THE GERMAN KAISER.

A Rousing Reception to Germany's Young Emperor is Being Given in London To Day.

Blaine Not so Sick as Reported--Spurgeon Growing Weaker--The Grasshopper Plague Increasing.

LONDON, July 10.—The inhabitants of London and vicinity turned out in force to witness the progress in state of Emperor William from Buckingham palace to Guild Hall.

The appearance of Emperor William was signal for tremendous cheering. The reception of the Prince of Wales was of a mixed character, though on the whole it was favorable.

The address was presented in a splendid gold casket richly enameled and studded with jewels.

The emperor replied to the address by expressing his thanks for the welcome extended him. He said he would always as far as lay in his power maintain the historical friendship existing between England and Germany.

TODAYS PORTLAND NEWS.

Two Cars of State Exhibits to be Sent East--Reed's Body Found.

PORTLAND, Or., July 10.—It is stated that the Oregon board of immigration will start two cars containing exhibits of the state's resources east about September first.

Coroner Rivers today received word that the dead body of John Reed had been found in Gilbert river a few miles below the city.

NEW YORK, July 10.—General master workman Powderly has issued a special circular, to allow local assemblies of Knights of Labor on the question of the proposed industrial conference which is to be held July 29th to take up the platform of the farmers alliance and join hands with the third party.

Grasshopper Plague Increasing.

KANSAS CITY, July 10.—Henry Smith, of Springer, New Mexico, who is in the city, says the grasshopper pest in New Mexico and Arizona is very bad.

White Settlers Expelled by Indian Militia.

GAINESVILLE, Tex., July 10.—Indian agent Bennett and the Chickasaw militia have arrested over fifty white families charged with being intruders, who will be put across the river into Texas tomorrow with orders not to return to the territory under heavy penalties.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., July 10.—The Lake City bank failure is more serious than was first supposed and the general impression is that it is a complete wreck, though the president says he will pay up.

Smiler's Body.

It Presented a Horrible Appearance When Exposed at the Undertaker's.

NEW YORK, July 8.—The body of the murderer, Harris A. Smiler, was brought to this city this afternoon by Undertaker Hurlburg. The body had been claimed by Smiler's widow, the woman he married and deserted for the woman whom he afterward murdered.

Warden Brown Will Say Nothing.

SING SING, July 8.—Warden Brown was seen at the prison this evening and asked as to the reported burning of Smiler's body. He said that he still adhered to his determination to make no statement whatever, and that he would neither deny nor confirm the report.

Another Denial.

NEW YORK, July 8.—Dr. Ward, who was one of the witnesses, tonight reiterated his previous assertion that not one of the men executed was burned in the least.

Will Not Be Built this Year.

TACOMA, July 8.—The story as to General Council McNaught's promising, in the presence of President Oakes, to complete the projected cut-off, connecting the Palouse branch with the main line at some point between Cheney and Sprague, in time for use in the transportation of the coming grain crop, lacks confirmation among the railroad authorities.

A Short Interview With Villard.

NEW YORK, July 8.—Villard is quoted as saying that he considers the McKinley bill responsible in a large measure for the large exports of gold. He also says, with considerable emphasis, that he considers the silver legislation in this country partly responsible, and is surprised at the indifference shown by the business community in regard to it.

THE ACT OF A COURTESAN.

She Murders Her Lover Because He Left Her and Kills Himself.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 8.—At 8:30 this afternoon Billy Arlington, a well-known and popular police officer of this city, was shot and killed by Annie Manning, a keeper of a notorious dive. After shooting Arlington the woman turned the pistol on herself and blew out her brains. The woman had been Arlington's mistress for seven years, but recently the police commissioner, notified him he must give her up or resign his position. He chose the former and the woman has since been despondent.

Their Turn Next.

Mellvaine and Trezza Will Also Die by Electricity.

SING SING, July 8.—The murderers condemned to die by electricity, Mellvaine and Trezza, have been brought back to the depopulated room where the condemned men await for staves. They were very quiet and tractable. Mellvaine, after breakfast, asked Partridge, one of the death watch, "How did they die?" He spoke almost in a whisper, and put his face close to the bars, to catch the reply. Partridge told him how they died. Then he, who was once a street rough, who cut a man to death and gloried in the deed, sat down on his low cot and began to think it would be his turn next.

Indian Renegades.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 8.—A special from Tombstone, A. T., says the Apaches who shot a Chinaman in the Canemine mountains ten days ago were pursued by a company of Mexican rangers and driven to the top of the mountains, when the soldiers were forced to retire. The renegades then entered Arizona and attacked a mining camp within thirty miles of Fort Huachuca last Monday morning, and drove the miners out of camp.

Will Appeal to the American People.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 8.—Honolulu advices state that the missionary steamer Morning Star has arrived there with some of the American missionaries expelled by the forces in Ponape, who are endeavoring to strengthen their sovereignty over the Caroline islands. Chief Naupel, of one of the prominent tribes of Ponape, accompanied by the missionaries, and will appeal to the American people for assistance on behalf of the islanders, whom he claims can make no advancement in civilization under the Spanish rule.

An Eye to Business.

OLYMPIA, July 8.—It was stated today by Governor Ferry, who was advertised over the state for his generosity in furnishing funds so the militia last year, made a move that was more of a financial investment than generosity. While the troops were in camp at American Lake a committee was sent up to the state auditor to get the warrants on the soldiers for their pay while in encampment. The warrants amounted to a little over \$10,000 and were taken back to camp and Governor Ferry cashed them which almost any bank in the state would have been glad to do, as it was a good 10 per cent. investment.

An Absent-Minded Widow.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 8.—Mrs. M. J. O'Conner, a wealthy widow of San Rafael, was robbed today in this city of a satchel containing valuable diamonds, \$2000 in money, and bank checks and bonds worth thousands of dollars. She came from San Rafael with her daughter this morning to transact business, carrying the satchel with her. They drove to the Occidental hotel, which they entered, leaving the bag in the carriage. When they returned a few hours later the bag was gone. It is believed that while the coachman was hitching the horses the thief opened the carriage and made off with the valuables.

The Proper Caper.

NEW YORK, July 8.—Dr. Fuller, who recently sued his young wife for divorce, charging ex-Judge Leicester Holme, as correspondent, met the latter today in the ladies' cabin of a ferry boat, blacked both his eyes, spat upon him and denounced him, amid great excitement, as a scoundrel and a coward. Dr. Fuller apologized to the ladies.
