MONTANA'S PRECIOUS STONES

London Market Asked to Subscribe Heavily to the Recently Incorporated Company.

LONDON, Oct. 11 .- The correspondent of the New York Herald sends the following telegram: "A huge American enterprise to be launched in the coming week on the London market is the Sapphire and Ruby company of Montana which will ask the public for \$2,252,000, on the declaration that the company will secure 4,000 acres in Montana, on the right bank of the Missouri river, about twelve miles northesst of Helena. The prospectus says:"

On the lands acquired by the company careful prospecting has demonstrated the existence of sapphires and rubies, chiefly the former, in quantities unpre-Precious stones are found on the bedrock of an ancient river channel, nowadays an elevated terrace skirted by the Missouri river, and covered by a deposit of gravel.
