Passage of the Fordney-McCamber adjusted compensation bill in the senset and house, and betterment amendments to proposed and existing measures dealing with the dare of deabled former service men and women, and the military and naval protection of the United States are salient legislative accomplishments to which the American Legion lent its aid and influence in the last year. The adjusted compensation bill was passed by the senate by a vote of more than 2 to 1, while the conference report was adopted by both houses by a vote of more than 2 to 1. The house passed the bill over the president's veto by a vote of 5 to 1, and it was defeated in the senate only by lack of four votes from the necessary two thirds majority.

"The regular sension of the sixty-seventh congress appropriated \$681. \$81.954 for hospital facilities and proper care for disabled veterans.

"Authorization to civil cervice commission to add five points to ratings of former service men applicants for postmasterships, and providing for uniform efficiency ratings.

"Distribution of abandoned or forfeited tobacce, anuff, cigars and cigarettes to hospitals where disabled service men are patients.

"Provision for pay not exceeding \$50 a month, in discretion of director of United States veterans, bureau, for attendants for helpless disabled ex-service men.

"Extension of land rights to those

"Extension of land rights to those discharged from military or naval service of the United States and subsequently awarded compensation or treatment for disabilities incurred in ine of duty. "Allowance of credit for deceased

husband's military service to the widow in cases of homestead entries made by such widows.

"Granting of authority to the secretary of the interior to change entries for public lands and transfer payments to other surveyed public lands, where such lands have been or hereafter may be cancelled if they have been disposed of to, or appropriated by, a claimant under public land rules, providing the entryman shall file a relinquishment of title to the land originally entered.
