The dispatches inform us that the United States grand jury, which has been investigating the dealings of the Howell Lumber Company of St. Joseph. Mo., which failed several months ago, the Howells' entered into a secret arrangement with the agent and weighmaster of the Rock Island road whereby they were able to get such a rebate from the weight of their shipments of lumber that they were able to sell at a price below all competition. The action is held to be in direct violation of the interstate commerce law. The great trouble connected with all arrangements of this character is to obtain such proof of their existence as will satisfy the courts.
