

SCOUT COUNCIL ELECTS PLANS MADE FOR 1923

Determination not only to go on with scouting, but to make an effort to have it progress on a larger scale, even in the face of obstacles, financial and otherwise, was the keynote which dominated the Portland Boy Scout Council at its annual public meeting, banquet and election held in the Chamber of Commerce dining room, Oregon building, Wednesday night.

All the present officials, executives and committeemen were re-elected without opposition and by unanimous consent. C. C. Colt, president of the council, evoked applause when he pledged himself to initiate a movement to put the scouts in a headquarters building of their own, where the Scout flag may be flown the year round and the administrative duties not be hampered or interrupted by frequent removals.

Colt regretted that parents not familiar with the Scout movement had shown an apathy toward it and expressed the hope that the coming year would bring a city-wide realization of the value of the movement.

E. C. Sammons, the treasurer, said there had been a slight deficit in the finances which had been made good by voluntary subscriptions from individuals. He pointed out that the per capita cost of Scouting in Portland is \$2.50 while it had cost the civil authorities \$200 for every boy who had got into trouble.

James E. Brockway, Scout executive, elaborated on Sammons' report. The per capita cost in Portland, he said, is the lowest of any city in the world. Most cities, he found, were content with an average per capita cost of \$12, while many others operated at a cost double that of Portland.

MORE LEADERS NEEDED

Brockway deplored the lack of leaders essential to the work and the financial handicaps which had come as a result of the reduced cash quota. He declared that he had on his desk a list of 200 or 300 boys who were in need of Scout leadership, but who could not be properly reached under the circumstances. Despite the fact that 25 per cent of the infractions of the law in Portland are committed by boys between the ages of 12 and 21 years, Brockway attacked the theory that there is such a thing as a bad boy.

"We are wanting you to know absolutely that there is no such thing as a bad boy unless he is abnormal or abnormal; boys are not wayward, they are way-less. We may never be able to reach every boy, but when we are reaching less than 25 per cent of the boys in the city of Scout age, we cannot be said to be doing our duty," he concluded.

Between the reports, John Claire Monteth rendered two vocal solos and Mrs. Barge E. Leonard played an accordion solo. Colonel C. A. Pease, instructor in military science at the University of Washington, made a talk on the boy problem.

The suit was filed Wednesday afternoon and the decree entered immediately afterwards.

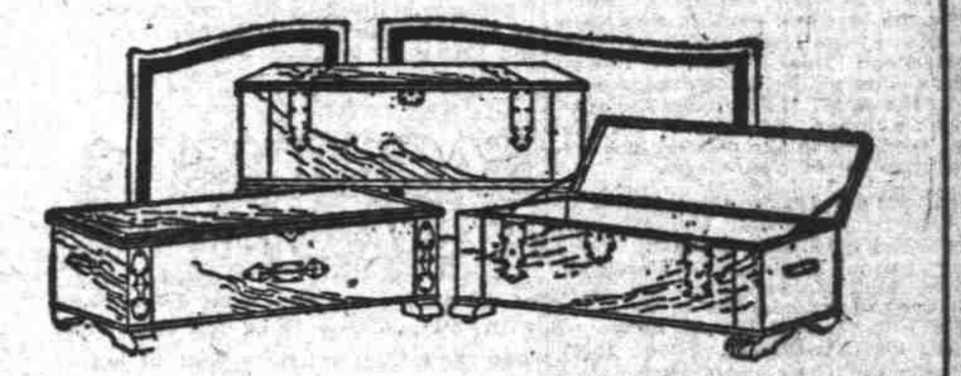

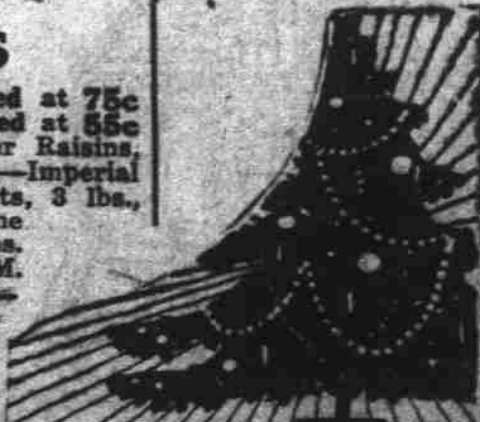
