SENATOR FARWELL'S DENIAL.

Says he Did not Make Anything Out of the Silver Pool.

CHICAGO, Jan. 1 .- The recently published story regarding the alleged silver pool mentioned the name of Senator Farwell in connection with it. In an interview to-day Farwell said he never bought a dollar's worth of silver previous to the silver legislation last summer. While he was told others who were endeavoring to make someting out of the anticipated fluctuation in price, he steered clear of it. He knew, of course, the price would go up, and when some friends in London cabled for their views he answered to the best of his knowledge. He received no profit directly or indirectly through the speculations of friends, Regarding the silver pool, he said he had been informed a pool did exist, but this did not come to him until long after silver legislation. There was not a hint expressed concerning the pool while the matter was before congress. The senator denied flatly he was in any way concerned in the Bateman failures, or that he speculated in silver.
