

TEACHER SHOULD SHUN EARRINGS, SAYS GIRLS' DEAN

Do dangling ear rings which flow with riotous abandon around the teacher's ears have an effect on the concentration of the students who work in her class room? Do they watch the shiny baubles that peep out from her skirts as her hands appear beneath the desk? Does the state of her hair, whether it is sticky with oil or nicely cared for, really matter to the girls in the class?

Miss Edna Frey, dean of girls at Lincoln high school, who spoke before the home economics division at the Oregon State Teachers' association today, believes all these things about materially in the success of the teacher with her students.

"We have called the high school girls flappers. We've condemned them for their flashy dress. But I fear we haven't given so much attention to the way the teachers dress and it is of vast importance.

TASK IS DIFFICULT
To direct this matter from the dean's office would be superhuman. It would require not only the wisdom of Solomon but the patience of Job and several other graces. But we should look to the home economics department for a standard. They should be able to give us a practical dress code combining right colors for dress and for choosing the proper lines to suit the different sizes in figures.

"The high school girl is imitative. She imitates the women of the movies. She loves bright, flashy clothes but she is quick to see the rouge or the lip stick used by the teacher, and I think it actually affects the girls' morale. The teacher can't expect to gain the confidence of the girls in her classes if she presents an offensive appearance. I find that the most popular teachers are the ones who dress quietly, often in a blue serge or jersey dress with a touch of color, and who present their work in an attractive way.

EARRINGS UNSUITABLE
"Earrings in the classroom are unsuitable, either for teacher or student. When this year opened I had a number of talks with girls about them, and our better class girls have discarded them for school wear. Flapper teachers and those who wear fancy combs or other dressy things to school are discussed by the student. I find that they admire the plain-colored sweater, crisp shirtwaist and plaid skirt most of all. It makes the teacher look companionable and perhaps younger. I think the teacher should think about her dress for the coming day just as she plans her work ahead."

Following Miss Frey, Dr. Leo Risen gave an address before the division on the subject of keeping the teacher physically fit for her work. He used slides to illustrate his talk.

The "why" of geography is vastly more important than the "where." In the opinion of C. A. Rice, assistant city superintendent of schools, who spoke before the geography section this morning.

He explained that the resources of Oregon—for instance, its water power, timber stands, climate, soil and general physical features—determine the industry in the state, and also the population of cities. He refers to the new method of presenting the subject as "rational geography rather than place geography."

AMONG EDUCATORS AT STATE TEACHERS' MEET

Visual education—the newest form of supplementary study for school children—is the term applied by Miss Maude Ryan, former Fernwood school teacher, to the motion picture textbook which had its first showing Thursday afternoon at Lincoln high school auditorium before the Oregon State Teachers' association.

The subject of the new textbook is geography and the story of its development in old fields, amusements, romance, chance, good fortune, bad fortune and struggle. The book was conceived for the scenario by Professor H. M. Barr, principal of Irvington school, who expects to add to the present scenario with additional films.

Miss Ryan visited her sister, Alice Ryan, in Chicago, some eight years ago and there became interested in her sister's production of dramatic readings. This new textbook came into being.

The process of teaching through the films is not to take the place of the written text, but to give a practical illustration of the written word.

The development, for instance, in a geographical sense of a section of a country is due to its location, its natural resources and the people who live in it. The pictures tell the story from actual scenes taken in the places they refer to. No case of moving picture production has been so successful.

Eight reels have been brought to Portland by Miss Ryan, who really went only to visit her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William F. Ryan of No. 500 East 24th street north. The film library already contains five subjects: botany, zoology, U. S. geography, general geography, manual arts and domestic science. The U. S. department of coast survey has loaned Miss Ryan the use of its airplanes in the production of films. By this means, she has been able to show the topographical aspect of the district of the Columbia, the delta and the mass of refuse, carried down by the stream, and in many other ways these airplanes have been of service.

Thomas Edison has lent his support for the success of the work. Dr. Johnson, head of the department of geography of Columbia university, who has been writing a text book on the subject offered to set aside his own work and give his time to the production of the pictures.

The New York and Boston schools have already accepted them and Miss Ryan is on her way to Los Angeles to sell further rights.

Guard Deficiency Due to Big Fire at Astoria Is Allowed
Salem, Dec. 22.—The state emergency board, in session here, this morning authorized a deficiency appropriation of \$1800 to cover the expenses incurred by the Oregon National Guard in connection with relief work at Astoria following the recent fire which wiped out the business section of that city. The money was called at the request of Adjutant General White, who explained to the board this morning that more than 17,000 meals had been served from the two rolling kitchens manned by members of the guard.

