THE BEHRING SEA QUESTION. It is Possible That Germany May Become Involved in the Controversy. WASHINGTON, March 15.—Germany may become involved in the Behring sea controversy. Captain Ferry, of the sealer Sayward, arrived here a few days ago to confer with the British minister, and gave him such information as may aid him in the negotiations with Secretary Blaine.

THE IRISH LEADER IS GIVEN AN ENTHUSIASTIC RECEPTION. LONDON, March 15.—Parnell had an enthusiastic reception in Galway today. To prevent him from being saluted by a band, which had made all preparations to receive him with a blare of trumpets and a beat of drums, the McCarthyites broke into the band room at Cloyne and stole the instruments.

THE KAISER'S MIND IS BENT UPON WARLIKE PREPARATIONS. BERLIN, March 15.—The prospect of any full and complete reconciliation between the emperor and Bismarck is considered far distant, although a modus vivendi may be established. Mignet is the Kaiser's man to succeed Caprivi. The possibility that Bismarck may enter the reichstag is said to make the Kaiser anxious to prevent him from being the active leader of an opposition.

What Brought on the Fight. LONDON, March 15.—A Calcutta dispatch says the British troops at Wuntho, Burma, found in the palace of the chief who has been carrying on the recent rebellion against the British authorities a horoscope foretelling that the prince would immediately become king of Burma. This prediction of an astrologer prompted the chief to begin the fight in which he has been badly worsted.

Grant Powder on the Rail. CHICO, Cal., March 15.—Saturday night someone maliciously placed twenty-five or thirty pieces of giant powder on the railroad track just north of Chico. When the south-bound express came in nearly all were set off, badly damaging some of the car wheels. The object of the party or parties is unknown. The general impression is that it was done by tramps.

ANOTHER SENSATION. Bribe Takers in the California Legislature to Be Exposed. SAN FRANCISCO, March 17.—A Sacramento special says: Another great sensation is about ready to be sprung in the legislature. It is impossible to detail the exact nature of it but Attorney General Hart has evidence which will convict a number of legislators with having received bribes. The amount then were to get Mr. Hart states to be \$21,600 and it was to be deposited in a bank at Fresno. Mr. Hart will say nothing more than this except that whole matter been traced and the chain of evidence is said to be complete.

Who Is to Be Governor? LINCOLN, Neb., March 17.—The decision in the Boyd-Thayer gubernatorial contest was indefinitely postponed. It is claimed that two of the justices are in favor of Boyd while a third favors Thayer. It is ascertained that a scheme to remove one of the two judges favoring Boyd by giving him a federal position has been unearthed.

St. Patrick's Day in Portland. PORTLAND, March 17.—St. Patrick's day was observed here today by the dedication of St. Patrick's church, Archbishop Gross officiating. There was a procession of the different Irish and Catholic societies.

Sandy Olds on Trial for His Life. HILLSBORO, March 17.—The fourth trial of "Sandy" Olds for the murder of Emil Weber, May 10th 1889, began this morning in change of venue from Multnomah county. Three jurymen were secured at this morning's session.

The Report Confirmed. NEW YORK, March 14.—It was said today by Jacob Halstead, of New York, a director of the Oregon Pacific, that negotiations were in progress for the purchase of the road by the Rio Grande Western.

London and Paris Talk by Telephone. LONDON, March 15.—The first conversation by telephone between London and Paris has exchanged today and was highly successful.

Another New Gas Lamp. A new type of gas lamp that has been introduced abroad consists primarily of an argand burner inclosed in a globe, with the air for supporting combustion admitted both above and below the flame. The lower supply of air passes through the center of the burner, while the upper supply enters from above the burner into the globe, which incloses besides the burner a metallic deflector upon which the flame impinges and is conducted to a porcelain bell mouthed exit above. The supply of air entering from above is thus highly heated in its passage. The result of the well balanced proportions of gas and air admitted to the globe, which practically becomes the combustion chamber, results in a brilliant bulb shaped light of high illuminating power.—New York Telegram.
