GREAT STORM RAGING.

The Pacific Coast at Last Experiences Bad Weather.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 23.—The great storm of the past two days, which was central this morning in Oregon, has moved eastward beyond the Pacific coast states, followed by a rapidly rising barometer in Northern California, Nevada and Oregon.

At Winnemucca the wind is southwest, blowing at a velocity of sixty miles per hour; Keeler, south, forty-two miles; San Francisco, southwest, thirty-two miles; Sacramento, southeast, thirty miles; Red Bluff, southeast, thirty miles.

All reports are missing from Southern California, Southern Nevada and Arizona. Telegraph communication is still cut off.

The barometer is decidedly below the normal in all districts, varying from one-half to over three-quarters of an inch.

This condition of the atmosphere is favorable to the rapid approach of another disturbance, and affords opportunity for the occurrence of precipitation, with slight changes in temperature and wind direction.

In view of the approach of another cyclone from the northwest, the weather will still remain unsettled in California.

Officially Notified of an Additional Congressman.

SALEM, Feb. 23.—Governor Penoyer is in receipt of an official notice from James G. Blaine, secretary of the department of state, of the appointment of representatives for the fifty-third and subsequent sessions of congress.

The notification bears the signature of Secretary Blaine, and shows Oregon to be entitled to two congressmen. The document was filed with Secretary of State McBride.