The expense was incurred in paying the transportation and wages of the men in charge of these kitchens, the pay of these men being based on that prescribed for members of the guard. These men were at the meeting this morning were Roy L. Ritten of Pendleton, president of the senate and acting governor, Secretary of State Koser, State Treasurer, Eugene, speaker of the house, and J. L. Patterson, chairman of the senate ways and means committee.

STATE ROAD BODY CUTS OVERHEAD COST \$175,000

The state highway commission met today in an adjourned session to give consideration to emergency work at Astoria, but as no one appeared to make suggestions no action on the subject was taken. The giving of authority to the commission to construct a paved highway through the city and the providing of funds for the same will go over to the coming legislature. Following out its annual practice of revising salaries the commission, in accordance with the recommendation of Engineer Nunn, took steps which will reduce the overhead cost for next year approximately \$175,000.

This is made possible by the shrinkage in the amount of work to be done. By the reduction of salaries and the consolidation of divisions and districts, the amount cut from the pay roll of engineers will be in the neighborhood of \$15,000 per month.

STATISTICAL SALARIES
Statistics compiled by the U. S. bureau of public roads show that Oregon, in comparison with the other states, has the lowest average salaries in highway work. In states where the topography of the country requires greater engineering skill, the average salary of engineers runs higher than in flat and comparatively level states.

The Pacific coast states are in the former class and with California salaries are about 15 per cent higher and Washington about the same as Oregon.

During the last biennium the cost of engineering in Oregon was 4.3 per cent of the cost of construction. In this figure no allowance was made for surveying and other work for counties, which is furnished free of charge.

Owing to the absence of Chairman Booth on account of illness, the commission referred a number of matters to its next regular meeting to be held January 5.

ABSE WALLULA ROUTING
Among petitions received and thus disposed of was the request of the Hamilton Commercial club for a routing of the Wallula cut-off through that place; the designation of the west side road between Wall, Salem and Dayton as a state highway and a petition from the Commercial club of McMinnville and La Fayette for a grade crossing on the present road at St. Joseph instead of an undercrossing. The commission instructed the secretary to apply to the public service commission to require the railroad company to issue a stop order or else cooperate on an underground crossing.

A communication from the Bend Commercial club for a routing of the road between Port Rock and La Fave was taken under advisement.

Stolen Car Found Burned and Left Standing by Road
Oregon City, Dec. 22.—An automobile, stolen from L. Mayor of Milwaukee, was taken by thieves to the cut-off between the 32d street road near Gladstone and the Carver-Damascus road, last night and burned and abandoned, was found about 8 o'clock standing at the side of the road near the S. track. It bore no signs of a smashup. No one who knew anything of the accident could be found. The theft of the car was later reported by Mayor, who had been at a show.

KLAN MAY WIDEN INFLUENCE, LET CATHOLICS JOIN

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 22.—The Ku Klux Klan, unlike the Leopard, will change its spots. It will also expand its activities to all parts of the world, but more especially Europe.

Edward Young Clarke, imperial klant of the organization, will at an early date urge upon the governing body of the klant that it be made an international body and that all white men, regardless of creed, be admitted to membership.

White supremacy will be the keynote of the revived klant and the present ban against Catholics now in force will be raised.

"The klant has nothing to conceal," said Mr. Clarke today. "It does not operate in the dark as our enemies are led to believe. I am perfectly willing that all of our cards be laid on the table. One of the principal tasks assigned to me by the national klant was the investigation of the feasibility of spreading the roster of the order so that it will include every Christian white man on the face of the globe."

"I said every white man. That is a term which we are going to have to carefully define, namely, which of the groups which make up the Caucasian race really are white. We believe that the blending together of all of the white men of the earth into one great association that will stand united against the sumptuously served and costly is an absolute necessity to the continued life of the white man's race in the world."

The edge of Imperial Klant Clarke's sword admittedly is today bared more against the Japanese than against the negro of the South. There was sharp comment today on the fact that the klant is planning to make Catholics eligible to membership but to urge them to join.

Keeler Brothers, Former Portland Bond Men, Accused

Unfair methods of competition in selling bonds and securities are charged against Keeler Brothers & Co., Columbia Securities company, George Keeler and Frank Keeler in a complaint filed by the federal trust commission, George and Frank Keeler control the companies named and have principal offices in Portland and Denver.

The Keelers are alleged to have obtained certain securities and resold them without disclosing to purchasers the real facts.

The Columbia Trust company, operated by Keeler Brothers with offices in the United States National Bank building, discontinued business about one month ago. It is understood that Frank Keeler, who had charge of the Portland office, is now in Los Angeles. The firm deal in the sale of school bonds in Oregon. Frank Keeler has been in poor health for about a year and during that time the business of the firm in this state is said to have become negligible in volume. Other local bond dealers disclaimed any knowledge of the complaint filed against the Keelers and the corporations by the federal trade commission.
