## LOCAL BRIEFS.

The three banks of Pendleton carry a million dollars of deposits.

Counterfeit five and ten dollar bills are being circulated in Portland.

G. J. Farley has let the contract for a fine residence on Fourth street.

Mr. John Mohr of Hood River was in town yesterday. He returned this morning on the Regulator.

A man named D. F. Smyer brought into Pendleton the other day a gold nugget which weighed out \$3.55. It was found at the Susanville placer mines.

Will Graham has on exhibition in his restaurant window a head of cabbage grown in the sand north of the railroad track in Dalles City which weighs 24 pounds.

Four native drunks were accommodated with boudoirs in the hotel de Gibbons last night. Two paid their fines this morning and two are working them out on the streets.

Charley Hall and a brakeman R. S. Hughes brought into town this morning from up the road twenty-eight geese. Charley claims to have shot only six of them and the brakeman the remaining twenty-two.

Owing to the fact that Mr. Crossen has caught a very severe cold and is quite hoarse the auction sale of dry goods at the store of Mr. Harris will be discontinued for the present. Just as soon as Mr. Crossen has recovered his voice the sale will be resumed.

Mr. Peter Mohr of Hood River came up last night on the Regulator. Mr. Mohr is one of the most successful fruit raisers in the Hood River valley. He took no less than thirty-two prizes for fruits at the last agricultural fair—twenty-one first prizes, eight second, and three sweepstakes.

A gentleman of this county whose finances were reduced to a lone fifty cent piece went down to Portland on the Baker this morning. He called at the office yesterday and explained the situation to the writer and requested that his name be not mentioned, assuring us that no condition other than abject necessity could induce him to do as he has done.

The county court yesterday afternoon appointed Vernon Roberts of Sheras Bridge to the office of stock inspector. Mr. Roberts is a gentleman in every way qualified for the office, and is a man of excellent ability and habits. The writer speaks thus of his own personal knowledge. We may have our own likes and preferences but the county could not have made a better appointment.

Here is a witty comment by the Newberg Graphic: What with the discussion between Drs. Rowland and Lane relative to the age and general all-round effectiveness of the insane asylum bed bugs, and Messrs. Clark and Varney's little tilt over the San Jose scale business, one is led to think that Oregon may soon be taken by "varments" of one kind or another, and the ready public will be well prepared for the campaign of '92.

The Chronicle office is indebted to the kindness of Major G. W. Ingalls for

the present of an exceedingly handsome photographic picture of the Wasco county fruit exhibit at the late Portland exposition. It will be remembered that Wasco county took the first prize at the exposition, over the whole Northwest, for the best exhibit of fruits. The picture is a magnificent representation of the exhibit, and after we have put it in a handsome setting it will adorn the show window of the Chronicle office and be the pride and admiration of every citizen of grand old Wasco county.

It is the general opinion and experience of Dalles business men that they have never known a time when more business was being transacted in this city than there is at present, and everything indicates prosperous times ahead. Dr. Siddall, who has traveled extensively over the towns and cities of the northwest during the past summer, says he does not know of a town anywhere where business of any kind is more prosperous than it is here. He believes that out of the ashes and debris of our late fire a city will arise more beautiful, more populous and more prosperous than the old, and in this opinion the majority of our citizens fully share.

Noticing a broad smile on the genial countenance of our popular dentist Dr. D. Siddall, yesterday afternoon, the Chronicle man ventured to ask "What's up doctor?" "What's up! Why everything. I have been waiting anxiously ever since the fire to see how the political cat would hop, afraid to invest a dollar for fear the country might possibly adopt a principle that would drive it to the dogs, but now that McKinley is elected in Ohio and the country is safe I am going to erect two fine residence houses in this city, fitted up with every modern improvement, because I believe we are going to see an era of prosperous times such as the United States never experienced in all her past history," and the scribe reverently murmured "Amen" and continued to pursue the "delusive" item.

Major Ingalls, arrived in The Dalles on the noon passenger today. He has started out on his work of raising subscriptions for the Oregon exhibit at the world's fair under the auspices of the Oregon State Board of Commerce, and the Major will work his way through the proverbial incrustation of Oregon moss about as successfully as any other man in the state. It is characteristic of his energy to say that he was not an hour in The Dalles till he had obtained pledges for nearly \$400. The Major goes up tonight to La Grande where he has arranged to meet a committee just about to start for the great mining convention to be held in Denver in a few days. The committee has promised the Major a liberal subscription. He will return to finish his work at The Dalles about next Monday. A committee from Alliance No. 1 of Eight Mile has obtained a promise from the Major for an address to be given at the residence of J. A. Keeley of Dry Hollow on Saturday the 14th instant. The address will deal largely with the subject "Lessons derived from the Wasco county Horticultural Exhibit at the late Portland Exposition."

## A Coroner's Verdict.

A coroner out west recently reasoned out a verdict more sensible than one-half the verdicts usually rendered. It appears that an Irishman, conceiving that a little powder thrown upon some green wood would facilitate its burning, directed a small stream of powder from a keg upon the burning stick; but not possessing a hand sufficiently quick to cut this off, was blown into a million pieces. The following was the verdict, delivered with great gravity by the official:

"Can't be called suicide, because he didn't mean to kill himself; it wasn't 'visitation of God' because he wasn't struck by lightning; he didn't die for want of breath for he hadn't anything to breathe with; it's plain he didn't know what he was about, so I shall bring in—Died for want of common sense."

## Heavy Damages Awarded.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 5.—The jury in the damage suit of John B. Cogswell against the West street electric railway today, awarded the plaintiff a verdict for \$19,000. It was shown in the evidence that Cogswell's knee was injured for life by being struck by a plank projecting over the track of the company while he was riding on one of their cars. By way of defense the company set up that the plank was there through no negligence of theirs, and that the condition of Cogswell's knee was due to the fact that he had not taken proper care of it.

It will be seen that the land acreage is less by 44,232 acres. This is partly accounted for by the fact that a slice has been cut off the county and added to Sherman and partly by the fact that the mortgage indebtedness has increased on lands whose indebtedness covers their assessed valuation.

On Fourth street from the north side of Second street to the south side of Fifth street.  
On Fifth street from the north side of Second street to the south side of Fourth street.  
On Washington street from the north side of Second street to the south side of Fourth street.  
On Federal street from the north side of Second street to the south side of Fourth street.  
On Jefferson street from the north side of Second street to the south side of Fourth street.  
On Madison street from the north side of Second street to the south side of Fourth street.  
On Monroe street from the north side of Second street to the south side of Fourth street.

The grades of said streets will be fixed with reference to the supposed stage of low water in the Columbia river, which is fixed at a point 52.81 feet below the top of the hydrant at the southwest corner of First and Union streets, in said Dalles City, and which point upon the Columbia river is designated as the initial point from which the elevations hereinafter stated are figured.

The squares made by the crossings of the several streets shall be level and shall be of the following elevations above the datum plane or low water level of the Columbia river, hereinafter fixed:
