

HERRIN WITNESS SAYS HE SAW 16 MEN SHOT DOWN

Marion, Ill., Dec. 21.—(U. P.)—A. W. Steele today testified regarding scenes at the slaying of 22 non-union miners in the "Herrin massacre" at the trial of the five alleged slayers today.

Steele, foreman of a power plant near where the killings took place, told of seeing 16 men shot down. He was a long distance from the scene, however, and was unable to identify any of the men on trial as the actual slayers.

"After the mob had dispersed, I walked through the woods and saw the bodies of eight dead men and saw others lying in underbrush, seriously wounded," Steele stated.

"No one was making any effort to care for the wounded."

Ward Trivillion, a rural mail carrier, following Steele on the stand.

His testimony was directed against Otis Clark, one of the five on trial, and alleged leader of the mob.

"I was in my father's garage following the killings, when Clark came to the place and showed me some shells which he said he had taken from the pockets of Superintendent McDowell."

"That is the kind of shells they are using," Clark told me.

The prosecution claims Clark killed McDowell, the first to die at the hands of the mob.

C. P. Shaffner, hardware dealer at Herrin, told of a crowd of 20 men coming to his store on the afternoon of June 21 and demanding guns and ammunition.

"I refused them the guns because I didn't know them," Shaffner told the jury.

"Did they offer to pay for the guns?" the witness was asked.

"They said 'Charge them to the Herrin local, or to Hugh Williams'."

The state's case against the five union coal miners accused of murdering Howard Hoffman during the Herrin massacre was rested here today.

Denied Citizenship, Draft Dodger May Lose Homestead

Oscar Kohn, blacksmith, may lose his Yamhill county homestead as a result of his naturalization hearing this morning in Federal Judge C. E. Wolverton's court, when he was denied citizenship after a hearing. Examiner V. W. Tomlinson proved he was a draft dodger and sympathizer with the soviet government of Russia.

After Judge Wolverton heard the remarks which Kohn made about the American government during the recent World war and how he had dodged the draft, he refused to give the applicant any further consideration.

In view of the court's ruling the land department will be obliged to cancel Kohn's homestead entry, Tomlinson said, as aliens are not entitled to homestead rights.

Ten Additional Letter Carriers Extend Delivery

Ten additional letter carriers authorized for the Portland postoffice district will add much to the convenience of residents of several of the newer sections of the city in receiving their mail. The assignment of the new carriers will become effective as soon as the heavy mail incident to the Christmas and New Year's mailing rush is cleared up.

One delivery daily by a city carrier will be made over the Parkrose district. Service will be extended over Eastmoreland and south of Bybee avenue, where conditions meet requirements—that is, where there are enough houses to warrant mail delivery. Mail delivery will be extended to Russett street, between Union and Vancouver avenues, and to municipal terminal No. 4 in the St. Johns district, providing all houses provide mail boxes. Delivery will also be extended to certain parts of Arlington Heights, where 50 per cent of the lots are occupied by houses.

This addition to the carrier force will permit the arrangement of routes at the main office, central station at the old postoffice, and a number of east side stations where, owing to the erection of numerous dwellings and business places, carriers have been unable to complete their scheduled deliveries.

Ex-Crown Prince And Crown Princess Broke; Offer Gems

Berlin, Dec. 21.—Both former Crown Prince Frederick Wilhelm and the former crown princess of Germany are "dead broke" and are seeking to raise money for Christmas. This fact became known today when Major Curt Anker, aide de camp to the prince during the war, and still a frequent visitor to Wieringen, approached several Americans and offered for sale a diamond studded platinum watch, a pearl necklace, a diamond brooch and several other articles of jewelry, all bearing Frederick Wilhelm's and Cecilia's coat of arms and monograms.

Greenwich 'Poppy' Users Held, After Fight in Dark Room

New York, Dec. 21.—(U. N. S.)—Drug raiders, following the "poppy path," invaded the heart of Greenwich village today, arresting five men after a desperate battle in a dark room.

The alleged opium den is within the very shadow of the Hudson Memorial church. The raid was led in person by Deputy Police Commissioner Carlton Simon, head of the narcotic squad.

Smashing glass drew hundreds of persons to the scene from nearby tea-rooms and dancing places frequented by the habitues of Greenwich village.

According to the police, two complete opium layouts and two kits of burglar tools were seized. A woman became hysterical when she was struck on the head by a missile hurled down the shaft by one of the prisoners.

The prisoners gave the names of Anthony Larooco, John Russo, Michael Privilvini, Peter Radjini and Alfred Wales.

Two days ago Dr. Simon received an anonymous letter, saying that fashionably dressed women were "frequenting an opium den in Greenwich village." The letter gave the address and said that the women drove up in motor cars which waited for them.

EAST COMING TO NORTHWEST FOR LUMBER STOCK

Heavy lumber purchases will be made in the Northwest during the coming year by the North Atlantic states, and New York alone should take 1,000,000,000 feet of this commodity from Oregon, Washington and British Columbia, according to a prediction made today by George Quayle, general manager of the Fulton Terminal company, of New York.

Quayle arrived from the East to spend a month among the lumber producers of the Northwest. He was secretary of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce prior to going East last spring to become affiliated with the terminal company.

"Eastern lumber-users are beginning to realize the value of fir timber," he said. "New York has investigated lumber markets, and during the last six months has turned its attention to the Northwest. Eastern interests now will be making investments in the Northwest, and Portland is more talked of than any other community of the Northwest."

SOUTHERN MILLS CLOSING

These bits of information were given today by Quayle, who said that during the past few months he has visited every lumber market of the North Atlantic states and has been in touch with investment interests.

"Mills in the South are closing at the rate of one every week," said Quayle. "There are some large bodies of timber in that section, but the owners are awaiting higher prices before cutting. Yellow pine prices have been shoved above those asked for by so many users are turning to the Northwest product."

Statistics show that this year the Northwest shipped 750,000 feet of lumber to New York. In 1921 the total was 211,000,000, and in 1920 only 50,000,000 feet.

"Every market in the North Atlantic states has a depleted stock of lumber. More must be purchased, and
