

# UNIVERSITIES ARE SECURING OUTSIDE AID BY CAMPAIGNS

President Campbell of University of Oregon Finds Support From Taxation Insufficient.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Dec. 15.—Every large Eastern and Middle Western university and college of the number visited by President P. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon and Campbell Church of Eugene, who returned here today after a month's trip in the East, are in the midst of big campaigns or have just completed them. President Campbell and Church studied the campaign plans of 12 great institutions in order that the Oregon effort for private endowments may meet with fullest success.

**DUAL SUPPORT FOUNDED**  
"We found the broad principle of dual support for the state universities completely recognized," said President Campbell. "Moneys from state taxes are being generously augmented, by private gifts, both from alumni and other friends of the institutions. It is realized there must be a vastly greater support or the alternative of the exclusion of students."

In 10 days \$5,350,000 was raised in Buffalo, a city of 500,000, for Boston university, according to President Campbell's report. Columbia university is just completing a \$30,000,000 campaign. Yale obtains \$400,000 a year from alumni alone. Harvard is in the midst of a \$23,000,000 campaign. Massachusetts Tech recently obtained \$8,000,000 in private gifts. Private gifts have been large in those states that were doing most through taxation for their institutions.

**FOUNDATIONS SHOW INTEREST**  
President Campbell conferred with

officers of a number of national foundations. He reports that the general education board is gratified at the progress of the University of Oregon medical school and is watching its future with interest. He found all the foundations extremely cordial and interested in Oregon institutions. "A great many influential and wealthy men in America are nationally minded," he said. "They believe there is no better way of salvaging civilization than to give their utmost support to education."

## Emrick Trial for Alleged Election Fraud Postponed

The trial of W. H. Emrick, who is under indictment by the Multnomah county grand jury for alleged frauds in connection with the counting of ballots in precinct 201 at the primary election, was put over from December 29 to January 15 by Presiding Circuit Judge Stapleton today.

Attorneys for Emrick made the motion for postponement of the trial and asked that the date be fixed at about February 1. The district attorney's office objected to so long a delay and the judge compromised for the parties.

Five indictments hang over Emrick's head, the most serious one being fraud. There was a discrepancy of 40 votes between the totals handed in by Emrick, as chairman of the election board, and those arrived at when the ballots were recounted in the Ofcott-Hall contest.

**TAKES PORTLAND POST**  
Pendleton, Dec. 16.—Miss Esther Kelly, executive secretary of the Umatilla county chapter of the Red Cross, has resigned to become chief of medical social service and representative of the Red Cross in the Veterans' Bureau hospital in Portland. Miss Purcell Peck will succeed Miss Kelly here.

**NEW SECRETARY NAMED**  
La Grande, Dec. 16.—Earl Reynolds, O. A. C. graduate, has been elected to succeed A. W. Nelson, who resigned as secretary of the Union County Ad club to go into private business.

## NOTED SINN FEIN TO DEFEND PARTY

"Why the Irish Republic Fights On" will be the subject of the addresses of two distinguished visiting Irishmen

at the Labor Temple tonight at 8 o'clock.

The speakers are to be Rev. Michael O'Flanagan, vice president of the Sinn Fein, and Joseph O'Doherty, member of the congress of the "Republic of Ireland." Admission is free.

De Valera's disrupted government will be defended. O'Doherty, though only 21 years old, has led a life of adventure. He has been involved in the Irish volunteer movement since its inception. He was jailed in the spring of 1918 and was held in the internment camps at Wakefield and Frongoch, England. Later he was at Arbor Hill, then in Belfast and Derry prisons, and finally in Ballykinlar camp.

## 'Emperor of Sahara' Left Estate Valued At \$13,368,985

New York, Dec. 16.—A transfer tax appraisal filed here today reveals that the estate of Jacques Lebaudy, the eccentric Frenchman who called himself the "Emperor of Sahara," amounted to \$13,368,985 at the time of his death. Lebaudy was shot and killed by his wife, now Mrs. Marguerite A. Sudreau, when in 1919 he attempted to force his way into her room at their house on Long Island. Mrs. Lebaudy was absolved from the murder when it was brought out that her husband contemplated harming their daughter, Jacqueline, then 14 years old.

Depreciation of foreign securities, debts, expenses and legal deduction have reduced the gross estate by \$5,953,870.50, so that about \$8,000,000 will be divided among the three heirs. Of the residue the widow receives \$2,455,033.19, and the daughter, Jacqueline, now Mrs. J. L. Sudreau, \$4,955,978.28. Under the terms of a compromise arrangement, however, the widow and daughter have agreed to divide their shares equally with Countess Jean Marie de Fels de Paris, sister of the late "Emperor."

The countess at one time brought an action to show that Mrs. Lebaudy was an incompetent person and not, in fact, legally married to Lebaudy.

Arrangements are under way to provide winter travel from Coos Bay to Bandon and southward to Arizona Inn, 45 miles south of Bandon.

## DEFUNCT BANK TO PAY OUT \$140,000

Savings and Commercial Creditors of French Bank at The Dalles to Get Coin.

The Dalles, Dec. 16.—A Christmas present which will be eagerly accepted by hundreds of people in this city and vicinity will be handed out next week by O. B. Robertson, deputy state superintendent of banks in charge of the liquidation of the defunct French & Co. bank in the shape of checks aggregating \$140,000.

Robertson today announced second dividends in both savings and commercial departments of the institution, which failed on February 23. The payments will amount to 15 per cent in the commercial department and 20 per cent on savings. Commercial creditors will receive \$100,000 and savings depositors \$40,000.

The customary period of 10 days for filing of objections against any of the payments was cut down to five days by Circuit Judge Fred W. Wilson in order that the dividends might be distributed before Christmas. Since the last dividend payment was made July 29 additional claims, aggregating

\$12,061.17, have been filed in the commercial department and 13 claims, totaling \$258.48, on the savings side. Payment of these dividends was originally scheduled for October, but poor collections due largely to the bad crop season, enforced postponement.

Since the bank failed, gross earnings, Robertson reported, totaled \$18,472, with a net, above operating expenses, of \$8112.

With the payment of these dividends, there will still be 10 per cent owing depositors in the savings department and 80 per cent owing to the commercial depositors. Assets remaining, the receiver stated, are of such nature that liquidation will be slow and another dividend may not be forthcoming for a year, he forecast. The percentage of settlement in the comparatively short period of 10 months is quite large, he added.

## Robert Rosenbluth Extradition Case Is To Come Up Dec. 27

New York, Dec. 16.—(U. P.)—Hearing on the case of Captain Robert Rosenbluth before Federal Commissioner Hitchcock was adjourned today until December 27, when oral argument will be heard. The authorities are seeking to extradite Rosenbluth to Tacoma, Wash., in connection with the shooting and killing of Major Alexan-

der P. Cronkite at Camp Lewis in October, 1919. Rosenbluth's attorney claims that the government did not have title to Camp Lewis at the time of the tragedy and therefore has no jurisdiction.
