Meeting of the Portage Commissioners.

A meeting of the state portage commissioners will be held at the Cascades tomorrow for the purpose of considering the freight schedule and making what revision may be found necessary. One thing the board ought to do now that the work of construction is nearly completed, and that is, cut off every unnecessary office and reduce the expenses to the lowest possible notch consistent with efficient management. There will no longer be any necessity for a clerk and a conductor and a superintendent. Let these offices be merged in one and let him hire a cheap clerk if the work is too much for one. The success of the portage as well as of the people's line of boats depends on cheap transportation over the portage. It must not therefore be made a soft place for a state nap sucker. In fact the state could not do better than give the control of the road, under proper restrictions, as to outside freights, to The Dalles, Portland and Astoria Navigation company, placing them under bonds for its management, in conformity with its original intent, and insuring that it wont be operated at any cost to the state.

Badly Scared.
