longshoremen's association went on strike.

That many members of the Marine Transport Workers' union of the I. W. W. were likewise in the International Longshoremen's association, where they had caused much trouble and embarrassment for the employers, and that any settlement which might include recognition of this element was undesirable.

That meeting Chlopek and local union men as individuals, which was not requested, would be recognizing the union, and would cast suspicion in the minds of the strikebreakers who have been accorded certain assurances by the employers.

That President Chlopek and his associates were not entirely representative of the union, as many union men in spite of the strike, are at present working in the harbor.

POLICY AT STAKE

That it would be a violation of the recent policy announced by the Waterfront Employers' association, in which it was declared the employers would not deal with representatives of any striking organization.

The action of the committee, composed of C. A. Kennedy, D. A. Pattullo, and George Powell, was approved by Henry Rothchild, president of the Waterfront Employers' association, who forwarded the answer to the union president.

CHLOPEK HAS MADE NO PUBLIC STATEMENTS

relative to the refusal of the employers to meet him and his associates, and their indifference to the union labor. A definite plan of action on the part of the union is expected to be adopted at this afternoon's meeting.

FIVE HUNTERS FINED

Five arrests and convictions for violations of the state game laws were reported to the state game commission today. Otto, Paul and Rudolph Walcott of Powell Butte were each fined \$50 for having Chinese pheasants in their possession during closed season. Lester and Cecil Cunniff of Caldwell, Idaho, were each fined \$25 for hunting during the closed season and J. and H. Jeppson of Bismarck were each fined \$25 for hunting without license.

Police Chiefs Will Discuss Dry Laws

The Northwest Association of Sheriffs and Police, which convenes in Portland January 18, 19 and 20 for its second annual convention, will pay particular attention to the problem of enforcing the prohibition laws, according to word received by Chief of Police Jenkins, vice president of the association, from L. E. May, president, a noted criminologist. The organization, starting out with 100 members, has increased its membership to 400. A clear-cut resolution in favor of strict enforcement of the dry laws is expected at the session.
