DON'T LIKE THE SYSTEM.

A London Paper Attacks the United States Naturalization Laws.

London, May 10.—The Observer, com-menting on the New Orleans improglio, States, and declares that the method by which the New Orleans Sicilians were made Americans would not be regarded as binding in any civilized community.

The writer instances the way in which
American consuls abroad, in the troublous times of 1848 in Europe, converted Italian, Polish and Hungarian refugees into American citizens in order to tect them. He predicts that the United States will yet be obliged to change some of its laws bearing on this and cog-nate questions, and that the trouble with Italy is far from settled.
