A New Reading System for the Blind. A new method of teaching the blind to write has been invented by a French lady residing in Angers. For some years Mlle. Mulot has been doing all in

her power to alleviate the sufferings of those who have been deprived of eyesight. Mile. Mulot has been three years in bringing her new method to perfection. The system is a very simple one. A small album of 5 by 4 inches, having two brass gratings at the corners, contains all the arrangements necessary, and the writing is done by a hard pencil upon soft paper. The letters taught are Roman in character and very angular or square in outline. Of course each letter is separate, which makes it very easy to read.—New York
