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THE GOVERNOR'S LETTER.

He Urges the Government to Build the Portage Road.

COMMUNICATION TO CONGRESS. The River and Harbor Committee is shown the Necessities of the Case-- Special Features and Data are Given.

Governor Penneyer is endeavoring to persuade the river and harbor committee to make an appropriation for the portage railway at The Dalles. He has embodied his ideas on the subject in a letter to them, which carefully discusses the situation. It is given herewith: "Gentlemen: I sincerely trust that you can incorporate in the bill of appropriations for rivers and harbors, which you at this session of congress will present to the consideration of the house, the sum of \$431,500 for a portage railroad from the foot of the dalles to above Celilo falls on the Columbia river."
