A RACE WAR IMPENDING.

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 5.—The race question is assuming serious phases in Oklahoma Territory, and the continued agitation, which the subject is raising is more than likely to result in a collision between the whites and blacks.

Negroes arriving are destitute and suffering from severe cold, but the worst feature of the case is the fact that new arrivals have brought the small-pox with them and the disease is spreading and the newspapers have openly declared a quarantine against the blacks.
