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FIRE IN MONTREAL.

'The Devouring Element' Doing Terrible Damage in that City.—The Loss is Enormous.

The Great Langtry is Thrashed by her Lover—Mount Vernon Burned Up—A Dynamite Explosion.

MONTREAL, July 14.—The greatest conflagration Montreal has witnessed for years is in progress. It began shortly before midnight in the great lumber yard of Prefontaine, Brosseau & Co., and spread with tremendous rapidity.

A number of firemen are reported badly burned and some fatalities are feared. At 2:30 p. m. the flames were reported as under control, but not until after two lumber yards and a number of small dwellings were burned.

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FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS LOST.

A Fire at Mount Vernon, Wash., Sweeps the Town.

SEATTLE, July 14.—A dispatch from Mount Vernon, Wash., states that the principal business portion of town, has been destroyed by fire. The loss will be \$40,000.

ADDITIONAL PARTICULARS.

SEATTLE, July 14.—The steamer Henry Bailey which arrived here today from Mount Vernon brings the first news of the disastrous fire which occurred there yesterday morning. The fire broke out in the Washington hotel. The hotel was entirely consumed with fifteen other business buildings, and two residences, causing a total loss of forty thousand dollars.
