The inventor is Louis Gathmann, of Chicago. The chief novel feature of the use of liquidified carbonic acid gas delivered automatically along the entire ered automatically along the entire length of the bore at the instant of discharge, not only as an absorbent of heat generated, but as a "cooler" after the charge has left the gun.
