Roads are badly needed in many places, especially in Eastern Oregon, where it is not possible for the scattered population nor the counties to build them, but how would it be possible to herd a band of convicts night and day away from prison walls and bolts and bars, so that they would not escape? And supposing this difficulty could be overcome could the state compel a convict who had been sentenced to confinement within the walls of the state penitentiary to come up to Wasco county and spend three months building a grade up Tygh hill? It is possible that some of them would be glad to get out into the air and sunshine, but would it be possible to so employ them without some smart Alec of a lawyer raising a legal or constitutional difficulty? We ask these questions in no captions spirit and should only be too glad of the success of any scheme that would enable us to improve the condition of our public roads.
