GOVERNORS QUIT

Last Session Marked by Fiery

White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Dec. action on the Ku Klux Klan or prohlbition enforcement, or any of the state ssues confronting them, the governors of a score of states today adjourned

their annual conference here, The final session was marked by concerted verbal attack on the Ku Klux Klan, during which several governors warned that if the klan caused trouble in their states they would take

extreme measures against it. Governor McCray, Indiana, said that if the klan caused law violations in Indiana he would go the limit in fighting it. Governor Morrison, North Car-olina, also declared that if klansmen were found responsible there for depredations, they would quickly find themselves in the chain gang. WANTS BONE DRY CONTROL

Just before the conference closed Samuel Adams, president of the Farm Editor's association, created a stir among the governors by announcing that a campaign to insure bone dry control of the Republican national convention and the nomination of a dry farmer candidate would be started The campaign is designed to prevent

the Republican party from weakening its stand on the prohibition issue. Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas would be an acceptable presidential candidate to this group, Adams said. The klan discussion followed a speech by Governor Allen, Kansas, in which denounced the organization and its doctrines as "religious bigotry and race prejudice wrapped in the American flag, labelled one hundred per cent Americanism and sold for \$10." 
