Another New Gas Lamp.

A new type of gas lamp that has been introduced abroad consists primarily of an argand burner inclosed in a globe. with the air for supporting combustion admitted both above and below the flame. The lower supply of air passes through the center of the burner, while the upper supply enters from above the burner into the globe, which incloses besides the burner a metallic deflector upon which the flame impinges and is conducted to a porcelain bell mouthed exit above. The supply of air entering from above is thus highly heated in its passage. The result of the well balanced proportions of gas and air admitted to the globe, which practically becomes the combustion chamber, results in a brilliant bulb shaped light of high illuminating power.-New York Telegram.
